Senior Housing Assistance available for second year

Glenview residents 65 or older who pay either rent or real-estate taxes and have been village residents for at least two years, may be eligible for financial help from Glenview.

Senior adults may benefit from the village **Senior Housing Assistance Program**, if their gross annual incomes do not exceed \$10,000 for a single person or \$12,000 for a married couple.

Those meeting the above qualifications should fill out an application **on or before Wednesday, February 29.**

The Village of Glenview will pay \$600 a year toward rent or property taxes of a limited number of senior adults selected according to need.

Voter registration is now open at the Village Hall on weekdays between 9am and 5pm, through Tuesday, February 21.

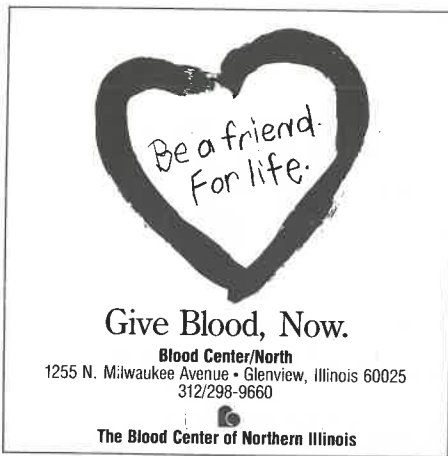
February 21 is also the last day before the Primary Election to transfer registrations of registered voters who have moved since the last time they voted.

Required under a new law taking effect January 1: **Two identification documents** (such as an Illinois driver's license, Social Security card, utility bill for current address, employee or student ID card, credit card, professional association or union membership card), **one of which includes current residence address**, must be presented at the time of registration.

Glenview residents may also register at the County Clerk's office in Chicago or their township office through Tuesday, February 21.

Call the Village Hall, 724-1700, for further information. The Primary Election will be held Tuesday, March 20.

Blood donations at local center

Blood donors are needed at the Blood Center of Northern Illinois, 1255 Milwaukee Avenue, Glenview, to help supply 25 hospitals in the Chicago area depending solely upon the center for both whole blood and blood components.

Blood use has increased recently, as transfusions are now routine in treatment of cancer, heart disease, and many other ailments.

Donation hours at the Blood Center are 1 to 8pm Mondays through Thursdays, 9am to 4pm Fridays, and 8am to 1pm Saturdays.

Appointments are suggested — call 298-9660. (Walk-in donors are also very welcome.)

Persons in good health between 17 and 65 who weigh at least 110 pounds are probably eligible blood donors. Anyone with a specific question should call the Blood Center, 298-9660.

SENIOR ADULTS SHOULD BEWARE of solicitors claiming to represent the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) or the National Association of Retired Persons (NARP), selling tax-sheltered funds or Medicare supplement policies. The State's Attorney warns that while AARP is a reputable nonprofit organization, it does **NOT** solicit, either in person or by phone. AARP insurance programs are only for members, and only by mail. NARP, a Texas-based **for-profit** organization, also sells only by mail. If you bought from someone claiming to represent AARP or NARP, complain to the State's Attorney's Consumer Division, 443-4600.

Village boards and commissions meet at 8pm in the Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Road. Residents are welcome to attend meetings of public bodies, as provided by the Illinois Open Meetings Act.

Regular meetings of the following bodies are scheduled as follows:

APPEARANCE COMMISSION — Second and fourth Wednesdays of every month.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES — First and third Mondays of every month, with this exception: **Tuesday, September 4** (because the preceding Monday is Labor Day).

PLAN COMMISSION — Second and fourth Tuesdays of every month.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS — Second and fourth Mondays of every month.

Youth Baseball sign-up

Youth Baseball and the Pony-Colt League have merged, providing an integrated baseball program for Glenview boys and girls ages 8 through 16.

To be eligible, children must be at least 8 years old before August 1, 1984, and not reach age 17 until after August 1, 1984. Those registering for the first time must present birth certificates. Each registrant must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

Daytime registration will be on **Saturday, January 14, 9am to 3pm**, at both Rugen Community Center, 901 Shermer Road, and the Glenview Ice Center, 1851 Landwehr Road.

Evening registration will be on **Monday, January 16, 7 to 9pm**, at Rugen Center ONLY.

Every registrant receives a free Glenview Youth Baseball T-shirt, and all registrants will play. Younger ones are grouped by neighborhood, and the games will not conflict with soccer.

December action, Village Board

- Approved the 1984 Municipal Budget, totalling \$14,640,095. **NOTE: The February issue of the Newsletter will contain a detailed breakdown.**
 - Approved routine tax abatements: \$385,000 for the East Side sewer; \$4,525,000 for acquisition of waterworks; \$5,700,000 for improvements to the water system. (General obligation bonds, required by law to be sold for improvements to sewer and water systems, are paid off by collection of user fees rather than by property taxes.)
 - Approved renewal of insurance on village properties for 1984, and retention of Wyatt & Company, consultants, to aid in preparation of bid specifications.
 - Accepted bid of Wil-Shore Motors of Wilmette for seven 1984 4-door Crown Victoria "S" cars (\$79,128) for Police Department use.
 - Accepted bids of Illinois Truck & Equipment of Rosemont (\$64,260) for an aerial truck, and West Side Tractor Sales of Wheeling (\$50,450) for a front-end loader (both for Public Works use).
 - Accepted Cablenet changes in sequence of miles to be wired, involving between 25 and 33% to be completed earlier than originally planned, 12% later (but no more than six months), and all overhead work to be completed before underground work begins.
 - Amended the municipal code to tighten procedures governing taxicab licenses and increase required insurance coverage per cab.
 - Revised the ordinance governing
- Class L liquor licenses (wine tasting) to allow 11am Sunday openings.
 - Approved a two-lot subdivision at 1700-1724 Portage Run.
 - Approved storm-sewer easements at 525 and 529 Echo Lane.
 - Passed a resolution joining other Northwest Municipal Conference members in support of the Village of Lake Bluff in litigation involving development within 1½ miles of its village limits.
 - Renewed the entertainment license of a restaurant at 630 Waukegan Road.
 - Reappointed the following to the Electrical Commission: **Norman McCorkle**, chairman (to 9-85), **M. Lee Butter** (to 9-86), **Jack O. Dilworth** (to 9-84), **Paul G. Parker** (to 9-86), **Thomas J. Speck** (to 9-86), and **Kenneth J. Wood** (to 9-85).
 - Reappointed **E. Donald Alan** to the Forestry Commission (to 8-85), **Arnold Anderson**, chairman, to the Appearance Commission (to 5-85), **Gerald W. Barry** to the Building Commission (to 7-86), **Theodore Brickman, Sr.**, to the Forestry Commission (to 8-84), **Robert Browne** to the Plan Commission (to 7-87), **Arne J. Foss**, chairman, to the Building Commission (to 7-88), and **Louis Triebold** to the Senior Citizen Commission (to 10-87).

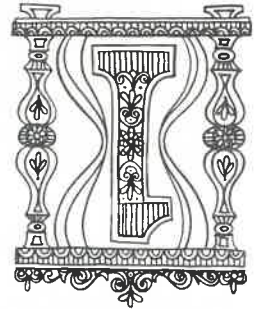

COLDS AND FLU are thought of as "winter diseases," only because people tend to gather indoors in winter. St. Francis Hospital advises the following measures to avoid catching or spreading colds or flu: **Wash your hands often, and keep them away from your face, especially from the moist linings around eyes and nose. Avoid touching objects or surfaces handled by infected people.** Never drink from cups or glasses used by infected people, unless the vessels have been thoroughly washed. **Cover your nose and mouth when you sneeze or cough.** Even if you feel fairly well when you have a cold or the flu, you can still pass viruses to others.
