

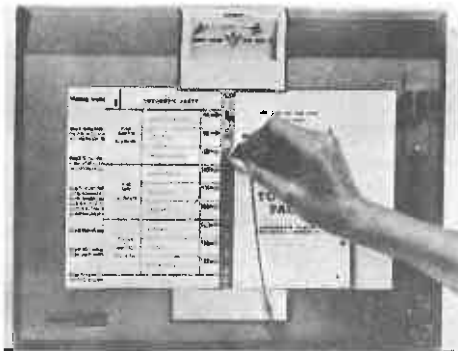

## NEW VOTING DEVICE TO BE USED



A new voting device, to be used on November 2 for the first time in Cook County, is called "Votomatic."

In the voting booth you will find a 12-page booklet

instead of a voting machine. You will slip your ballot card into the vote recorder behind the booklet, then make your choices by punching holes with the stylus provided in the voting booth.

Don't be nervous — if you make a mistake the judges will give you a new ballot card.

There are several advantages to the Votomatic system, say County officials: voters move more rapidly through the polling place (as there can be six Votomatic devices where there were formerly only two voting machines), votes are counted by computer, and judges have their totals soon after the polls close.

Polls will be open between 6 AM and 6 PM on Tuesday, November 2. If you don't know your polling place, call the Village Hall, 724-1700.

APPLICATIONS FOR 1977 vehicle license stickers and dog and cat licenses will be in the mail by November 15. Any additional forms you need are, of course, available at the Village Hall. Vehicle stickers go on sale over the counter at the Village Hall on November 15.

BOTH CRIME AND TRAFFIC INCREASE during the holiday season. So do traffic hazards, due to early darkness, ice, and snow. You can protect yourself by taking extra driving precautions. THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT is treating areas around retention ponds and inspecting river banks for rodents. Active burrows are being baited with a mixture of corn meal and Warfarin (a slow-acting anticoagulant poison). Sanitarian Kerry O'Shaughnessy warns you to stay away and keep children and pets away from pond enclosures, further cautioning that dumping garbage and grass clippings around ponds will only make the rodent problem worse.

You can discourage rodents on your own property by making sure your garbage is stored in vermin-proof containers with tight-fitting lids.

IF YOU ARE LEAVING TOWN for the holidays, please go in person to the Police Department and fill out a house-watch request. The beat officer will then keep an eye on your property on a regular schedule. If anything seems amiss, the officer will stop and investigate.

leave it. Keep all packages in the trunk. Secure your purse or wallet while shopping.

Take strict security measures at home, too. The thieves know there is expensive new merchandise in many Glenview households before and during the holiday season, and they want to get as much of it as they possibly can. Don't make it easy for them.

If you plan to celebrate the holidays with more than one ounce of alcohol per hour (which shouldn't impair your driving ability), make arrangements in advance for someone else to drive you to and from the party, or take a taxi. Don't run the risk of losing your license, raising your insurance rates, going to jail, killing someone, or losing your own life — it just isn't worth it.

**NORTRAN BUS SERVICE EXTENDED**  
to High School and Ice Center

NORTRAN has extended Route 210 into western Glenview to serve Glenbrook South High School, the Glenview Ice Center, and the soon-to-be-opened Glenbrook Hospital. Buses operate on weekdays every 30 minutes during rush hours, every 90 minutes during the day, and every two hours on Saturdays and Sundays.

Buses continue through Glenview to the Chicago Loop, via North Michigan Avenue, and make connections with some Milwaukee Road express trains. Fares are 50¢ for adults (\$1.25 into Chicago). Senior citizens ride for half fare, and students ride locally for 25¢.

**"DISPOSABLE" IS NOT "FLUSHABLE"**

The Public Works Department cleans every sewer line in Glenview about once a year, but during the last few years there has been a large increase in sewer obstructions caused by disposable diapers and facial tissues. Unlike regular toilet tissue, other disposable paper products have a wet strength that causes them to pack together and block the flow.

Please don't flush anything but regular toilet tissue into the sewer. Other disposable paper products must be put into your regular household waste collection.

**ZEBRAS OVERRUN LIBRARY!**

A "zebra" is a new bar-encoded library card that looks a little like what you see imprinted on grocery packages these days. It is used with the new computerized circulation system that began September 20.

You can get your "zebra" any time at the Library, and you'll never need to renew it, as it comes in laminated plastic.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES ...

- Adopted the Anti-Vandalism Ordinance developed by the 14 municipalities in the Second District of the Cook County Circuit Court. The ordinance provides that parents or legal guardians must pay fines or make restitution for property damage done by minors.
- Annexed the mobile home park at 1718 Waukegan Road, zoning it B-2 (business classification).
- Annexed Lois Lane, west of Wagner Road and north of King's Lane.
- Authorized conditional use of 930 Waukegan Road (an existing service station) for a car wash.
- Rezoned 1245 Waukegan Road from P-1 (public-use classification) to B-2 (business classification) for a parking lot.
- Granted partial vacation of a river easement at 1217 Church Street.
- Vacated a dedicated but unimproved alley at the southeast corner of Washington Street and Glenview Road (site of the new library parking lot).
- Accepted final plats of Bury's Resubdivision (southeast corner of Washington Street and Glenview Road, site of the new library parking lot), Doberstein's Resubdivision (2+ lots at 719 Juniper), Ginnain's Second Resubdivision (1245 Waukegan Road), and Municipal Parking Lot Subdivision (Depot and Grove).
- Approved an increase of 28% in water and sewer rates.
- Approved the firm of Consoer Townsend & Associates as consultant for the widenings of Harlem Avenue and Central Road.
- Approved an agreement with Chicago and North Western Transportation Company for an easement under the company's tracks, for construction and maintenance of a sewer line.
- Authorized the Village Attorney to initiate proceedings for sale of a one-foot strip of land abutting the east wall of the Fire Station, pending approval of the Appearance Commission.
- Approved Meadow Subdivision (unincorporated land at Glenview Road and Glendale), subject to the approval of the Village Engineer.
- Approved an agreement with Cook County for use of County Development funds (\$20,000) for a sidewalk on the south side of Lake Avenue between Wagner and Harms Roads, and for floodwater retention basins (\$120,000) in Techny.
- Authorized the Village Attorney to represent Glenview in Glen Oak Dog and Cat Hospital's suit against the Village.
- Amended the Electrical Code to increase the amount of fees for permits.
- Amended the Plumbing Code to prohibit direction of storm water (as from sump pumps and downspouts) to another person's property.
- Prohibited parking on a portion of the south side of Prairie Street west of Elm Street.
- Denied rezoning (to B-2, business classification) for five parcels of land in the vicinity of Depot, Grove, and Pine Streets, currently zoned for industrial use.
- Amended the Municipal Code to prohibit display of expired vehicle stickers, and of commuter parking stickers after three months' expiration.
- Eliminated the Police Department rank of Captain.
- Denied use of property at 1913 Waukegan Road for a drive-in fast-food operation.
- Filed legal objections to the granting of a special-use permission for 3.1 acres of unincorporated land on the south side of Central Road between Crawford Lane and Potter Road (zoned residential), and to the rezoning of 12 unincorporated acres on the south side of Lake Avenue west of Landwehr (extended) from R-3 to R-5.
- Accepted the bid of Northern Trust Bank (\$385,000) for water and sewer improvement bonds.
- Accepted Paveway Construction Company's bid (\$50,689) for general work on the library parking lot, and Mormino & Sons, Inc., bid (\$12,000) for landscaping the lot.
- Accepted Jennings Chevrolet's bid (\$16,029) for three 1977 step-van trucks for Water Department use.
- Accepted Schuster Equipment's bid (\$8,806) for two hopper-type salt spreaders for Public Works use.
- Accepted Glenbrook Ford's bid (\$7,187) for a 2½-ton truck for Public Works use.
- Accepted Process Equipment Corporation's bid (\$6,643) for a calcium chloride system.
- Accepted North Shore Motors' bid (\$4,700, including trade-in) for a jeep for Public Works use.
- Accepted Cope Distributing, Inc., bid (\$2,853) for two automated key systems for Public Works fuel pumps.
- Accepted General Body Sales Corporation's bid (\$2,795) for a five-yard dump box for Public Works use.
- Accepted Brandenburg Demolition, Inc., bid (\$2,195) for demolition of the building at 1233 Waukegan Road.

*BECAUSE A GREAT DEAL OF VILLAGE SNOW PLOWING must be done in the dark, it is almost impossible for the plow not to tear up some grass along the edges of roadways at curves, intersections, cul-de-sacs, or places where there are no curbs ... UNLESS you put reflective markers along the edge of the pavement to guide the driver of the plow. Rocks and logs do more harm than good - they are quickly covered by snow and become actual hazards to the plow and its driver. Broom handles with reflecting tape at the top make excellent and inexpensive markers.*

TENTATIVE DATES FOR SWINE-FLU IMMUNIZATION are Saturday, November 13, at the Playdium, and Monday, November 15, at Glenview Naval Air Station, 7 AM to 7 PM. The vaccine is available to anyone 18 to 60 who is not chronically ill or ill on the day of the shot, not allergic to eggs, and has not had any other kind of shot within two weeks. You must read and sign a detailed consent form before the vaccine will be given. The shot is administered by a jet-injector gun using pressure instead of a needle. It takes two or three weeks for the body to build immunity after the shot. (Although flu can start in the fall, the worst season begins in January and February, so you'll be protected for that.) If you are over 60 or chronically ill, you should have the bivalent (two-strain) vaccine offered by Northfield Township. Call 724-8300 for more information.

IF YOU ARE WILLING TO VOLUNTEER YOUR HELP for the Glenview inoculation dates, please call the Health Department, 724-1700, immediately.

PLEASE DO NOT PARK ON THE STREET when a snowfall of two inches or more is forecast. Public Works crews begin plowing very early in the morning (3 or 4 AM), in order to have streets and public parking lots clear before the morning rush.

Cars parked on the street make the job very difficult and the results unsatisfactory - both for those using the street and for those who are plowed in.



One further reminder: don't shovel snow into the street or onto the public sidewalk, or pile it so high that it obstructs the view of an intersection. The Village has an ordinance against all those things. Thanks for your continued cooperation in keeping the streets of Glenview safe for everyone.

When you clear your driveway and sidewalk, please don't put away the shovel until you have also cleared around the fire hydrant, if one is adjacent to your property. This little bit of extra work can save your life and the lives of others in case of fire.

### CARING FOR YOUR NEW PARKWAY TREE



If you are one of the many residents who took advantage of the 50-50 Tree-Planting Program this year, you may want to know what to do to start the new tree on a vigorous, healthy life.

If you haven't watered the tree yet, do so immediately - but only *once* before winter sets in. (The water will help settle the soil around the tree's ball.)

Do not fertilize your tree the first year, as it was planted with fertilizer in the ball. Do not remove the wrapping, at least not until next fall, because the wrapping protects the bark from being burned by wind and sun.

Leave the soil loose around the base of the tree, and be sure to water it next summer during the dry season. The contractor is required to give us a one-year guarantee on all trees, so if yours doesn't leaf out by early summer, please call Public Works at 724-1700. Trained personnel will examine the tree, and - if necessary - see that it is replaced free of charge.
