EPA booklets mailed to water customers

Every resident who receives a water bill should have also received a booklet published by the EPA (U.S. Environmental Protection Agency) regarding health risks of lead in drinking water.

While the Glenview water supply is lead-free, the substance may be present in tap water because of lead pipe in old buildings or solder used in private plumbing systems.

Fetuses of pregnant women, infants, and young children are especially susceptible to lead poisoning.

Please read the booklet, and if you have questions or want more information, call the Glenview Water Department, 724-1700, X 245, or the EPA toll-free hotline, 1-800-426-4791.

The water department asks residents to compare water-meter readings inside homes to those on the remote readers. If there is a discrepancy, please call the water department immediately so the error can be corrected.

Where meters are read through glass blocks or window wells, please keep them clean and unobstructed.

Special performances include the Jesse White Tumblers, the Roberto Clemente High School Steel Band, marching bands, and country-and-western music.

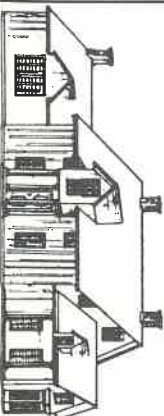

Summer street-repair projects

Street repairs for this season, some financed by local Motor Fuel Tax funds, are as follows:

Maplewood Lane: Reconstruction from Waukegan Road to 500 feet east. Work includes replacement of pavement, curbs, gutters, sanitary sewer, and water main.

Prairie Street: Reconstruction between Elm and Roosevelt, including replacement of sanitary and storm sewers and water main.

Winnetka Road: Reconstruction between Greenwood and Pingsten Roads. Sidewalks will be removed and replaced as necessary.

Wildwood Terrace, a new street, will be constructed between Glenwood and Woodlawn, funded by contributions from developers and homeowners in the area.

Raleigh Road and **Vernon Drive** will be resurfaced north of Glenview Road, and sidewalks will be repaired as necessary.

1988-89 vehicle, pet licenses now on sale

Applications for village vehicle stickers and pet licenses have been mailed to residents who bought them for 1987-88. New residents (or car/pet owners) may get theirs at the Finance Office, Glenview Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Rd. (upper level).

New stickers and pet tags must be displayed no later than midnight June 30.

To avoid a last-minute rush, please mail forms back with checks as soon as possible, or drop them in the postage-free box at the Village Hall. Penalties apply after July 1, and added penalties after August 1.

The new vehicle sticker, shown at left, won first prize in this year's design contest. (Winners and prizes will be announced in the next newsletter.)

Bids for work on Waukegan Road between Winnetka and Willow Roads sponsored by the Illinois Department of Transportation, the Village of Glenview, and the Village of Northfield) will be taken this summer, pending acquisition of property, and will include widening, resurfacing, addition of a median strip and left-turn lanes at the Winnetka Road intersection, sidewalk, curbs, gutters, and tree planting. Street improvements are determined annually by the engineering department's pavement-evaluation procedure. A truck equipped with lasers and computers measures pavement contours and records the number and size of cracks.

At the same time, a process called "dynamic loading" puts down weights to test the pavement's capacity to support traffic. (Every 5 years an outside consultant is hired to evaluate street conditions throughout the village by means of a computer modeling system.)

What are "Senior Citizens"?

Senior Citizens are people who were here before the pill, television, polio vaccine and antibiotics, Frisbees, nylon, Dacron, Xerox, Kinsey Reports, radar, fluorescent lights, credit cards, pantyhose, microwave ovens, and ball-point pens.

When they were young there were only 48 states. Grocery stores didn't carry yogurt or frozen foods, but they did have ice cream that was packed by hand (Oh boy, was it *good!*) and Eskimo Pies. They hadn't yet heard of pizza or "ethnic cuisine," but they found chow mein and chop suey plenty exotic.

Time-sharing meant togetherness, not computers or vacation condos. A chip was a hunk of wood, hardware was nails and doorknobs, and software was diapers.

They got along without electric blankets, air conditioning, dishwashers, clothes dryers, tanning salons, and freezers. They got married first and lived together afterwards, usually forever.

Closets were for clothes, not coming out of; bunnies were little rabbits, and rabbits weren't cars. Frank Sinatra was a skinny kid who probably wouldn't make it in show business.

Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer, Snoopy, and Disneyland didn't exist. Washington D.C. didn't have a Jefferson Memorial, and the Empire State Building was the tallest in the world.

Girls wore skirts and Peter Pan collars. (Cleavage was something butchers did with raw meat.) Fast food was eaten only in Lent, and McDonald was a farmer in a song. Jet was grandmother's buttons and jewelry—not a set, plane, or magazine. Fresh air was all around, natural, unfiltered, unprocessed, and free. It smelled nice. (Rain was nice, too—just soft water, no acid.)

Cigarettes were sort of wicked (but awfully sophisticated, and probably wouldn't kill you, no matter what your mother said), grass was for mowing, pot was what food was cooked in, and Coke was the pause that refreshes. Tape was what mothers sewed on clothes before kids went to camp.

Radio was either crystal sets or super-hetrodyne, not AM or FM. Word processing was done with a lead pencil. In school they taught geography, history, spelling, and arithmetic, and the girls wore gym bloomers. The boys wore knickers and had coaster wagons and paper routes.

Grown-ups were Mr., Mrs., or Miss, and no one knew about ERA, IUDs, UFOs, or AIDS.

Senior Citizens are a hardy group, having survived change and loved every decade of it. They're not weak because they're old—they're old because they're strong. And they'll be around for a long time yet.

If today's young people are both very careful and very lucky, they may eventually become Senior Citizens. (Good luck to them—it's harder now than it used to be!)
