Water rates up slightly as of April 1 Insurance HELP

Glenview's water rates are up .07¢ per thousand gallons for both village water systems. The increase covers cost of buying water from the Village of Wilmette. Please note that sewer rates are unchanged. Customers now pay as follows:

**For water and sewer, inside vil-
lage, East System:** \$1.87/thousand
gallons for water; 50¢/thousand gallons
for sewer; minimum \$16.59/quarter.

**For water only, inside village, East
System:** \$1.87/thousand gallons; mini-
mum \$13.09/quarter.

**For water only, inside village, West
System:** \$2.29/thousand gallons; mini-
mum \$16.03/quarter.

**For water and sewer, inside vil-
lage, West System:** \$2.29/thousand for
water; 50¢/thousand gallons for sewer;
minimum \$19.53/quarter.

**For water and sewer, inside vil-
lage, West System and Winnetka-
Shermer Sewer System:** \$2.39/thou-
sand gallons for water; minimum
\$16.73/quarter; \$2.50/quarter for sew-
er.

**For water only, outside village,
West System:** \$3.34/thousand gallons;
minimum \$23.38/quarter.

Fire Dept. programs

FIRST AID for adults, a basic course for novice rescuers covering care and treatment of fractures, cold and heat emergencies, poisoning, bleeding, and heart attack, will be taught Thursday, April 16, 7 to 9pm, by paramedics at the Fire Station, 1815 Glenview Rd.

On Saturday, May 16, the Fire Department's **BABYSITTER CLASS** for ages 9-19 will be held from 9am to 2:30pm, teaching basic CPR, First Aid, fire safety, home security, and accident prevention.

PS: The Fire Department also offers First Aid courses to local organizations and businesses. To arrange for sessions please call 724-2141. If you have questions about fire safety, or would like a home-inspection visit from a Fire Department representative to assist in preparing a fire-exit plan or locate smoke detectors, please call the same number. (Fire personnel will mount detectors for homeowners who are physically incapable of doing it themselves.)

**For water and sewer, outside vil-
lage, West System:** \$3.34/thousand
gallons for water; 50¢/thousand gallons
for sewer; minimum \$26.88/quarter.

WE'RE SORRY there was a type-
setter's error in the telephone num-
ber for **DIAL** printed here last
month. The correct information on
the new Illinois gas-station law for
handicapped drivers:

Attendants at gas stations with
both full-serve and self-serve pumps
are required to pump gas at self-
serve pumps for customers with
state handicapped plates or
disability cards from the Secretary
of State. Attendants are not re-
quired to give service other than
gas pumping. **Self-serve-only sta-
tions** (those having only cashiers
inside and no outside attendants) are
exempt from the law. The correct
DIAL (Disabled Individuals' Assis-
tance Line) number to report non-
compliance is 1-800-233-3425.

Glenview has solved its municipal in-
surance problems by joining 12 other
communities in a High-Level Excess
Liability Pool (HELP, for short).

Other villages currently participat-
ing are Arlington Heights, Deerfield,
Des Plaines, Elk Grove Village, Lin-
colnshire, Mount Prospect, Oak Lawn,
Park Ridge, Skokie, Streamwood,
Wheaton, and Winnetka. At press
time Wilmette was also considering
membership.

Coverage begins at \$1 million ex-
cess over \$1 million primary, increas-
ing to \$5 million by the end of the
first year. Glenview's first-year pre-
mium is \$60,024, half of which has
already been paid.

Glenview Finance Director Dennis
Lauer points out that HELP compares
very favorably with our current \$1
million excess policy costing \$69,000,
which remains at the same coverage
level. (The current policy can be
canceled on or after March 31, 1987,
without penalty.)

Solicitors legal when registered --- hours limited to 9am - 9pm

Some residents have requested that
door-to-door soliciting and canvassing
be banned in Glenview. That is im-
possible, because the right to solicit is
protected by the Constitution.

Before going door-to-door, solici-
tors must register at the Village Hall,
stating names of the business and all
persons involved in solicitation, ad-
dress of the sponsor, purpose of the
canvass, and approximate dates and
times of activity. Commercial soli-
citors must submit photos and finger-
prints. ID cards are issued.

Canvassers must show ID cards
upon request, to prove they have
registered with the village.

To comply with a recent ruling of

the Supreme Court, the Village Board
has been required to extend the hours
for door-to-door solicitation from 9am
to 9pm.

If you do not want solicitors to
call on you, please post the "NO SO-
LICITORS" sign printed here. If it is
posted and clearly visible, solicitors
are required to leave the premises
promptly without knocking or ringing.
Failure to do so makes them subject
to a fine of up to \$500.

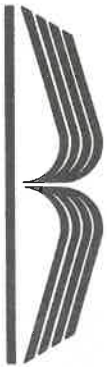
Glenview residents must help police
enforce the solicitation ordinance. Vio-
lations should be reported to police on
line 729-5000. Reports will be kept on
file and used if the solicitor asks for
permit renewal or if disciplinary ac-
tion must be taken.

Police warn of spring confidence rackets

Especially during spring and summer months, swindlers play confidence games by offering home improvements at "bargain" rates.

Beware of someone who comes to the door selling a cheap blackout job for your driveway. It might be done with used crankcase oil that glistens but never dries.

Beware of unsolicited offers of roof, chimney, or furnace repairs. **Do not let strangers into your home to "check."** They may damage your property themselves, then try to sell you expensive repairs.

When you need home repairs or improvements:

- **Get bids from contractors with established business addresses.** It takes about 3 years for a contractor to establish a financially sound business and a good reputation with banks and suppliers.

- **Ask for names and addresses of satisfied local customers, and call or visit at least one.** Check with the Chamber of Commerce or the Better Business Bureau if you have doubts or questions.

- **Check with the Building Department, 724-1700, to find out what licenses and permits are needed.** Make sure the contractor you pick is licensed to work in Glenview and has both workers' compensation and general liability insurance. (If not, you could be liable for any job-related accidents.)

- **Don't be rushed.** Discuss carefully and get a written agreement before the work begins.

Older people and women who live alone should be especially wary — con men consider them the easiest marks. Seniors should remember that the Senior Center offers simple repair jobs at reasonable rates through its "Handyman" program. Call 724-4793.

IF YOU ARE CALLED or visited by someone claiming to be a bank examiner or a police officer, BEWARE — you've been chosen to lose your life savings. The caller will ask you to withdraw money from your bank and give it to him (or her) to hold while the honesty of bank officials is being "investigated." (You'll be given a place and time to meet the thieves and turn over your money.) **Call police (729-5000) immediately and report all the details — the detectives will take it from there.**

IF YOU ARE ASKED to put up "earnest money" by someone claiming to have just found a large amount of cash, BEWARE AGAIN. This is one of the oldest con games in the world, known as the Pigeon Drop, the Gypsy Doodle, or the Found-Wallet trick. The stranger offers to share the loot with you; you put your earnest money in an envelope (package, scarf, or handkerchief) to be held by a third person "stranger" (actually an accomplice of the racketeer). The money is switched, and you end up with nothing but a pack of cut-up newspapers. **Don't bite on this old chestnut!** (Unfortunately, people still do, right here in the north suburbs.) **If you are approached, excuse yourself immediately, find the nearest phone, and call police.**

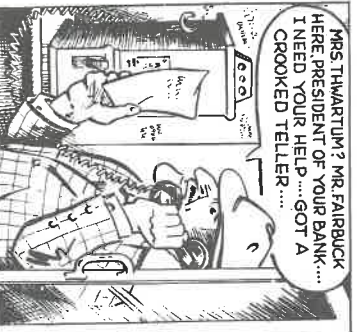
