## New dumpsite proposed for north and northwest suburbs

No parking is allowed on village streets between 2 and 6am. Please warn family members and guests of the restriction, which is in effect through March 31, 1986.

The reason for prohibiting overnight parking: When it snows, village crews begin clearing streets in the early morning hours, and parked cars make the job impossible.

Even if no snow falls during the night, the parking ban remains in effect, and cars may be towed if found violating the village ordinance (Ord. #2260, posted on all major thoroughfares entering Glenview).

**RESIDENTS ARE RESPONSIBLE** for prompt removal of snow and ice from sidewalks adjacent to their homes. Make sure you have a serviceable snow shovel or blower and a supply of ice-melting compound on hand throughout the season. Remember that mail carriers, children and senior adults use the sidewalks every day during the winter months. Please make it safe for them to do so.

**DO NOT SHOVEL, BLOW OR PLOW SNOW** onto any part of a public street or sidewalk. Instruct those hired for snow removal that it is illegal in Glenview to cover or block a public thoroughfare with snow. Such blockage creates hazards for both pedestrians and motorists.

**PLEASE NOTE:** Residential garbage customers may change the frequency of collection service at no charge through February 28. As of March 1, the fee for any change of service — from once-a-week to twice-a-week, or from discontinued to active for the same surname (or vice versa in either case) — will be \$10.

## Recent actions of the Glenview Village Board

Approved the appointments of Dr. Lowell S. Weill as Village Trustee, to replace Anthony Mandolini, and Jeffrey Randall as Village Attorney, to succeed Zachary Ford. . . . Adopted the 1986 village budget, which totals \$16,528,589. . . . Approved \$9 million in Economic Development Bonds for Valley Lo Towers II. . . . Authorized issuance of \$150,000 in general obligation bonds for the Glenview Public Library. . . . Approved tax abatements: \$364,375 for water-acquisition bonds; \$537,062 for water-improvement bonds; \$20,000 for the Library Fund. . . . Approved increasing garbage rates, retroactive to October 1, 1985, with the following maximums: For once-a-week pickup, \$13.50 per month; for twice-a-week pickup, \$20 per month; 3 bundles of brush per week, no longer than 4' or wider than 18", bougths no thicker

The Northwest Municipal Conference, a consortium of 29 suburbs including Glenview, has announced the finding of a new landfill to replace the one in Techny: 225 acres south of Elgin. The conference has an option to buy the land for \$1,125,000, financing it with bonds to be retired through fees paid by user suburbs.

The new site, a former strip mine, would be a "pale-fill" operation, accepting only garbage that has been compacted into 3 1/2 x 4 x 4' blocks. Compacting and baling would be handled at two transfer stations, one of which has been picked out in Rolling Meadows.

## Fingerprints made of children 2 and up

I-SEARCH, the Illinois child protection program, drew 240 Glenview children for fingerprinting at a November event sponsored by parent groups of Lyon and Pleasant Ridge School and the Glenview Police Department.

Police offer the following information for parents unfamiliar with the I-SEARCH program, which consists of an envelope containing fingerprints plus family-supplied photographs and information that will help in identification should the child be lost or kidnapped.

As it is difficult to get readable prints of babies, don't bring children for fingerprinting until at least age 2.

Parents keep all I-SEARCH materials; police keep no records of children fingerprinted. Materials should be

Because of compacting and baling, there would be a minimum of blowing debris, odors, and rodent life connected with the operation. The Northwest Municipal Conference estimates that the Elgin site will serve its members for at least a decade, and possibly longer.

Before being accepted, the arrangement must be approved in each suburb after public hearings. The Techny site will accommodate northwest suburbs for another year or two, sufficient time for setting up alternative operations.

stored in a safe but available place. If they can't be found in cases of emergency, they aren't much help.

Photographs should be in color and show a full profile of the child wearing everyday clothing and hair style. (Don't dress the child in "Sunday best" with an elaborate hairdo.)

Photographs should be updated once a year, because children's appearances do change, sometimes rapidly. Fingerprints, however, never need updating and are good for a lifetime, unless altered by injury or disease.

Trained Tax Aides will help you start from scratch, or will check your work if you have already made out the return. The aim is to have seniors pay only their fair share and no more. (Some seniors overpay every year because they don't know all the deductions to which they are entitled.

**ANGINA SUPPERS** between 40 and 75 are needed for clinical study of a new drug being conducted at Evanston Hospital. Participants must have physician consent. Free examinations and testing as required by the study. To sign up or learn more, call 492-4512.

**IT IS AGAINST THE LAW** to pour, drain or otherwise introduce any substance, solid or liquid, into sewer or water systems through manholes, pick-holes or gutter grates, or to impede passage of gutters, conduits, sewers or natural drainage on any public or private property. (A resident recently reported seeing gasoline poured into a sewer, causing odors, danger of explosion and water contamination.) **If you observe any substance being put into sewers illegally, please call the Police Department immediately at 729-5000.**

**CIRCUIT-BREAKER FORMS** (for tax and rent relief for elderly and disabled Illinoisans whose total annual income are less than \$14,000) are sent out by the Department of Revenue, generally by the third week of January. Eligible recipients should wait until February to see if they receive forms; if not, call this toll-free number: 1-800-252-6565 (Lt.-Gov. Ryan's Senior Action Center).

● **If this is your first year** to file for the Circuit Breaker, call Northfield Township (724-8300) and ask what documents to submit and how to proceed.

● **State license plates** are half-price to those qualifying for Circuit Breaker relief; the Secretary of State will send a letter of eligibility. (Spouses need not worry; last names and same addresses, no matter in whose name the car is registered, will be honored.)

**DEFERRED REAL-ESTATE TAXES** for ages 65 and up or disabled persons whose total 1985 income was less than \$12,000: Call Northfield Township (724-8300) or Jean Cleland (North Shore Senior Center, 446-8750). (Deferred taxes are paid by the state; when the property is sold, the buyer reimburses the state + 6% interest.)

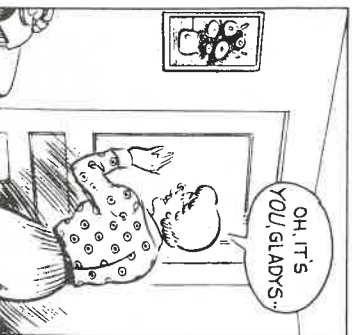
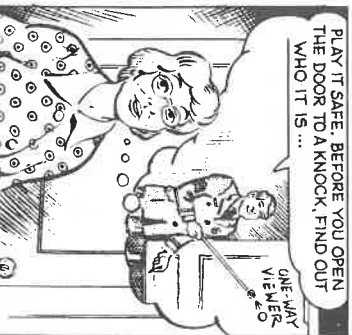
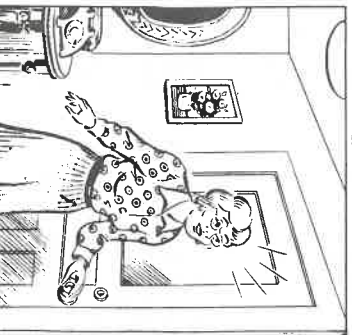
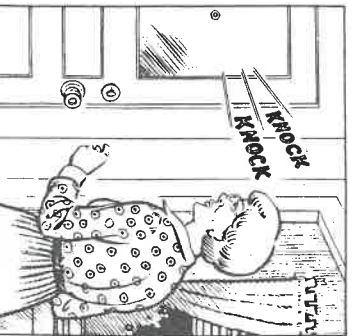

**WHEREVER YOU WALK YOUR DOG**, pick up droppings promptly and take them home for disposal in toilet or garbage can. **Leaving feces on the ground is against the law, as they attract insects and rats, which in turn spread disease.** In a community like ours, picking up after pets, winter and summer, is only common courtesy.

**CRIME-PREVENTION TIP:** Beware of someone at your door who asks, "Does So-and So still live here?" Chances are, he or she had hoped that no one would answer the doorbell, indicating that the house was ripe for burglary. **On no account let such a person in or offer to look up a name in the phone directory.** (One caller who recently tried this ploy in Glenview was arrested two doors away while breaking into a garage.)
