Police Department Announces Survey Results

Never Try to Beat a Railroad Train

Wrong decisions on the part of drivers, not poor visibility or inadequate warnings are the cause of some 650 fatal accidents per year at U.S. railroad crossings. Large objects are perceived as moving more slowly than small ones traveling at the same speed, and the illusion of perspective makes locomotives appear farther away than they really are.

Warning systems and gates are designed to protect the slowest car in the worst weather from the fastest train. If you think you wait "forever" for a train to pass, next time glance at your watch, and you will see that it is rarely more than 2 or 3 minutes. It just seems long. Dying to save 2 or 3 minutes doesn't make sense.

Glenbrook South Student Wins Scholarships

Brian C. Baker, 610 Chatham Road, Glenview was one of 12 national winners of the Freedom Foundation "George Washington Honor Medal" for a speech entitled, "The Hard Work of Freedom". With the award came over \$7,000 worth of scholarships. The Freedom Foundation is a non-profit organization that recognizes individuals who help increase the understanding and appreciation of our nation and its principles of human dignity and freedom. The foundation makes awards available in a variety of categories including published articles and speeches. The Glenview American Legion Post nominated Brian to receive the award. The nomination was reviewed by the National Awards Jury, which is made up of Chief or Associate Justices of State Supreme Courts, principal officers of our country's major veterans, patriotic and service club organizations, and representatives from industrial, governmental, and educational institutions. Senior Citizen Housing Assistance Program

The Village has approved \$83 per month, or \$1,000 per year, toward rent or property taxes for qualifying Glenview Senior Citizens. Recipients will be selected according to need, on a first qualified, first served basis. Applications are available at the Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Rd., 724-1700 ext. 203; Glenview Public Library, 1930 Glenview Rd., 729-5000, and the Glenview Senior Center, (Rugen Community Center) 901 Shermer Rd., 724-4793.

Qualified recipients must be at least 62 years of age. If you are single, your total yearly income must be below \$10,000, for two person households, income must be below \$12,000 per year. Other factors may be considered in the application process.

Applications will be accepted beginning February 1, 1992. Any received prior to that date will be returned. Application review will be conducted during the month of March 1992, and will continue through the year until the appropriation is expended. Since applications will be approved on a first qualified, first served basis, individuals are urged to submit completed applications promptly. **APPLICATIONS WILL BE HELD IN STRICTEST CONFIDENCE.**
