Snow removal on main roads done by state, county, village

When snow removal on certain arteries seems slow or inadequate this winter, please recall that the Village of Glenview is not responsible for all main thoroughfares within village limits.

The Glenview Public Works Department plows only Central Road, Chestnut Avenue, Glenview Road, Harten Avenue, Sherman Road, and Glenview side streets (except private roadways) — 105 miles in all.

Public Works has 32 vehicles equipped for snow removal, and each is used whenever snowfall reaches the 2-inch limit or whenever sleet/ice conditions warrant immediate attention. All Public Works employees, including office personnel, turn out for snow alerts. The village employs a weather prediction service, which phones the Public Works department whenever bad weather is on the way.

Each plow driver is given a book with a detailed set of maps for the area assigned, with private roads color-coded for exclusion.

The State of Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) is responsible for snow and ice removal on the following thoroughfares: Dearlove Road, Golf Road, Greenwood Road, Milwaukee Avenue, Pingstien Road north of Lake Avenue, Waukegan Road, West Lake Avenue (a small street running from the high school to the Naval Air Station), and Willow Road.

The Cook County Highway Department is responsible for snow and ice removal on Harms Road, Lake Avenue, Landwehr Road, Lehigh Avenue, Sunset Ridge Road, Wagner Road north of Glenview Road, and Winnetka Avenue.



Students invited to design 1989 Glenview vehicle sticker

Residents of Glenview who attend kindergarten through high school will vie for cash prizes by submitting designs for the local 1989 vehicle sticker.

First prize is \$100 cash, two runners-up receive \$25 each, and seven others will be awarded ribbons as symbols of meritorious work.

The first-prize winner will have the pleasure of seeing the winning design reproduced on windshields of all Glenview vehicles for an entire year. In addition, the design and the winner's photo will appear on the front page of this newsletter.

To enter, make a sketch of some facet of Glenview's community life. Keep in mind that June 20, 1989, will be Glenview's 90th birthday! Make sure your idea reflects a local event, landmark, or institution — for example, a school, a Forest Preserve trail, a government building, the Glenview Naval Air Station, our status as a Tree City USA, or anything else that appropriately represents Glenview.

Judging will be by a panel of Glenview residents, and the decisions of the panel will be final. If you have questions after reading the contest rules at right, call Matt Carlson, 724-1700.

NO PARKING is allowed on Glenview streets between 2 and 6am through March 31. Please warn out-of-town visitors of the restriction.

When it snows, village crews begin clearing during early-morning hours, and parked cars make the job nearly impossible. Even if no snow falls, the parking ban remains in effect, and violators may have vehicles towed at their own expense. *Out-of-state licenses do not exempt vehicles from the no-parking rule.*

Those with urgent needs for on-street overnight parking before April 1 should inform the Village Hall, in writing, stating their reasons.

PLEASE HELP KEEP GLENVIEW'S HYDRANTS clear of snow and ice this winter — your life may depend upon it! Be sure your address can be read *from the street*, so emergency services can find your house without delay. If that should be necessary, (Double check after each snowfall to make sure address is still readable *from the street*.)

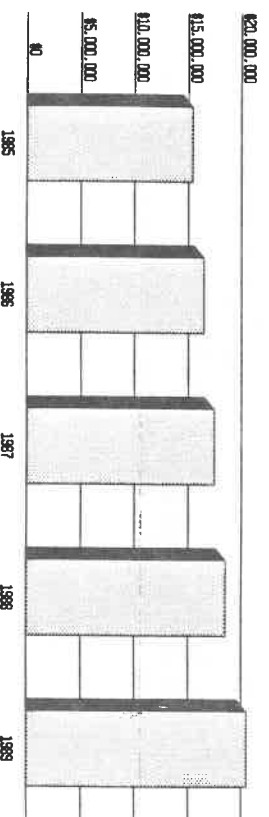
Glenview's 1989 budget

The Glenview 1989 budget totals \$20,504,634 — 10% higher than 1988.

The 1989 budget proposes no new or increased taxes. The growing tax base allows maintaining the Village Board's policy of a .65 real-estate tax rate. Other sources of revenue remain strong, and increased reserves during the new fiscal year are anticipated within the framework of a balanced budget.

Staff additions include one engineering aide, one maintenance-and-equipment operator, two police officers, and one public-safety officer. One part-time clerical position is upgraded to full-time

MEDICAID is a federal program to access health care for those over 65 and the disabled of any age with low incomes and assets. To qualify, your monthly income must not exceed \$267 for one, or \$333 for two, with assets of no more than \$1,900 (single) or \$2,850 (joint).

A major change is the one-year sump-pump inspection program, designed to eliminate storm water from the sanitary-sewer system, as required by the Metropolitan Sanitary District (a one-time expenditure of \$670,990 with no permanent staff additions), representing 3.3% of the entire budget.

A change in accounting rather than policy: creation of an Insurance Fund, to consolidate all insurance costs. (The village will spend \$1,454,000 in 1989 for all forms of insurance, which is \$63,000 less than in 1988.)

APPROVED: The 1989 village budget (see above); \$400,000 tax-exempt bond issue, for loan to Northwest Municipal Conference as Glenview's share of conference construction on Oakton Community College campus); Special Service Area 12 (Queen's Ln. water main, revised); sale of surplus village property (1979 ambulance, minimum of \$8,000); subdivision at 919 King's Lane; 2-Hour Parking and No Parking signs at Elm and Grove Sts.; Motor Fuel Tax fund appropriation (\$11,000) for improvements at the railroad crossing, 1800 block of Glenview Rd.; spending for necessary village equipment and maintenance. ... **ADOPTED:** 1984 BOCA Building, Mechanical, and Fire Prevention Codes. ... **AMENDED** the subdivision code regarding definitions of sewers, drainage ditches, retention basins, swales. ... **RE-ZONED** east side of Pickwick Lane, 141 feet south of West Lake Ave, R-8 to R-18, for townhouses. ... **ANNEXED:** 3428 Glenview Rd., zoned R-4 (residential); 1841 Wagner Rd., zoned R-2; Lake/Milwaukee Aves. intersection (B-2); southeast corner Willow and Sherman Rds., rezoned from R-1 (residential) to B-2 (general business), and granted conditional use (for food service) at 2691 Sherman.

Residents are always welcome at Village Board meetings. Those wanting to speak to agenda items may fill out cards at the door and hand to the secretary; those wanting to speak on nonagenda items please make advance arrangements by calling the Village Manager before the Tuesday preceding the meeting. Emergency matters always handled without prior arrangement — ask for recognition by the Village President when agenda items have been completed.
