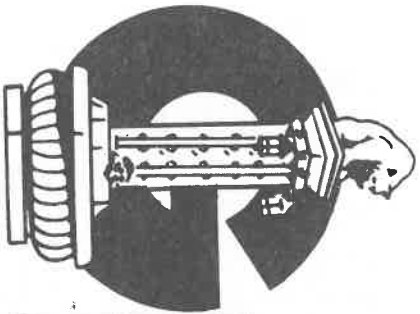

Appointed to Village Board

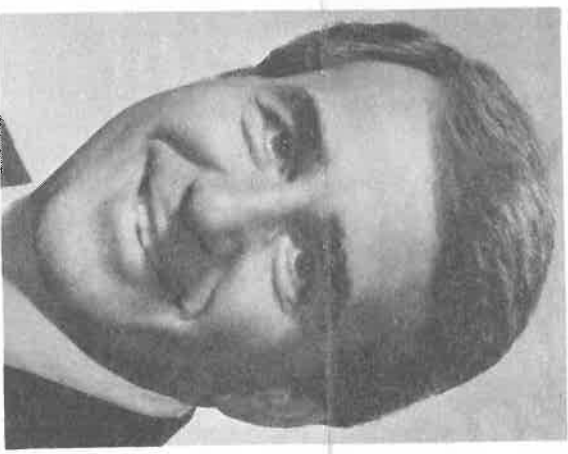

Sewer-rate rise first in 9 years

The Glenview sewer rate of 10¢/1,000 gallons, established in September of 1976, has been increased to 50¢/1,000 gallons, in order to cover operation and maintenance of the municipal sanitary-sewer system, costs of which have increased steadily during the past nine inflationary years.

Village cash reserves for sewers are exhausted, and estimated costs for 1985, including salaries, cleaning, repairs, energy for the lift station, pipe, rings, covers, fuel, and depreciation, are almost \$100,000.

It is safe to assume that, barring a rise in inflation, operation and maintenance costs will be from \$100,000 to \$125,000 annually for the next five years.

A study of water and sewer rates conducted by the Finance Department and its auditing firm last fall recommended that the sewer rate and the water rate be considered separately, as the wholesale water rate is negotiated with the Village of Wilmette.

Based upon the new rate of 50¢ per 1,000 gallons, the Sewer Department's net income through 1988 will total \$1,111,828. Capital improvements for the same period will total \$1,027,750, leaving \$84,078 for contingencies and possible inflationary changes in the national economy.

Based upon the new sewer rate of 50¢ per 1,000 gallons, water and sewer charges will be as follows:

Customers with both water and sewer and connected to the East system, \$1.05 per 1,000 gallons, \$11.55 per quarter minimum. Those with water only and connected to the East system, \$1.05 per 1,000 gallons; \$7.35 per quarter minimum.

Customers with water only and connected to the West system, \$2.10 per 1,000 gallons, \$14.70 per quarter minimum. Those with water and sewer connected to the West system, \$2.10 per 1,000 gallons for water + 50¢ per 1,000 gallons for sewer, \$18.20 per quarter minimum.

Customers with water and sewer connected to the West water system and the Winnetka-Shermer sewer (operated by Northfield Township), \$2.20 per 1,000 gallons for water, \$15.40

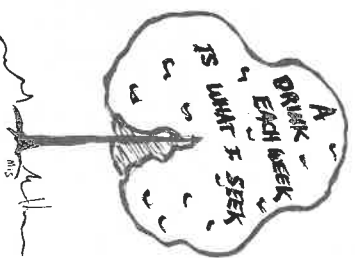

per quarter minimum + \$2.50 per quarter for sewer.

Customers outside village limits with water only and connected to the West system, \$3.15 per 1,000 gallons, \$22.05 per quarter minimum.

Those outside village limits with water and sewer and connected to the West system, \$3.15 per 1,000 gallons for water + 50¢ per 1,000 gallons for sewer; \$39.55 per quarter minimum.

(The Glenview Naval Air Station and the Domestic Service & Utility Company are covered by separate agreements stipulating the same water rate as set by the village. Glenview acts as agent for Northfield Township in collecting charges for connections to the Winnetka-Shermer sanitary sewer, remitting funds to the township.)



SOIL AT THE BASE OF TREES should be graded level, in order to make the roots grow down instead of sideways. Dirt piled around a tree trunk can cause girdling of roots and eventual death of the tree. Frequent cultivation of soil around the tree trunk dries low moisture and air to enter and benefit the roots.

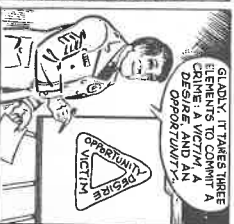

Officer John Good, Glenview's crime-prevention specialist, will come to your home, school, or church to talk to you and your friends about eliminating crime in Glenview.

Officer Good's tips for this month:

Males described as "gypsies" have been harassing elderly homeowners in several North Shore suburbs, and will undoubtedly come to Glenview if not apprehended. They travel in a pickup truck without license plates, chat with residents regarding blacktopping, grading, or painting (sometimes on the pretext that someone in the family has called them and promised work).

Free blood-pressure tests every Thursday, 11am-noon. (Volunteers are needed for testing; those willing to learn please call the center.)

Counseling service is offered every Thursday by appointment.

ONE DOG DROPPING PRODUCED 144 DISEASE-CARRYING FLEAS, according to a recent study reported by United Press International. Alan Beck of the University of Pennsylvania's School of Veterinary Medicine says that many human diseases are spread by dog feces left lying on the ground. (Insects breed in the droppings and rats are attracted to them as food.) This isn't the dogs' fault, of course. It is the fault of dog owners who don't pick up feces promptly and take them home for disposal in toilet or garbage. Let's not spread disease in Glenview. (There's a poop-scooper law here, remember.)

What they try to do is get inside the house. Once inside, one distracts the homeowner while the others look for money and valuables.

Don't ever let strangers into your house. It could be the start of a home invasion in which you could lose more than money and jewelry.

Officer Good also reminds you to **keep your garage doors closed and locked at all times.** A number of bicycle thefts have occurred in Glenview this summer, some from garages left open or unlocked.

Lock up your bike wherever you leave it. Some bicycles have been stolen from Glenview parks while the owners weren't watching. Always use a lock and chain when you leave your bike for even a few minutes.

Postmaster warns dog owners

The old joke about the dog biting the mailman wasn't really very funny. Glenview Postmaster Mark Stephan reports that last year some 6,000 U.S. mail carriers were bitten on the job — six of them in Glenview!

As dog bites can be serious and even cause permanent disfigurement, medical and legal costs involved in the 1984 incidents topped \$2 million.

Dogs are territorial by nature, and even a gentle pet will attack if it believes a stranger is trespassing. Owners are urged to keep their animals fenced in, or at least securely leashed and tethered well away from the mailbox. Those who don't are risking expensive lawsuits and possible interruption of mail delivery.

The Postal Service seeks to recover damages when a carrier is bitten, and it also counsels injured carriers to sue on their own. Mail deliveries are discontinued to homes — sometimes to entire neighborhoods — where dogs are a menace to mail carriers.

Such extreme measures need not be taken in Glenview if residents do their part in keeping pets properly restrained.

When Glenview Health Administrator Kerry O'Shaughnessy says he has 1,001 things to do, he's not kidding.

Actually, the number is larger: He's responsible for 501 inspections, most of which are required by the state at least twice a year.

He prefers, however, to do inspections quarterly. That way, if he finds a violation, between 48 hours and 10 days (depending upon the seriousness of the problem) are allowed for correction, after which he is required to make reinspection.

Such inspections and reinspections are vital to the health of Glenview-area residents, as Kerry O'Shaughnessy is the person who ensures the freshness and purity of foods in local delis, restaurants, cafeterias, bakeries and catering services. Glenview has 103 food-service purveyors, including hospitals, nursing homes, employee cafeterias, school kitchens, day-care centers, and taverns serving food.

In addition, trucks used for food deliveries are inspected and licensed annually by Glenview. O'Shaughnessy sends out 358 notices every June, ordering all trucks delivering food in the village to report to the Village Hall parking lot. Trucks must be clean inside and out, maintain the proper temperature for what they carry, and display valid Glenview licenses.

In addition to food purveyors, nine cleaning establishments are on his list, as certain chemicals used in the dry-cleaning process can be toxic to employees if fumes and vapors are not properly recycled.

There are 12 locally licensed barber shops here, also O'Shaughnessy's responsibilities, as barber tools must be properly sanitized. Two sun-tan parlors must be inspected as well. (Beauty shops, licensed by the state, are under state jurisdiction.)

Glenview's 13 gasoline stations are checked regularly for sanitary wash-room conditions and state stickers on gas pumps. As some carry snack foods, they also count as food purveyors, and condition of shelves, coolers, and dispensers must be inspected.

There is only one motel in the village, and although it does not serve food, it has vending machines (more work for O'Shaughnessy).

Glenview's 12 public swimming pools are checked once a month during the summer for required chlorine content, proper filtration, and adequate safety equipment and fencing. Park pools also have small kitchens, which must conform to sanitary standards. (Private swimming pools require inspection only when installed.)

Oddly enough, Glenview's water supply is now tested by the Water Department, and under state law is no longer one of the responsibilities of the Health Administrator. The laboratory in the Village Hall is now used mainly for insect identification and testing tree samples for the presence of Dutch elm disease.

O'Shaughnessy is assisted year round by Sanitarian Technician Mary Stonis, and this summer by Sanitarian Aide Scott Wilkes, a student intern from Illinois State University (Normal). Stonis, formerly the Health Department secretary, is currently studying to become certified in health, sanitation and food inspection.

O'Shaughnessy, on Glenview's staff since 1976 and promoted from Sanitarian to Health Administrator last January, has a B.S. degree in biology from Loyola University. Employed in public health since 1970, he became a Registered Sanitarian in '74, and formerly held a position in Skokie. A member of the Illinois Environmental Health Association, he was president of its North Chapter in 1984, and is also a member of the national organization.

FOOD POISONING, an intestinal infection caused by bacteria (or toxins emitted by bacteria) is temporary but painful. To prevent it, keep hot foods really hot (above 140 F), cold ones really cold (below 40 F), and all foods scrupulously clean. If you're not sure leftover picnic foods have been handled properly, throw them away. Anything not eaten immediately should be refrigerated or frozen. (Refrigeration slows growth of bacteria, and freezing stops it, but neither can be depended upon to destroy toxins already present due to improper handling or storage.)

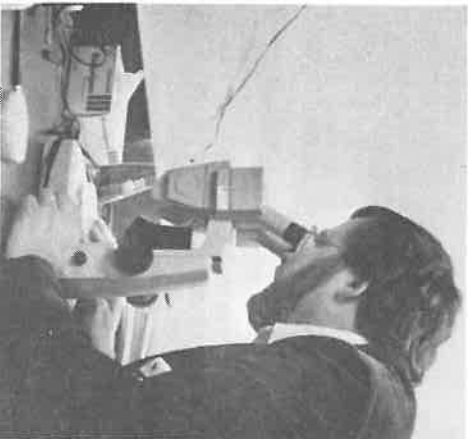
