School Crossing Guards are important employees of the Glenview Police Department — men and women who protect children by controlling traffic at the intersections most used by pupils going to and from school.

Because it would be economically impossible for the village to employ enough police officers to handle these tasks every school day, School Crossing Guards are deputized to fill the jobs. Compensation is \$5.25 an hour for 15 or 20 hours a week, depending upon the intersection assigned.

Air station marks its Golden Year

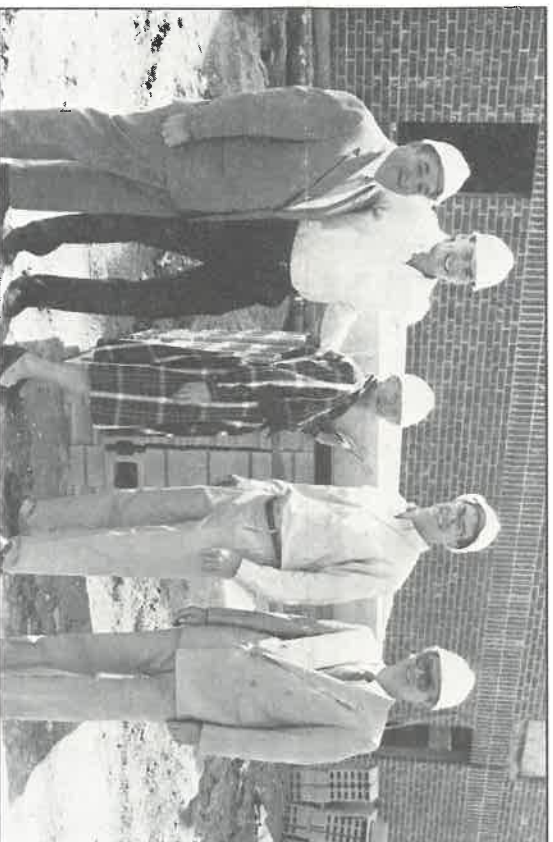
The Glenview Naval Air Station is celebrating its Golden (50th) Anniversary this year.

Lottery to choose original residents of Patten House retirement center

Applications for Patten House residency must be submitted no later than Monday, August 17. After that date, those who have applied will be evaluated for eligibility, according to federal (HUD) guidelines.

Forms are available at the Village Hall and the leasing office in Olympia Center (Glenview Road and Harlem Avenue, across from the new structure).

The first residents of Patten House will be chosen by public lottery on Saturday, August 22, at 10am, in the board room of the Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Road.

Applicants need not be present at the drawing — those not in attendance will be notified by mail if they are chosen.

Eligible applicants not chosen by lottery on August 22 will be placed on the waiting list for future vacancies.

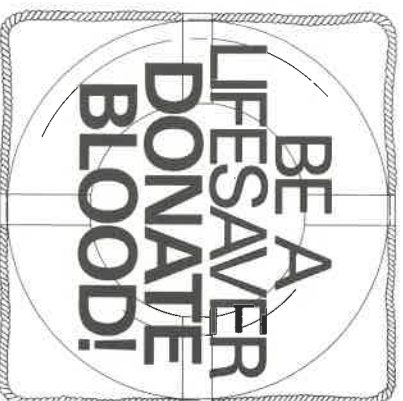

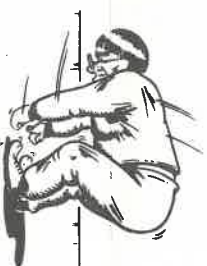
