Police urge more business security

The Glenview Police Department urges local business operators and employees to be alert for trespassers in manufacturing plants, banks, office buildings, and retail stores, just as they would be if they were at home.

Professionalism

It is a duty to question everyone not recognized as performing specific, legitimate errands. Unauthorized visitors claiming to be solicitors, caterers, service personnel or messengers may be thieves or snoopers planning future robberies or burglaries.

A well-known ploy: Sneak into a building during the day (preferably late Friday afternoon, when employees are less alert than usual) hide in a closet or other storage area, then bypass alarm systems and open doors or windows after hours and steal merchandise and equipment.

(We are not giving the criminals any ideas by reporting this — they already know. Those who don't may be your own employees.)

Theft

Police also remind local business owners that inventories and stock monitoring should be frequent and thorough.

Most suburban businesses are now on the watch for shoplifters. (Sadly, retail school supplies are stolen in great quantities at this time of year.) But figures compiled by the National Crime Prevention Institute show that \$40 BILLION is lost annually to employee theft.

Who pays for shoplifting and employee thievery? We all do. That's one of the reasons everything today is so expensive: We who are honest pay for our merchandise, plus what has already been stolen by others.

Please make sure that the street number is clear and readable at the back door of your business.

Solicitation fraud again hits local residents, businesses Annual scam operation takes money under false pretenses

lice Chief John Robberson and Police Chief David J. Kelly again issue this warning to Glenview residents and businesses:

Glenview's Fire and Police Departments are NOT part of any organization that raises money or sells ads.

Chief Robberson reports that solicitors for Associated Firefighters of Illinois are again asking Glenview businesses to pay for ads in a publication called Illinois Firefighter. An organization called Friends of Illinois Firefighters tries to solicit money from businesses and residents either in person or by phone. They say your donation helps all firefighters. (Not true—Glenview fire personnel do not benefit in any way.)

Representatives of the Combined Counties Police Association and police benevolent groups may visit businesses for ads, or telephone residents selling

Police do not require the name of a business to be displayed at the rear (though you may include yours if you wish), but the street number must be there and easily readable. (Remember that a pencil scrawl is hardly a help to the police officer trying to protect your property at night.)

Perhaps your rear-door street number was once fresh and bright, but has now worn off, fallen off, dulled, or been painted over. Please check and restore it if necessary. Better do it now, before cold weather and the holiday season.

These organizations have nothing to do with Glenview's Fire or Police Departments, which are financed by the Village of Glenview. No members of either department solicit funds or profit in any way from donations, sales or ads.

Disregard anything solicitors say to the contrary. If you give them money, be advised that you are not helping this community or anyone connected with it. The solicitors are misrepresenting themselves and acting under false pretenses. They do not deserve your support.

Don't give to panhandlers — it only encourages them to return next year. Please say NO, so Glenview can get rid of them for good.

Don't assume unnecessary debt

If a relative dies leaving unpaid medical or hospital bills, the family is NOT responsible (unless someone has agreed, in writing, to pay such bills).

Dead or alive, only the person who received the medical or hospital service is liable.

After death, physicians and hospitals have claims against insurance and whatever parts of estates are allocated by state law for such expenses.

No claim can be made against families.

Families sometimes assume they are responsible, and take on crushing financial obligations that are not necessary.

More than a thousand babies die every year in car accidents, 90% of whom could be saved if car seats are used. WHEREVER YOU WALK YOUR DOG, pick up droppings promptly and take them home for disposal in tollet or garbage can. Leaving feces on the ground is against the law, as they attract insects and rats, which in turn spread disease. In a community like ours, picking up after pets is common courtesy. (If you have discourteous neighbors, mail a copy of this item or tuck it under their door. Perhaps they will get the message without your having to call the police.)


