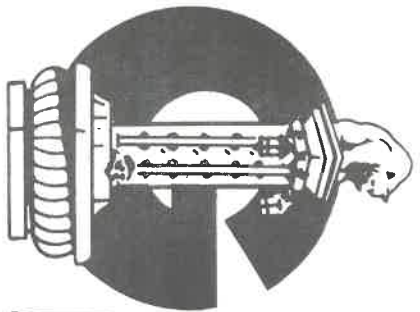

Theft-Guard — use it to protect your property

The Glenview Police Department reminds residents that Theft-Guard ("Operation Identification") has proved to be an effective deterrent to burglary.

Even if property is stolen, Theft-Guard makes it possible for police to return it when recovered. Unmarked property is held and finally sold at auction, because there is no way of returning it.

Here's how Theft-Guard works: You borrow an engraving tool, free, at the Police Department, and inscribe your name and driver's license number (*not* your Social Security number, as police have no access to the federal files for Social Security) on stereos, cameras, VCRs, sports gear, and other expensive equipment.

The tool is easy and safe to use, as it "writes" like an ordinary pen, etching metal and other hard surfaces.

When you return the engraver, police will give you stickers for your doors reading, "This property is protected by Project Theft-Guard." The stickers serve notice that burglars will have a hard time fencing goods so plainly identified. (If the property should be stolen, police will be able to return it promptly upon recovery.)

LOCAL ELECTION CALENDAR:

Election day, April 7, falls during the spring school holidays. Those who will be away at that time should **apply now for Absentee Ballots, or vote in person** at the Village Hall or County Clerk's office between March 16 and April 6, 9am-5pm weekdays (9am-noon Saturdays at the County Clerk's office only).

Applications for mailed Absentee Ballots must be returned to the County Clerk's office no later than April 2, and the voted Absentee Ballots must be returned to the County Clerk on or before April 6.

Referendum to decide status of clerk position

The question of whether the office of Village Clerk shall be appointive or elective will be placed before Glenview voters at the April 7 Consolidated General Election. The Village Board approved placing the question on the ballot at its January 20 meeting.

The position of Village Clerk is currently an elected office carrying a 4-year term. If the referendum is approved by voters on April 7, the Village Clerk will be **appointed** for 4 years by the Village President with the approval of the Board of Trustees.

The duties of Village Clerk include recording and transcribing minutes of Village Board meetings, holding the corporate seal, preserving village papers, attesting to and certifying licenses and other legal documents, notifying board members of special meetings and appointments, and administering village elections.

Current Village Clerk Katherine G. Apert supports the referendum, noting that, as most of these duties and responsibilities are already handled by village staffers, making the Village Clerk an appointive rather than an elective position will not burden the staff or create a new position.

Village supports NWMC waste-disposal plan

Glenview has declared its strong support for a Northwest Municipal Conference solid-waste management plan to establish a short-term sanitary landfill in Cook County.

The problem of solid-waste disposal is acute in the north and northwest county area, where 2 major disposal facilities have closed since 1983 and the last (the landfill on Willow Road in Techny) is scheduled to close within the next 18 months.

A new disposal site must be developed now, as further delay will certainly mean continued steep cost increases and disruptions in garbage-disposal service.

Moreover, the new site must be properly designed and operated in order to avoid negative environmental impact.

A cooperative effort among the 38 local governments represented by the NWMC is the only answer to this perplexing problem. The NWMC proposal for a short-term landfill will aid preparations for the future by using the facility's revenue to promote recycling and resource-recovery technologies.

Glenview is urging the Cook County Zoning Board of Appeals and the Cook County Commissioners to approve the NWMC petition for a short-term sanitary landfill.

Dogs and parks

Flick Park running paths are plagued by dog droppings — not only a nuisance but a public health hazard. Residents bordering the park report large dogs running loose on and near their properties.

Dog owners are reminded that Glenview has both leash and excremet-removal laws: Dogs may not run loose except on owners' properties; dogs walkers must carry and use the means of picking up and removing animal droppings.

Residents who do not obey these laws are prosecuted when identified. Dogs running loose are picked up by the Animal Control Warden and sent to a kennel awaiting identification, then (if not identified) turned over to animal shelters for adoption or euthanasia.
