year. he recently adopted 1987 budget of the Village of Glenview, totaling \$17,454,832, is a fiscal blueprint of village operations for the coming

The total includes corporate, pension, water/sewer, library, and debt service funds, and represents an increase of \$926,243 (5.6%) over 1986.

Because you, as residents, are municipality shareholders, you are entitled to a yearly synopsis of revenues, expenditures, a yearly synopsis of tures, and activities.

Of particular interest is the Corporate Fund, which finances basic village services — public works, fire, police, development, and finance.

### Revenue

1987 Corporate Fund revenues are projected at \$10.1 million — an increase of \$800,000 over 1986, due to overall village growth in sales, utilities, properties, and the state income tax.

Sales taxes, Glenview's largest contributor to the Corporate Fund, are expected to rise from \$2.5 million in 1986 to \$2.8 in 1987 — 40% from automobiles, 18% from retail food.

Utility taxes, projected at \$2.2 million for 1987, will show an increase of \$200,000 over 1986.

fixed tax rate, revenue grows because of higher assessed property valuation.

The hotel tax (5%) accounted for \$69,000 in 1986. The projection for 1987 is \$134.000. As more hotels are built this revenue will increase.


The 1987 budget transfers approximately \$400,000 of Corporate Fund revenue to a **Reserve Fund**, the first installment of a 5-year plan to replenish village reserves. the first to replen-

At the end of 5 years the reserve balance will be approximately \$2.5 million, which will serve as insurance against fluctuations or delays in tax revenues, monetary judgments, natural disasters, and other fiscal contingen-

one part-time senior services coordinator. Finally, in 1987 Glenview will draft a Comprehensive Plan, to record existing land uses, identify annexation and land-use issues, and serve as a guide for future development. The 1987 budget covers costs involved in setting up plan.

# Ground broken; senior housing under way

G lenview's 5-story, \$4.3 million senior housing complex is scheduled to open in January of 1988. It will contain 80 dwelling units, the majority facing an interior courtyard and recreation area.

Because construction is federally financed under Section 202 of HUD (Housing and Urban Development), no profits can be derived from rents and operation of the facility.

Self-sufficient adults 62 and older and handicapped adults 18 and older will be eligible as tenants. Those subsidized under Section 8 will pay no more than 30% of annual income. Rent will include heat, water, and sewer. Those interested in being on the information list may call the Village Manager's office, 724-1700.


