Recycling Program Starts

Did you know that 50% of all solid waste has the potential to be recycled. And, did you know that sanitary landfills cost the nation approximately \$8 billion in annual operation and maintenance costs? Landfills are closing faster than new ones are opened. Landfill space in the Chicago metropolitan area is dwindling. How do we address these issues? One answer is **to recycle!**

The Glenview Recycling Program will begin in January 1990. Forest green bins will be delivered to single family homes during the week of January 8, 1990. Collection of newspapers, glass bottles and jars, and aluminum and tin cans will begin **January 15, 1990**. Information regarding the day of collection will be delivered with the recycling bins. If you are unable to receive your bin, please have a friend or neighbor collect it for you.

Commuter Parking to Change

The Glenview Village Board has adopted changes in the commuter parking fees for non-residents. Effective January 1, 1990, the fee for a non-resident commuter parking sticker is \$240. This is for the entire year. Quarterly stickers are not available to non-residents.

The fee for Glenview residents remains the same. Quarterly stickers are available for \$30 and annual stickers cost \$120. These changes are in addition to the alterations in the parking areas, shown on the map on page 2.

The Depot and Grove Street commuter parking lots are now designated for Glenview residents with a valid vehicle sticker **and** commuter parking sticker.

The "Triangle Lot" at Washington Street and Harlem

depends on your participation. You can be a part of the garbage solution. Participation is painless!

Skyrocketing costs for garbage removal are predicted if waste reduction measures are not taken.

The average Glenview resident throws away more than 5 pounds of trash daily (that figure includes **all** residents from infants to seniors). There are about 36,000 people living in Glenview, so on average, 180,000 pounds of trash are generated **each day!** The largest portion of this waste goes into area landfills, however some waste haulers are transporting the waste to other counties, and even other states.

It's time to take more responsibility for the garbage crisis. The first step in solving the problem is personal contributions from our residents. Please participate in the Glenview Recycling Program.

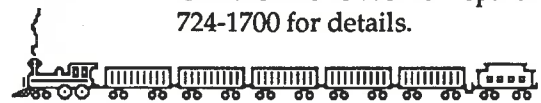


Christmas Tree Recycling

The Village of Glenview and the Glenview Park District will contribute to the recycling effort by collecting Christmas trees. Starting January 2, residents may place Christmas trees at the parkway to be picked-up by Village and Park District crews. The decorations and tree stands must be removed from the tree, as nails, plastics, and all other materials will damage the shredding equipment.

Trees can be placed at the curb at any point during the first portion of January, from the 2nd to the 10th. The crews will shred the trees for Park District use. **The trees will not be disposed of in landfills!** After January 12th, the trees will be collected by the regular refuse hauler, and unfortunately, will probably end up in landfills. Multifamily buildings will not be included in this year's test program for logistical reasons, but will be considered for next year's program.

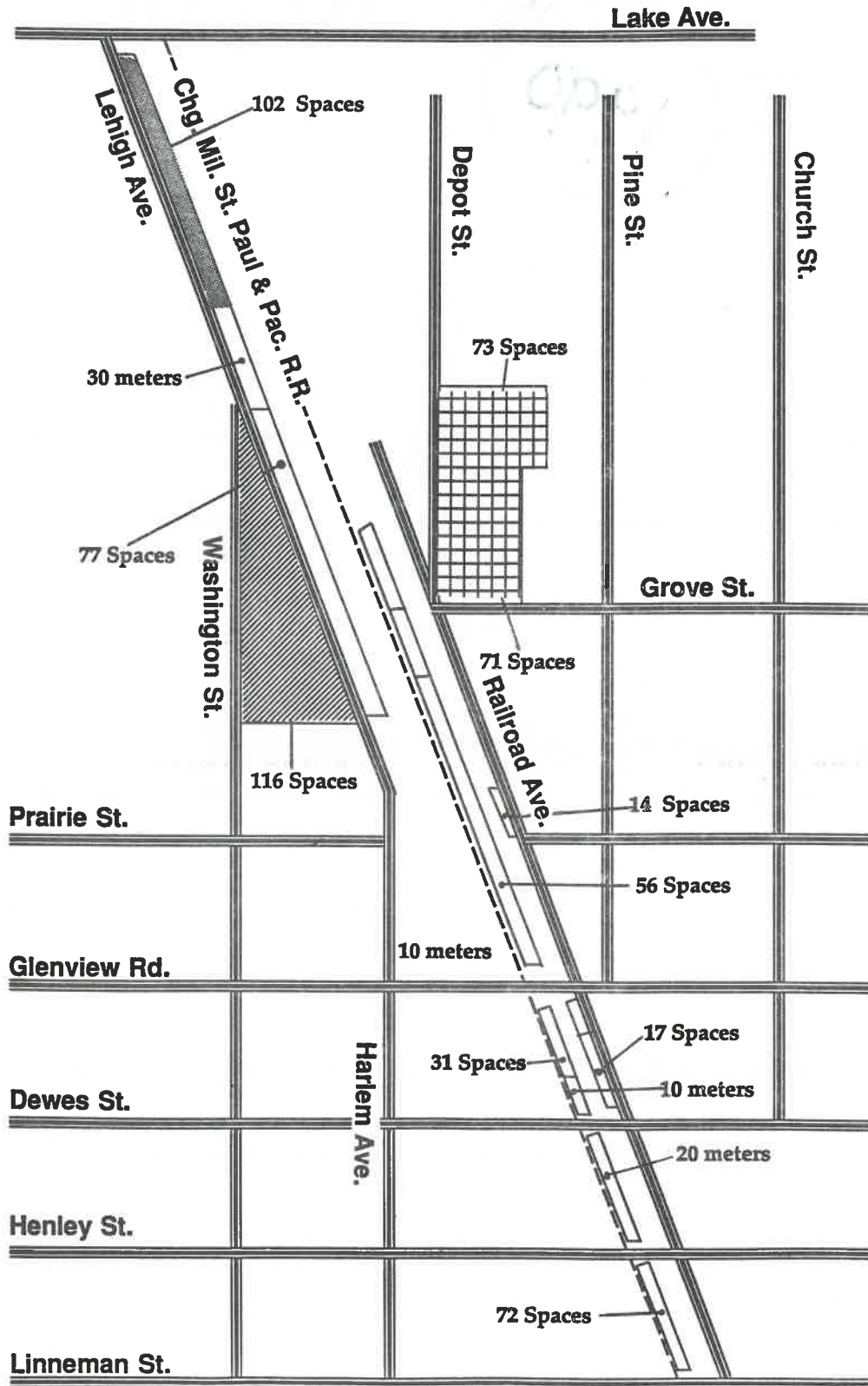
Avenue remains as free parking to Glenview residents with a valid vehicle sticker.

Also, the spaces just south of Lake Avenue along Lehigh Avenue, west of the railroad tracks (which was formerly 102 spaces reserved for free parking for Glenview residents only) is available for Glenview residents free of charge (with a valid vehicle sticker), and available to non-residents with a valid commuter parking sticker.

These commuter parking revisions are intended to create more equitable parking arrangements.

Senior News

The Village Senior Services Coordinator's office is located in the Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Road (lower level). The Coordinator is available Tuesday through Thursday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., for consultation with elderly residents and/or their families. For more information call 724-1700, Ext. 232. See the "Senior News" display in the Finance Department (upper level) for important literature.

You may qualify for the Illinois Residential Energy Assistance Partnership Program (R.E.A.P.P). Benefits vary, depending on household income and size, AFDC status and type of fuel used. Both electric and gas bills are covered by this program. The application must be made by the head of the household. A family member or friend may apply on behalf of a homebound person. To be eligible the gross income (before deductions) for the 30 days preceding the date of application must not exceed the following figures:

"Federal Food Stamp Program" is for low income persons even if not on Public Assistance. One person with cash assets less than \$2,000 and income no more than \$626 per month; or, two people (one must be over 60) with cash assets less than \$3,000 and monthly income of \$838 or less may qualify. Seniors who wish to apply contact Carol Karol at the Village Hall. Persons younger than 60 years old please contact your Township Office (Northfield 724-8300; Maine 297-2510; New Trier 446-8202; and Niles 673-9300) for assistance.

The I.D.O.A. "Community Care Program" provides in-home services with basic household and personal tasks for Seniors who strive to live independently in their homes or apartments. Eligibility is as follows: 1) Age 60 or older, 2) Physically in need of service, 3) Resident of Illinois and a U.S. Citizen or legal alien, 4) Countable assets are less than \$10,000 (single), \$20,000 (married couple). Other requirements can be explained by contacting the North Shore Senior Center at 446-8750. Ask for the counseling department.

Village Board Highlights . . .

Village Board meetings are held the first and third Tuesdays of each month, in the Village Hall, at 7:30 p.m. Residents are always welcome at the Board meetings. Those wanting to speak on agenda items may fill out cards at the door and hand them to the secretary; those wanting to speak on nonagenda items must make advance arrangements with the Village Manager's Office.

Approved the purchase of recycling bins from Lewis Systems, Watertown, Wis., in the amount of \$3.47 per unit, total cost of \$36,782.

Authorized purchase of 3 police squad cars by acceptance of State bid in the amount of \$13,566.30 each.

Instituted Commuter Parking Plaza changes described on pages 1 and 2 herein.

Imposed \$1,000 fine on Ace Disposal for violating municipal code regarding rate ceilings. Included in the penalty for unauthorized surcharges in 1988 and 1989, the Village Board required an audit of the financial records to determine which customers were charged the fee. The costs of the audit will be Ace Disposal's responsibility. Also, Ace was directed to refund the revenue collected, with 9% interest, to each affected customer.

Extended the Grove Moratorium to January 18, 1990.
