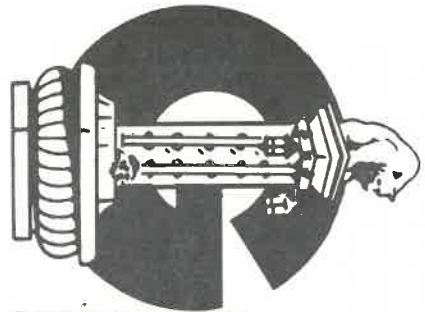

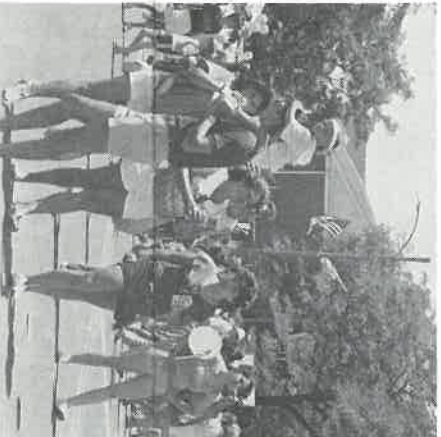
"Bear Fair" street sale set for June 28 Don't miss "beargains" of local merchants Plus food, friends, and entertainment

The 13th annual Glenview Chamber of Commerce **Street Sale and Bear Fair** will be held Saturday, June 28, 9am to 5pm, on the pavement and sidewalks of Glenview Road between Waukegan Road and the Milwaukee Road railway tracks.

More than 100 merchants and service organizations will cooperate with the Glenview Bear to bring you entertainment, bargains, and good things to eat and drink.

The Glenview Post Office will offer a special cancellation — the now-familiar "Hug the Bear" triangle — at its booth. (Last year the post office cancelled more than 1,000 pieces of mail and received cancellation requests from as far away as West Germany, Switzerland, and Belgium.)

Library sets records

Since the reopening of the newly expanded Glenview Public Library and adoption of its 1986 budget, new records have been set in several categories.

There have been more: Purchases and loans of books and video tapes, answers to inquiries, new library patrons, and microfiche additions — making Glenview's the largest public library microfiche collection in the Chicago suburbs.

In April, 32,831 books and materials were circulated — an increase of 7,000 over April '85. Executive Librarian Peter Bury reports April '86 as the busiest month since March '84, with an average daily circulation of 1,194.

The Technical Processes Department reports 1,235 books added during April '86 — 4,862 since January 1. The total collection now stands at 141,786, and librarians estimate a record total of new acquisitions for the current year.

The Maynard Room and the conference room, now available to community groups, give priority to library-sponsored meetings and events. (A new policy for use of these rooms by the public is currently being discussed by library trustees.)

Bury reminds Glenview residents that the library staff and trustees are receptive to suggestions and recommendations made by library patrons.

SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME provides monthly cash payments for aged, blind, and disabled U.S. citizens, legal immigrants, and legal aliens who are permanent residents of the U.S. To qualify, a single adult or child may have no more than \$1700 in assets, and a couple, no more than \$2550 (exclusive of home, \$1500 in burial funds, burial plots, and life insurance). A single adult or child can receive up to \$336 per month; a couple, up to \$504. Those doing part-time work and getting small Social Security checks can still apply for SSI payments, though they may be lower. Homeshare -- a boon to the elderly

HILT, which stands for Homeshare: Independent Living Together, is a recently introduced program of the North Suburban Housing Center (Wilmette). It is designed to reduce living expenses of the elderly by finding compatible companions to share costs.

HILT can eliminate the loneliness and hazards of living alone, hiring expensive live-in help, and fears of going to a nursing home.

Homeshare arrangements are flexible, varying according to the case. Usually rent or expense sharing is involved. Sometimes rent reduction can be exchanged for services.

Fun-filled July 4 to feature parade, Liberty Fair, all-American food, concerts, and fireworks

The annual Independence Day celebration begins at 11am Friday, July 4, with a parade beginning at Our Lady of Perpetual Help parking lot, traveling west on Glenview Road to Sherner Road, then south on Sherner to Rugen Community Center.

A "Liberty Fair" at Rugen Center starts immediately after the parade, with awards to winning floats, marching units, and individual entrants, followed by all-American picnic foods (L'il Bear and Jumbo Bangers, apple pie, hot buttered corn-on-the-cob, and apple pie), plus Italian beef and sausage. "We the People" musicians entertain from noon to 2, and the Glenview Concert Band from 2 to 3pm.

Evening events start with a Twilight Show at 6:30 at the Glenview Park Golf Club (800 Sherner Road), where the restaurant staff will be at

barbecue grills serving outdoor dinners. At 7pm the 105-piece North Shore Concert Band strikes up, and the traditional display of spectacular fireworks begins at dusk and continues until 10pm.

New safety precautions, parking, and traffic regulations will be in effect this year. Please follow the instructions of Glenview police officers controlling traffic and parking.

Please check your address numbers

Take a good look at the front of your house from the street at night. Be honest: Could you read the address numbers if you didn't already know them?

House numbers should be instantly readable from the street, night or day, year round. If they aren't, the lives of everyone in the household are at risk.

Emergency services (fire, paramedic, and police) must locate addresses quickly at a time when every second counts because lives are at stake.

House numbers should be in Arabic (1, 2, 3, etc.) — not Roman numerals or script, which are difficult, if not impossible, to make out — big enough to be read at a distance, displayed prominently on a contrasting background, and well lighted at night.

Make sure this spring's lush growth hasn't already obliterated your house numbers. Shrubs or overhanging tree limbs that prevent easy reading of the address should be trimmed back regularly. The small effort involved could save your life some day or night.

TREES AND SHRUBBERY on private properties must not overhang sidewalks, streets or alleys, or cover traffic or street signs. Visual blockage is hazardous to motorists, cyclists and pedestrians. Private shrubs and low-hanging limbs must be trimmed back by property owners at least one foot from any public way. Shrubs and hedges at corner locations must not be higher than 36 inches from the ground. Please cooperate.

TAXES PAID BY GLENVIEW BUSINESSES account for almost one-third of every revenue dollar needed to support village services.

Their parasites include fleas, ticks, mites, and other insects that infect human beings. Droppings and feathers can contaminate vegetable gardens and home-grown fruit.

Pigeon problems are unmatched by those associated with any other birds. Besides being health hazards, their droppings deface buildings, hasten surface deterioration, and clog drains.

Please don't feed the pigeons, and do make sure they have no access to animal droppings, spilled food, or garbage anywhere on your property. If not fed, pigeons will go elsewhere.

Discourage pigeons; keep Glenview clean

The Glenview Health Department warns that pigeons are health hazards because they carry many toxins and diseases (among them encephalitis, pseudotuberculosis, and salmonella).

DON'T RISK GETTING A FRAUDULENT CHECK. Be wary of checks numbered under 100 (most banks begin new accounts with 101) and temporary checks (they may have been discarded by the real owner). Make sure checks have at least one perforated edge. **IDENTIFICATION:** Put the driver's license number on the front of the check (as the back may later be indecipherable because of stamping). Ask for more ID if you are suspicious. Be cautious about accepting checks from third parties, and NEVER accept checks with alterations, erasures, or dates later than the day on which they are written.



Massive supports (heavy posts, concrete-filled objects, and other arrangements that can damage postal vehicles or cause injury if struck accidentally by passing motorists or cyclists) are not allowed. Government-approved boxes and supports are readily available; if you want to design your own, please get **advance approval** from Glenview Postmaster Mark Stephan. If your curblineline box is dented, has sharp edges, or is obstructed by shrubs or rocks, please correct the situation. Your mail carrier will thank you for abetting good postal service.
