Police information management goes high tech

The Glenview Police Department has added an important electronic aid to its crime-fighting ability: PIMS — Police Information Management System.

The new equipment enables immediate computerization of incoming incidents and service calls, storage of incident and arrest records, and interface with other municipalities employing PIMS and with the LEADS (Law Enforcement Assistance Data System, for access to vehicle registration, driver's licenses, wanted persons, and other criminal information).

Suburbs using the system are Arlington Heights, Buffalo Grove, Calumet City, Des Plaines, Dolton, Elgin, Elk Grove Village, Evanston, Glencoe, Harvey, Hoffman Estates, Joliet, Mt. Prospect, Palatine, Park Ridge, Rolling Meadows, Schaumburg, Streamwood, Wilmette, Winnetka, as well as the Northeastern Metropolitan Enforcement Group, known as NEMEG.

Because PIMS interfaces LEADS, the state information rapid-response system which the department has employed for many years, Glenview now saves the annual LEADS fee of \$7,800.

PIMS also eliminates providing detailed data to the Illinois State Information Network, saving many work hours, as such information is already computerized for ready access.

PIMS provides more than 200 types of summarized reports. For example, a summary of service calls involving crimes west of Sherman Road between February 1 and August 1, 1986, can be called to the screen within moments of request. A special module produces electronic maps to specification.

When data is incomplete, PIMS automatically searches for lists of possible suspects, analysis of offense patterns, lists of persons matching physical descriptions, those who have been arrested for similar offenses, and records of incidents by location.

Glenview's PIMS equipment includes 7 stations (keyboard and monitor equipment); 2 in communications, used by dispatchers. One of these accesses LEADS (state information); the other inputs service calls, incidents, and arrests as reported.

A third station is in the detective bureau, where personnel access records of other departments to match or supply missing data. A fourth is in the report room, recording results of current service calls, incidents, and arrests, saving patrol-officer handwriting reports. The last 3 are in records, where clerical personnel enter material from filing cabinets for storage and ready recall.

The equipment is currently on a 3-year lease-purchase agreement. Commander Patrick Carey, who studied PIMS capabilities and costs for several years before the decision to join the system was made, believes it enhances the department's daily operations, as well as its ability to solve crimes.

Robberson appointed to medical group

Glenview Fire Chief John Robberson has been appointed to the Emergency Medical Services Commission of Metropolitan Chicago, formed in 1970 by the Cook County Department of Public Health, the Metropolitan Chicago Health Care Council, and the Chicago Department of Health, each of which appoints members.

George Dunne, president of the Cook County Board of Commissioners, which is responsible for Cook County medical services, recently announced the appointment, the result of Robberson's outstanding work in the north suburban Area Hospital Emergency Services Committee on which he has served since 1976.

The medical commission, which covers an 8-county area, has standing committees for disaster preparedness, hospitals, mobile intensive care, and public information and education.

Robberson will continue to chair the AHES Mass Casualties committee, for which he has written and implemented plans for handling of possible disasters in the northwest suburbs and at O'Hare Airport.

Glenview is gratified that Chief Robberson's exceptional work has been recognized beyond the confines of our village and the northwest suburbs.
