



## Village Announces Deputy Police Chief Appointment

Pat Carey was sworn in as a deputy chief of police for the Glenview Police Department by President Smirles at the December 3rd Board Meeting. President Smirles announced that Pat will be the department's second deputy chief and will be in charge of the Operations Division. Deputy Chief Steve Halls will be in charge of the Support Services Division. President Smirles commented that Village growth and expansion, coupled with the pending implementation of the 9-1-1 emergency telephone system, necessitated the reorganization of the department. Commander Jim Gray will retire in early January as police commander to supervise the police communications center. The division commander's position will then be eliminated. The move will save the Village approximately \$30,000 in 1992.

Deputy Chief Carey has an impressive police and academic background. He began working for the Village in the Public Works Department prior to his appointment to the Police Department. Pat was one of the original officers to serve as "Officer Friendly" in the Glenview schools. He has worked as a patrol officer and detective, a police sergeant and as a police commander in both the Support Services Division and, more recently, in the Operations Division. Deputy Chief Carey has attended numerous training courses and seminars. He is a graduate of the nine month course in police administration at the Northwestern University Traffic Institute. He received his B.S. degree in Organizational Behavior from Northwestern University, and his Masters Degree from National Lewis College.

Deputy Chief Carey has worked for several years with the Street Sale Committee, the Fourth of July/Fireworks Committee, and numerous other Village groups and associations. Deputy Chief Carey is also a presenter for the Glenview Values at neighborhood coffees. Congratulations are extended to Pat, his wife Denise, and sons Ryan and Reed.

**Low income home energy assistance program . . .** This federally funded program is available to help qualified persons reduce the cost of their utility bills during the winter months. The grants range from \$200-\$400 with 67% applied to heating fuel and 33% to electric costs. To qualify you must be at least 18 years old or older, head of the household and the customer of record on the energy bills. Gross income for the 30 days prior to application must not exceed the following:

# Water Saving Tips





You may be wasting money and don't even know it! Every time you wash your hands, shower, flush the toilet or water the lawn, you may be sending water and energy dollars down the drain. Below are a few money saving ideas. Some of the ideas relate to things done in warmer weather, but keep them in mind anyway. Summer will return!

## Everyday Tips:

-  Shorten your shower. Even a one or two minute reduction can save up to 700 gallons per month. A typical five-minute shower can use over 40 gallons of water. Turn off the water while lathering, turn it back on to rinse.
-  Use low-flow shower heads or flow restrictors in regular shower heads. Flow restrictors are available at any hardware store.
-  Put bathroom trash in the wastebasket and cigarettes in the ashtray instead of flushing them down the toilet.
-  When you can, take a shallow bath rather than a shower.
-  Plastic soap bottles can be filled with water or pebbles and placed in the toilet tank to reduce the amount of water used for each flush. Do not displace so much water that the toilet must be flushed twice.
-  Check the toilet for leaks by dropping dye tablets or food coloring into the tank. If color appears in the bowl without flushing, there's a leak that should be repaired. This minor repair can save 200 gallons of water per month.
-  Do not leave water running when shaving, brushing teeth, washing your hair or washing dishes.

-  Run only full loads in the washing machine and dishwasher.
-  Keep a bottle in the refrigerator for drinking instead of running the tap for cold water.
-  When washing dishes by hand, use the least amount of detergent possible to minimize rinse water needed.
-  Replace worn washers in faucets. Keeping spares on hand is good practice.

## Summertime Tips:

-  Instead of running the sprinklers every day, water the lawn only when it needs it or just give it a good soak once a week.
-  Water the lawn in the early morning or evening when there's less evaporation.
-  Skip watering the lawn on a windy day when there's too much evaporation.
-  Wash your car using a bucket of water and a quick hose rinse at the end instead of letting the hose run continuously.

**ADOPTED** an ordinance eliminating the minimum water bill for the Village's water utility. See the related article on page 1.

**ANNOUNCED** that the Village has generated the highest rate of return of investment of the Fire pension funds in

the State of Illinois, and the second highest return of investment of the Police pension funds in the State.

**ADOPTED** the 1992 annual budget in the total amount of \$26,192,199; the 1992 budget is \$7,680 less than the 1991 budget. An article will be included in the February *Village Report* explaining the budget in more detail.

**CONTINUED** discussions regarding the mobile home park at 1718 Waukegan Road. At issue is whether to extend the use of that property as a mobile home park, after the owner of the park agreed to cease operations as a mobile home park in an annexation agreement signed 15 years ago.

**ADOPTED** an ordinance allowing children's playground equipment to be 12 feet high rather than the previous 8 feet.
