The Village of Glenview was incorporated on June 20, 1899. At the time of incorporation, the Village had a population of 325. The area was predominantly agricultural, its main claim to fame being a stop on the Milwaukee Railroad. Today, ninety years later, Glenview has a population in excess of 36,000, and growing! The Village has developed into an ideal mix of fine residential and campus-like corporate areas. Happy Birthday Glenview!

NWMC Auction Proves Profitable

On Saturday, May 6, 1989 the Northwest Municipal Conference held its Spring Auction at Evanston's City garage. The Village of Glenview offered vehicles at the auction and all sold for amounts over the minimum expectations. Subtracting a ten percent auctioneer fee produced a net revenue figure from the auction of \$11,880.

It has been the Village's policy to dispose of used cars, and small trucks by selling them at the NWMC auction. These auctions are usually held three times a year: one in the spring, one in summer, one in the fall. Any governmental body within the conference is eligible to participate.

The Conference contracts with the auctioneer and sets up the place for the auction. Municipalities volunteer their facilities in exchange for the conference's waiving of the 10% fee that each participating municipality is assessed to pay for the auctioneer.

There are several reasons why Glenview has continued to sell used equipment this way as opposed to trading it in or advertising and selling it by sealed bid. The three auctions fall at convenient times of the year in terms of the arrival of new equipment. Also, the prices

received at the auction are generally higher than trade-in allowances offered by dealers.

Glenview vehicles are replaced when the Capital Equipment Replacement Program specifies regardless of the mileage. For example, police patrol cars are replaced every two years. Because the appearance of the vehicles is very good, they get very good results at the auction. The fine maintenance record of the Glenview vehicles also contributes to the excellent results.

Glenview's reputation is so good, in fact, that several businesses send people specifically to bid on Glenview vehicles. These include cab companies, delivery companies, and construction companies. In addition, there are also some individuals who just want a good car for personal use.

The Village only sells cars, pick-up trucks and one-ton dump trucks at the auction. The 2 1/2 ton dump trucks and the specialized equipment such as tractors, compressors, chippers and stump grinders are usually sold by advertisement for sealed bids. Since the market is more limited for these items, the bid process is the more successful method of disposing of the Village's surplus property.

Whatever method used, the process of selling begins when the Board of Trustees passes an ordinance. By state law, any equipment to be sold must first be declared surplus. The minimum bid price is determined by checking the "blue book" price for the vehicles for sale. Normally, this minimum is set lower since the auctioneer will not sell the vehicle for less than the minimum, and the intention is to "dispose of" the property, not bring it back to the Village.

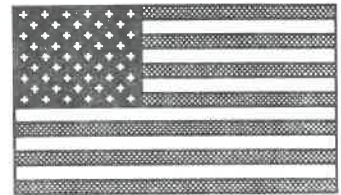

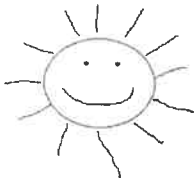
