Marathon Submits Annexation Petition

Marathon U.S. Realties, Incorporated, a Delaware corporation, and an affiliate of the Canadian Pacific Limited recently submitted a petition to the Village of Glenview requesting annexation and rezoning of approximately 306 acres of land located at the southwest corner of Willow and Waukegan Roads.

The current owner of the land is the Missionary Sisters Servants of the Holy Spirit. Marathon intends to purchase 286 acres of the land from the Sisters; the remaining 20 acres will be retained by the Sisters. In turn, Marathon will sell approximately 24 acres of its 286 acres to Lutheran General Health Care System.

The proposal stipulates that the 20 acres to be retained by the Sisters would be zoned R-1, Residential District, for continuation of its current uses. The 24 acres to be owned by Lutheran General would be zoned as a Planned Development for a Continuing Care Retirement Community.

Marathon states the Retirement Community will combine independent, assisted and licensed care functions in one facility. The Retirement Community would contain 350 independent living apartments, 56 independent living townhomes, a 56-bed licensed skilled care facility, and a 56-bed assisted care living facility. The independent living apartments and the independent living townhomes are designed to provide housing for those elderly persons not requiring any special medical care. The assisted care living facility is designed to provide housing and care for those persons requiring nonmedical assistance on

a limited basis. The licensed skilled care facility is designed to provide medical care to those persons requiring daily medical attention up to the level of acute care.

Also under Marathon's proposal, 197 of the remaining 262 acres would be zoned as an I-1 Limited Commercial District for an office subdivision. The "North Shore Corporate Park" as proposed, contains a maximum of 37 lots, with the smallest lot size being 3 acres. The park would contain corporate office buildings, research and development facilities, and high-end industrial buildings. The design submitted shows development of up to 4.5 million square feet of improvements on 262.15 acres, for an approximate Floor Area Ratio of 0.394.

The remaining 65 acres of land would be zoned P-1 Public Lands District. This land would continue to be used as a storm water retention basin in accordance with Metropolitan Water Reclamation District requirements.

Marathon is projecting a 10-year development schedule for completion of its project. If the Village approves the project, site improvements are targeted to begin in late 1989 and initial building construction is projected for Fall 1990. Lutheran General is targeting a 1990 construction start-up. Marathon estimates that at full build-out, the office park would generate approximately \$3,688,000 in additional property tax revenues to the Village, approximately \$7,172,000, \$3,167,000 and \$7,623,000 in tax revenue for School Districts 30, 34, and 225, respectively, and approximately \$1,739,000

in property tax revenue for the Glenview Park District.

In addition, the proposal states the Lutheran General project would generate approximately \$150,400 in additional property tax revenues to the Village, approximately \$416,000 and \$332,000 in positive fiscal impact to School Districts 34 and 225, respectively, and approximately \$73,800 in tax revenue for the Glenview Park District.

Marathon estimates the entire project, at full build-out, would generate annual property tax revenue increases as follows:

District #225: \$7,955,000 District #30: \$7,172,000

Village of Glenview: \$3,838,400

District #34: \$3,583,000

Glenview Park District: \$1,812,800

The above figures are "net" for the park and school districts since these jurisdictions would not be providing services to the proposed development. Conversely, the Village figure is a "gross" number since it would be responsible for the direct delivery of municipal services.

By comparison, the Village will collect a total of \$4.3 million in 1989 property tax revenue from all Village properties combined. The property tax revenue Marathon suggests will be generated would represent an 89% "increase" in the Village's property tax base.
