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Transfer Station Approved . . . Recycling in 1990!

The Glenview Board of Trustees approved a proposal from Best Scavenger Service, Inc., 1912 Lehigh Ave., to build a transfer station/recycling center facility. This approval does not affect the Village's commitment to the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County Baillefill, however, the Best facility may serve as an interim waste disposal option until the Baillefill becomes operational.

As a result of granting site approval, the residential waste collection rates for Best's customers shall be frozen for a period of 2 years after the facility opens. The Village Board also placed several other conditions on the approval.

The facility must meet high standards of cleanliness. The interior of the facility must be washed daily. Overnight storage of waste is to be limited, and when necessary, the storage containers must be covered or enclosed at all times. Best Scavenger Service must also provide an insect and rodent control plan to the satisfaction of the Village.

The ordinance calls for stiff penalties for violating the conditions of approval. For example, using the facility to process hazardous materials is strictly prohibited. Violating this condition is cause for a \$10,000 per day fine and/or revocation of the siting approval. These penalties are in addition to any the Illinois or United States Environmental Protection Agency may levy.

There are also several financial benefits to the Village for granting Best's request. Best will provide waste collection services to all municipi-

pal buildings free of charge, thus saving taxpayer dollars. A surcharge will be placed on all waste collected by Best in areas outside the corporate limits of the Village. Best will also pay an annual host fee in the amount of \$130,000 to the Village. This revenue will offset the costs of a Village-wide recycling program.

The ordinance creates an ad hoc Recycling Advisory Committee. This committee, selected by Village President James W. Smirles, will recommend changes in the recycling program to the Village Board. The chairman of the committee will be retiring Trustee Scott J. Helton.

As proposed, the recycling program would be provided to all single family homes, with pickup of recyclable materials at the curb, and at no cost to Village residents. Because Glenview has a long tradition of back door refuse pickup, the Board expressed its intent to conduct the recycling program similarly.

The pilot recycling program will be used to test a variety of collection approaches, which will include back door service vs. curbside service, and a one bin collection system vs. a multiple bin collection system. The committee's task is to review the pilot program and suggest improvements to the Village Board. After the experiments end, the Board will determine the specifications of a recycling program for the entire community. At that time, it is anticipated that the program would be opened for bid.

It is too early to determine how the bid program would be paid for (partly because the final struc-

ture of the program is not defined, therefore the costs are not known), however the greatest portion of the cost would be offset by the host fee and surcharge revenue derived from the transfer station.

The recycling program in Glenview will be a cooperative effort between the residents, the Village, and the service provider (Best Scavenger Service). As part of its obligation, the Village will pass an ordinance which protects the recycling bins and materials from theft. Other communities have cited theft of the recycling materials as a problem with their programs. The Village will also participate in the public relations component of the program, however the lion's share of this work will be Best's responsibility.

Best will contact all homes participating in the program. Keep in mind that they represent the recycling program provided by the Village, not Best Scavenger Service. Best will also work with Glenview schools to promote recycling.

The resident's responsibility is very simple--that is to participate in the program. The waste disposal problem facing the nation will not correct itself. Costs to dispose of waste at landfills in the Chicago metropolitan area have, and will continue, to skyrocket. Recent events, such as the garbage barge floating aimlessly in the Atlantic Ocean, medical waste washing up on the country's beaches, and State mandates to reduce our stream of waste focus our attention to the crisis. Our task is to stimulate the solution, not contribute to the problem.

Notes from the Historical Society

A history of the Glenview area published by the Glenview Historical Society in 1974 as part of the celebration of the Village's Diamond Anniversary tells us that law and order came to Glenview in 1899 in the year of the Village's incorporation, and when the population was 325.

By 1919 the Village was a thriving farm community. The roads were filled with both horse drawn wagons and the new machine, the automobile, but it was not expected that the automobile would be more than a passing fancy. Gates were required at the railroad crossing to keep road traffic from stopping trains. An ordinance was passed requiring the licensing of vehicles and a penalty for failure to pay the fee.

In 1921 an ordinance regulated vehicle traffic on the streets of Glenview to correct what was becoming mass confusion resulting from citizens driving about as they pleased. The 1921 ordinance also changed the fees for vehicles. Fee for a one horse wagon for commercial use or hire was \$5.00, for a two horse vehicle for commercial use or hire, \$10.00, a motor bike or motor tricycle, \$5.00, a motor vehicle 35 horsepower or less, \$5.00, and for motor vehicles over 35 horsepower, the charge was \$10.00.

New squad cars were purchased in 1935, for \$425 each. Prior to 1935, all police officers bought their own uniforms, gun and other needs, including their own motorcycle! Two way police radio came into use in 1938. The "Paul Revere" system was used before radios were available. Officers were informed of a call for them by a light on the water tower. Upon receiving a call, the telephone operator would light the signal light and the officer would go to the nearest telephone to receive the message.

Today, the Village of Glenview is protected by one of the most sophisticated and competent police departments in the country, as proven by the recent award of accreditation earned by the department. Commonwealth Edison Responds to Charges

Al Wozniak, District Superintendent of Commonwealth Edison, addressed the Village Board on February 21, 1989, with regard to power outages frequenting Glenview. The average Glenview customer experiences an interruption, defined as service out for longer than 3 minutes, once every 8.7 months. According to Mr. Wozniak, the Commonwealth Edison System average for outages is once every 16 months.

Glenview's higher interruption rate was explained as being partial caused by the extreme heat in the summer of 1988, the need for system improvements, and trees interfering with power lines. If you experience an outage, please contact *Commonwealth Edison* to have power restored, at 729-7310, rather than the Glenview police or fire departments. *The Village cannot restore power, and such calls overload our telephone lines, which may prevent us from responding to an emergency we are capable of addressing.*

However, in an effort to monitor this problem, the Village is keeping "log" of power outages that occur. Please contact the police department dispatchers at the non-emergency number, 729-5000, with the details of the outage, i.e., when did it start, when did it end, and were there any possible circumstances that may explain the outage.

Construction Schedule Announced

Now that winter has left us behind for another year, our "other" season is rapidly approaching: **CONSTRUCTION**. What follows is a listing of major construction projects slated for the Village in 1989.

Maplewood Lane Reconstruction

This project involves the total replacement of the pavement, installation of curbs, public sidewalk, sanitary sewer replacement, new water valves, hydrants and area restoration.

Greenwood Ave. Reconstruction

The location of this project is in the Willows subdivision and it runs north from Winnetka Rd. to the north Village limits. It consists of removal and replacement of the existing pavement as well as some curbing and sidewalk repairs.

Burr Oak/Mickey Lane Reconstruction

As part of this project the existing deteriorated pavement will be removed and replaced with curbing and a new asphalt pavement. Storm sewers (partially financed by a special service area) will also be installed as part of this improvement.

Waukegan Rd. - Willow Rd. to Winnetka Rd.

This project is being done under the auspices of the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT). It consists of widening and improving with curbs and gutters, Waukegan Rd. in the above referenced area. Modified drainage and vastly improved traffic and pedestrian safety at the intersection of Waukegan and Winnetka Rd. should result as left turn lanes and arrows are scheduled to be installed at this intersection. Construction is already underway and is slated for completion by November of 1989.

Monroe/Jefferson Special Service Area

Sanitary sewer and Village water are proposed for installation in the Monroe/Jefferson/Rogers area. This project is to be financed by the benefiting property owners via a special service area.

Queens Lane Water Main

The installation of Village water is proposed for Queens Lane residents. This project is also financed using the special service area financing mechanism.
