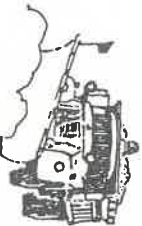

No parking is allowed on village streets between 2 and 6am. Please warn family members and guests of the restriction, which is in effect through March 31, 1986.

The reason for prohibiting overnight parking: When it snows, village crews begin clearing streets in the early morning hours, and parked cars make the job impossible.

Even if no snow falls during the night, the parking ban remains in effect, and cars may be towed if found violating the village ordinance (Ord. #2260, posted on all major thoroughfares entering Glenview).

If you need off-street parking for house guests during the holidays, please make arrangements as soon as possible. An out-of-state license will not excuse a motorist from obeying Glenview's winter no-parking rule.



RESIDENTS ARE RESPONSIBLE for prompt removal of snow and ice from sidewalks adjacent to their homes. Make sure you have a serviceable snow shovel or blower and a supply of ice-melting compound on hand throughout the season. Remember that mail carriers, children and senior adults use the sidewalks every day during the winter months. Please make it safe for them to do so.

DO NOT SHOVEL, BLOW OR PLOW SNOW onto any part of a public street or sidewalk. Instruct those hired for snow removal that it is illegal in Glenview to cover or block a public thoroughfare with snow. Such blockage creates hazards for both pedestrians and motorists.

The life it saves may be your own

Though the ladder of Glenview's new aerial truck is 105 feet above ground when fully extended, its height is not as important as its reach.

"Lateral reach is what we need," says Fire Lt. Norm Johnson, "and the new ladder truck gives us maneuverability we've never had before."

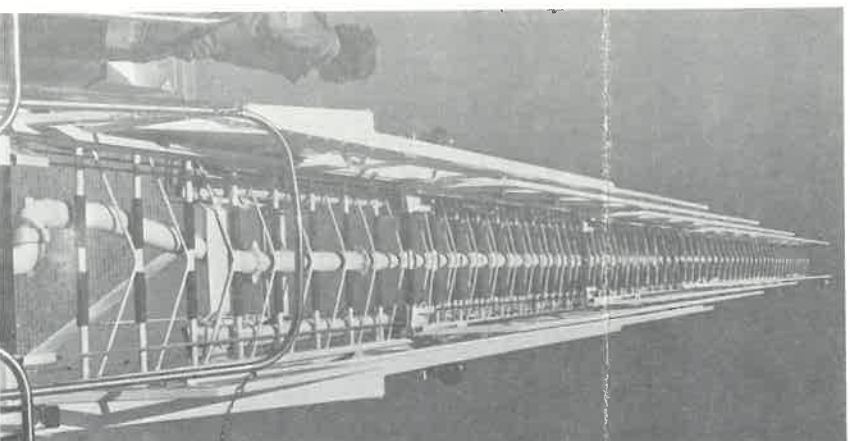
Johnson explains that while the new aerial ladder can be raised to a 75-degree angle, extending to 8 or 9 stories, the fires in high-rise buildings require tactics involving inside, rather than outside, methods of suppression.

The new Pierce ladder truck replaces Glenview's 24-year-old Seagrave, now up for sale. "It has really served us well," notes Fire Capt. Jim Prims. "Fire trucks aren't expected to last more than 20 years."

The Pierce is the result of nearly 2 years of planning and building. A team of 4 — Capt. Prims, Lt. Johnson, and Firefighters Mac McGarry and Mike Caplis — appointed by now-retired Chief Ken Wood, carefully considered all needed features and drew up detailed specifications.

The team travelled to vehicle construction plants in Wisconsin and Florida to look at trucks being built for other municipalities, and hosted teams of manufacturers coming here to discuss the project. Johnson estimates that the team devoted some 1,200 hours to the project.

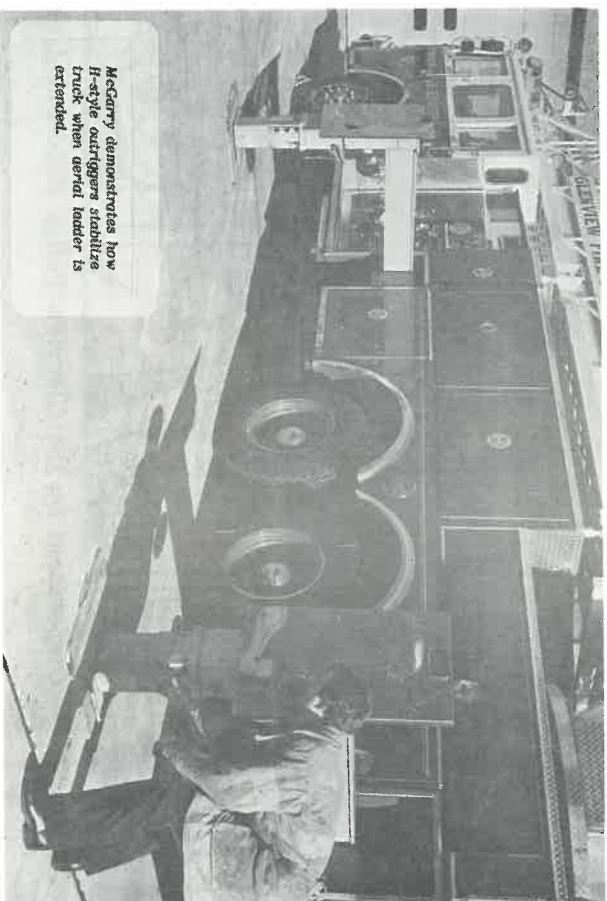
The time was well spent, when you consider that the outlay was \$337,000. "We weren't given a dollar figure," says Johnson, "but were asked by the Village Manager and the Village Board to draw up specifications for a ladder

vehicle to serve Glenview's needs for the next 20 years." After bids were in and the contract awarded, it took about 8 months to build the truck.

Preliminary work wasn't always convenient, as only 3 team members — Johnson, McGarry, and Caplis — were on the same shift. Capt. Prims being on another, someone always had to work overtime. However, as the men were dedicated and vitally concerned, (continued inside)

RESIDENTIAL GARBAGE CUSTOMERS may change the frequency of collection service at no charge, through February 28. As of March 1, a change of service (from once-a-week to twice-a-week or vice versa, or from discontinued service to active service for the same surname) will cost \$10.

FEDERAL ENERGY ASSISTANCE for low-income households (HEAP) is available to any household whose gross income for 90 days immediately preceding application does not exceed the following: For a 1-person household, \$1,641; for 2, \$2,203; for 3, \$2,766; for 4, \$3,328; for 5, \$3,891; for 6, \$4,453; for 7, \$5,016; for 8, \$5,578; for 9, \$6,141; and for 10, \$6,703.

Application may be made regardless of age or whether heat is paid directly or included in rent. Application (only one per household) should be made by the head of household, if possible. (Relatives or friends may act in behalf of those who are household.)

Bring the following: Current heating bills (paid or unpaid), income documentation for all household members for 90 days (wages, salaries, pension check stubs, green cards, unemployment compensation, and any dividends or interest received), plus Social Security numbers for all members of the household. 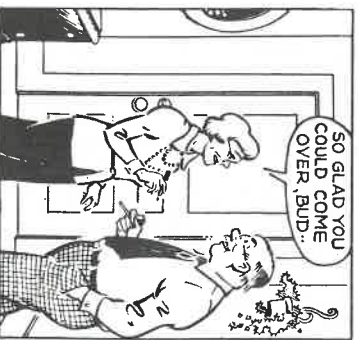

long hours were never a problem.

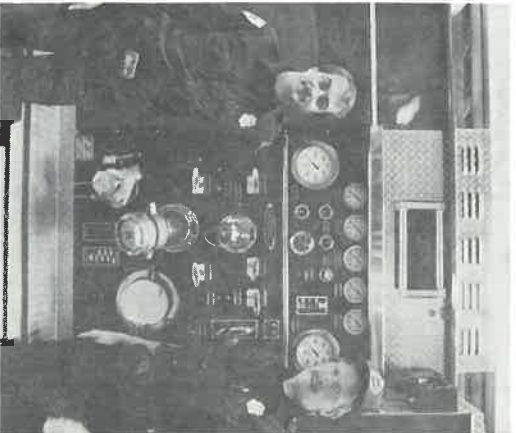
The new vehicle is much safer for firefighters than the old one. The Seagrave has a 2-person open cab with a canvas top. Other firefighters (usually 2, but sometimes 4) had to stand in the open on rear platforms.

The new Pierce has a fully enclosed cab with 2 seats up front, 2 jump seats behind the driver, and 2 more behind the front-seat passenger — safe transport for 6 firefighters in all.

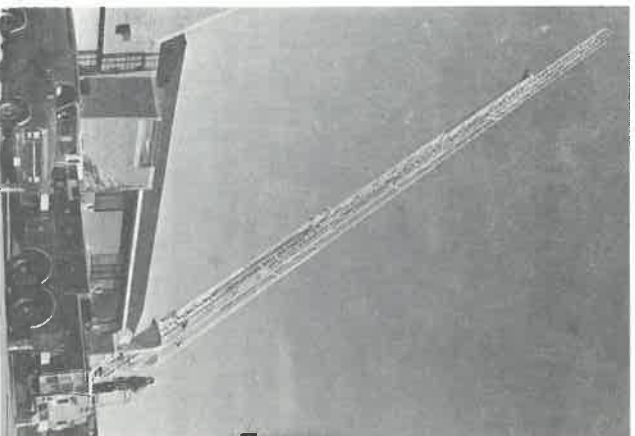
Other important safety features: four H-style outriggers for stability (the old truck had only 2), and a pre-piped aerial ladder to eliminate dragging hoses up a 105-foot incline. An automatic nozzle is located near the tip, which can support 400 pounds while flowing 1,000 gallons of water per minute — twice the capability of the old ladder. The truck's generator produces 110 volts to power equipment at a fire scene.

"Why is it red?" we asked, having heard that yellow-green fire apparatus can be more easily seen at night.

McGarry and Caplis smiled. "It's an old argument by now," Caplis said, "but it'll probably stay around for awhile. It may be just a matter of



McGarry and Caplis say red signifies danger, and is therefore probably the best color for fire apparatus.



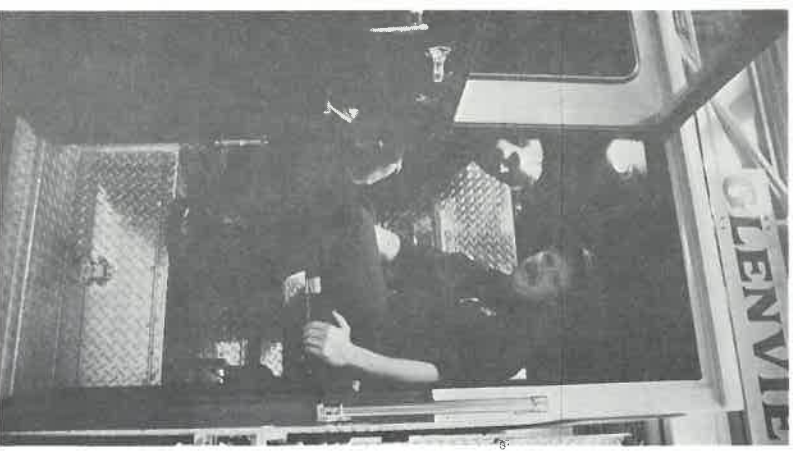
Ladder is ideal for reaching roofs of buildings under 9 stories high. (High-rise fires require indoor, rather than outdoor, fire suppression.)

color preference. One of our other trucks was originally yellow, but we had it repainted to match the rest."

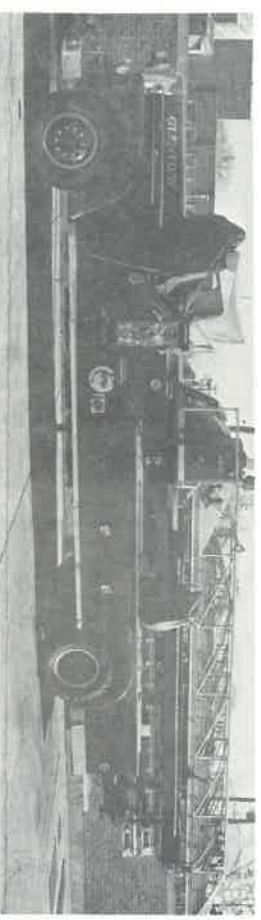
McGarry added, "Any motorist who can't see all these lights at night and recognize a fire truck in action is legally blind and shouldn't be driving a car."

He points out that in the elementary schools he teaches children that red means danger. "Stop lights are red. Stop signs are red. Fire extinguishers are red. It's probably the best color for everything dangerous."

When we made these photos, 9 firefighters (3 from each Fire Department shift) had been trained to drive the new truck, finishing touches were being made, and by the time you read this, it should be in service. Fire Chief John Robberson says personnel from Northbrook, Northfield, Skokie, Winnetka, and Highland Park have come to look over its safety features.
