Glenview Road Construction to Begin Shortly

The Village of Glenview is pleased to inform you that the project to reconstruct Glenview Rd. from Waukegan Rd. east to the Village limits will be starting shortly. On March 13, 1990, the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) opened bids on the first phase of the project.

Phase I, or the work to be completed in 1990, involves installing a new relief storm sewer along most of the project, replacing and relocating the Village's water main, repairing the sanitary sewer system along Glenview Rd., and replacing the sanitary sewer along Harms Rd. from Wilmette Rd. to Glenview Rd.

Also, new storm sewers will be installed on Wagner Rd. from Golfview Rd. to Polo Ln., and on Golfview Rd. from Windsor Rd. to Wagner Rd., and a new water main on Laramie Ave. from Wilmette Rd. to Glenview Rd., will be constructed. Lastly, the bridge deck over the North Branch of the Chicago River in Harms Woods will be totally replaced with a new concrete deck.

Phase II, scheduled for 1991, will involve the removal and replacement of the existing pavement with a new, two lane asphalt pavement, intersection improve-

ments at Long Rd., Wagner Rd., and Harms Rd., curbing along the entire project, replacement of traffic signals at Harms Rd. and new signals to be installed at Wagner Rd., construction of a new rubberized railway crossing, installation of continuous sidewalk on both sides of the road, emergency vehicle priority systems at the traffic signals, and planting new parkway trees where space is available.

The Village is eagerly awaiting the beginning of construction. It represents the culmination of an arduous process that began back in 1982.

Willow Road Corridor Agreement Signed

Glenview and Northbrook have executed an unprecedented agreement regarding land use in the Willow Road Corridor (along Willow Road, from just west of the tollway, to just east of Waukegan Road). The agreement, signed at a joint meeting between the Village Boards of both vil-

ages on March 12, 1990, resolves the litigation regarding Willow Road that has plagued both communities for some time.

The main purpose of the agreement is to prescribe responsible and compatible land uses in the Willow Road Corridor. It

designates acceptable land uses on parcels of land within the Corridor, and states the preferences of the communities as to which unincorporated parcels of land would be incorporated to which community. The agreement also identifies areas of jurisdiction for emergency services.

The agreement further states that both Glenview and Northbrook will attempt to reduce the number of curb cuts and access points on Willow Road. It also specifies a number of areas in which the two communities will cooperate to achieve traffic management plans, including the pursuit of an additional commuter train station to be located in the Techny Area.

Representatives for Glenview and Northbrook will meet annually to discuss the progress made toward achieving the purposes of the agreement, and plan for future progress as well.

Copies of the agreement are available for inspection and review at both Village Halls, and at the Glenview Public Library.

TREE CITY USA

The Village of Glenview has received the Tree City designation for the fifth year in a row. Glenview received the award at the Peoria Civic Center on Friday, April 20th, along with ten other municipalities in Illinois who are also five-year award recipients. Sixty-eight communities in the state have been Tree Cities for varying lengths of time from one to fourteen years.

Glenview received a Tree City flag and an acrylic trophy with the Roman numeral five embedded in it. The Tree City Foundation also supplies the Tree City USA signs which are displayed at various Village entrances.

Tree City USA, which recognizes U.S. towns and cities with comprehensive urban forestry programs, began as a 1976 Bicentennial project co-sponsored by the National Association of State Foresters, and the U. S. Forest Service. The National League of Cities and the U. S. Conference of Mayors are now co-sponsors as well.

To become a Tree City, a community must meet four standards: the community must have a tree board or department, a community tree ordinance, a comprehensive community forestry program, and an Arbor-Day observance and proclamation. Communities complete an application which is sent to the state forester, who reviews the application and forwards it to the National Arbor Day Foundation. Each community must re-apply every year.

The advantages of being a Tree City include national and state-wide recognition, sharing information and ideas among members, and the constant updating of forestry knowledge.

State law requires separation of yard wastes (grass clippings, brush trimmings, leaves, etc.) from regular garbage. The Village of Glenview has established a plan for separate yard waste collection and disposal. Glenview residents will be required to dispose of yard waste in "official paper yard waste bags". Cost of the bags is \$.26, plus tax each, and will be sold in bundles of 25 (\$6.50 plus tax) at one of the vendors listed below. The cost of the bags is the direct cost from the bag manufacturer. *There is no profit included in the price of the bags!*

Residents are also required to purchase a sticker from their regular garbage hauler. The cost of the sticker will be \$1, and covers the cost for the separate yard waste collection and disposal. **A sticker must be attached to each bag of yard waste, and each bundle of branches.** Branches must be bundled in lengths less than 4 feet, diameters of the bundle must be 18 inches or less, tied with cloth or twine, *not wire*, and the diameter of the branches cannot exceed 2 1/2 inches. Branches may be disposed of in the paper bags also.

Question: When do I put my yard waste at the curb for collection?

State Yard Waste Law Presents Challenge

Answer: Yard waste will be collected by your current hauler on one of the days of the week that the hauler is in your neighborhood. For example, if you have twice per week garbage collection, yard waste will be collected on one of those days. However, if you have once per week garbage collection, yard wastes will be collected on one of the two days of the week the hauler is in the area, and you *may or may not* receive yard waste collection on your regular garbage collection day. Your hauler will notify you by mail as to what day your yard wastes will be collected.

Question: What about the garbage rates that are currently charged? The hauler is collecting less garbage, shouldn't there be a reduction in my regular garbage bill?

Answer: This is a valid question that the Village is investigating. Although residents are disposing of less "garbage", there are costs associated with separate collection of both yard wastes and recyclable materials. With this in mind, the Village has retained a consultant to analyze all costs associated with collecting and disposing of Glenview's municipal waste.

Question: When will the new yard waste collection and disposal system start?

Village Board Highlights

Village Board meetings are held the first and third Tuesdays of each month, in the Village Hall, at 7:30 p.m. Residents are always welcome at the Board meetings. Those wanting to speak on agenda items may fill out cards at the door and hand to the secretary; those wanting to speak on nonagenda items must make advance arrangements with the Village Manager's Office.

ANNOUNCED with regret, the death of former Village Manager Robert H. van Deusen, on March 17, 1990. Mr. van Deusen served as Village Manager from 1962 to 1982. He was considered a legend in the field of city management, and "was instrumental in planting many seeds that are now coming to fruition in the community".

ADOPTED an ordinance reaffirming Glenview's commitment to the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County, and the balefill project.

APPROVED recommendation from the Ad Hoc Recycling Advisory Committee regarding yard waste collection and disposal (see article below). The recommendation conforms with the State law that prohibits yard wastes being disposed of in landfills.

Answer: June 25, 1990. As of that date, all yard waste must be disposed of in the paper bags, with a hauler's sticker attached.
