Glenview's 1988 tax levy set

The estimated village tax levy for 1988 is \$4,487,462. When extended and abated, the estimated net levy request will be \$3,089,037.

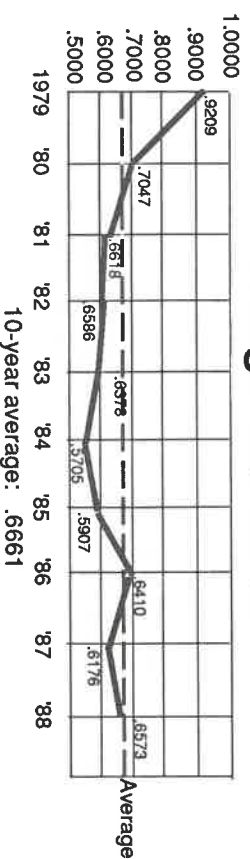
The levy produces an estimated tax of .6573, compared to .6176 the previous year, consistent with Glenview's policy of keeping the village rate as close as possible to .65 (see graphic below).

Cook County now separates levies of villages and public libraries. Accordingly, Glenview will abate its debt-service levy for payments on

library expansion bonds, and transfer funds to the village debt service to cover the abatement.

The library's tax levy request for 1988 is \$1,774,255, which computes to an extended levy of \$1,827,484 and produces a rate of .3888, about one cent lower than the previous year.

Glenview's net worth is now estimated at \$470,000,000, vs. \$419,000,000 for the previous year, an increase due to annexations and reassessment of Maine and Niles Township this year.



Note: 1979-83 include library IMRF (subsequent years adjusted). Rate for '88 is estimated. The 1979 rate distorts the average because of inclusion of a deficiency levy and the last year of library parking-lot bonds. Average rate for 1980-88 is .6378.

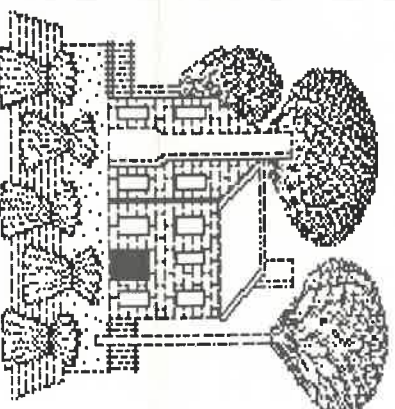

Grove Folk Fest to be held October 2

The tenth annual Grove Folk Fest, celebrating 19th-century life in Glenview, takes place Sunday, Oct. 2, noon to 5pm, at The Grove, Glenview's 82-acre nature center and National Historic Landmark, 1421 Milwaukee Avenue.

Cosponsored by the Glenview Park District and The Grove Heritage Association, the festival re-creates rural life 150 years ago on the original homestead of the pioneer Kennicott Family. Highlights include live music, demonstrations of pioneer skills and crafts, hearty picnic foods, children's programs, square dancing, nature walks, historical programs, and tours of Kennicott House.

Sample "classes" will be conducted in the 1853 Grove School House, and demonstrations of candle making, spinning, quilting, weaving, canoe making, and gunsmithing will take place in the meadows.

Other attractions include an Indian powwow, storytellers, and sale of handicrafts to benefit The Grove. Admission is free; parking is \$2.
