In April, 1989 the Village will plant 605 trees on the parkways. This group of trees represents the largest tree planting the Village has ever undertaken. This will include plantings in established and newly constructed areas.

The trees planted in recently constructed areas are purchased by funds placed in escrow accounts by developers. In order to gain more control over the quality and selection of trees that go into areas with new homes, the Village staff plants trees for the developers as part of its own forestry program each spring.

Trees are planted only on public parkways, not in private yards. After trees are planted, the bills, including a 10% administrative fee which covers staff time and effort, are paid out of the escrow accounts. To date, the program has been successful in terms of the trees' appearance and vitality.

Almost all Village trees purchased since 1986 have come from Wilson's Nursery in Hampshire, Illinois under a contract with the Suburban Tree Consortium. Glenview joined the Consortium in

1986 along with LaGrange Park and Western Springs to insure a constant supply of quality parkway trees. After requesting bids, this consortium of communities can request the species and size of trees they want, and lock in prices for five years. Through some very strict specifications, the Village can get the highest quality trees at a guaranteed price.

The Consortium has grown from the original three members to include Elmhurst, Glendale Heights, Oak Park, Westmont, Berwyn, and Downer's Grove. An indication of the program's success has been a low loss rate -- less than four percent for each year of planting.

Glenview changed to a 100% Village-paid tree planting for trees on the public parkways in 1986. Previously, the Village shared the cost with the homeowner. There were two plantings - spring

and fall. Since there were not enough requests for trees to replace trees removed, it was decided to take over all of the cost of tree planting and plant as many trees as needed. The decision was also made to go to one large spring planting to concentrate efforts. Most trees can be planted in the spring. With this control over all aspects of planting, the Village staff can determine optimum tree placement.

Some trees are more tolerant of salt and other chemicals found on heavily traveled streets, while other trees thrive on the constantly watered parkways of homes with sprinkler systems. These and other factors are part of the decision made in the tree placement. While the forestry crews provide some watering and feeding support to the new trees, the homeowners are asked to show pride in their neighborhood by caring for the trees.

Glenview Receives 6th Consecutive Award

Glenview has received the highest award in financial reporting for the sixth consecutive year. Although awarded to a government, an Award of Financial Reporting Achievement is also given to the individual designated as primarily responsible for its having earned the certificate. This Award of Financial Reporting Achievement has been presented to Dennis M. Lauer, Director of Finance.

The report has been judged by an impartial panel to meet the high standards of the program. This includes demonstration of a constructive "spirit of full disclosure" effort to clearly communicate its financial story, and motivate potential persons

and user groups to read the report. There are currently 80 awards in Illinois out of over 3,000 eligible governmental bodies. In the United States and Canada, there are 969 of approximately 11,500 eligible entities. Public agencies in Texas have earned 155 awards, 113 in Florida, 94 in California, followed by the 80 in Illinois.

One direct benefit of holding a certificate is to help maintain a high bond rating (Standard and Poor's, Moody's), thereby lowering the cost of issuing bonds. The award also demonstrates Glenview's commitment to honest, open, and professional public service. Congratulations to Dennis and the entire Finance Department!

CASIMIR WHO?

You may have wondered why children did not attend school on Monday, March 6, 1989, and why many state and county offices were closed. The reason was to recognize "Pulaski Day", an official State holiday celebrated on the first Monday in March. This day was distinguished by the Illinois State Legislature to honor General Casimir Pulaski, a hero of the Revolutionary War.

Pulaski was born on March 4, 1747 in Poland. As a young man of 21, he fought the Russians as they invaded Poland in 1768. He had to flee for his life because of his activities and landed in Marseilles, France, where he met Benjamin Franklin. Pulaski volunteered his services to fight in the Revolutionary War, striving to preserve and protect freedom.

General George Washington recommended Pulaski, and Congress awarded him the commission of Brigadier General of the entire U.S. Cavalry in September 1777, after he distinguished himself at the Battle of Brandywine. Pulaski died on October 11, 1779 after being mortally wounded in trying to save the City of Savannah. In 1779, Congress voted that a monument be erected in his memory, and this was finally done in 1910 in Washington D.C. At Savannah, a monument was erected in 1853.

Today, throughout the U.S. there are various streets, schools, and monuments dedicated to Pulaski, who sacrificed his life for the goals of freedom and independence for all mankind.

Communities entering the program receive the Tree City USA designation upon recommendation by state foresters. Communities qualify by meeting the following standards: a city tree ordinance, a legal tree governing body, a comprehensive urban forestry program, and observance of Arbor Day.

Tree City communities receive a flag with the program's logo and a walnut-mounted plaque. Winners also receive Tree City USA signs with Maple leaf stickers to indicate additional qualifying years.

Notes from the Historical Society

It was a happy day when a former curator of the Glenview Area Historical Society, received an answer to her plea for an old bath tub in an antiques magazine in 1982. A couple in Lafayette, Indiana were crafty enough to have saved their 1903 stationary bathtub purchased at Sears, Roebuck & Co., "The Cheapest Supply House on Earth", for \$7.

The ad from the old catalog reads, "This tub is made of steel, is very strong and durable. Just the tub to make comfortable the home of those in moderate circumstances. No farm house is complete without the luxury of one of our bath tubs." The inside was coated with "insoluble' white enamel, capped with a polished oak rim, painted outside a Nile green, relieved with gold bronze." (It sounds almost like Cleopatra's barge, doesn't it?)

The tub had lost all its former glory. For many years it had been left in a barn in Lafayette, rusting away. Although inflation and 80 years of 'mellowing' had raised its price to \$75, the Society considered it a good bargain.

Research for restoring the tub was begun by the present curator of the Museum. The archives department of Sears was able to send a paint chip of Nile green, and the piece was transformed to its original state by a craftsman restorer.

The Society's next project is to locate a walnut, oak, or mahogony dining room table to buy, or borrow. Please call if you can help.
