



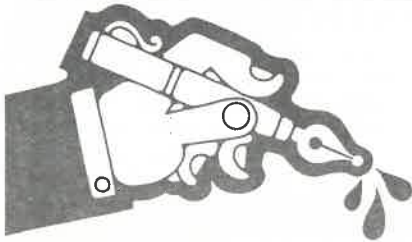

Last chance . . .

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 21 is the last day to register before the Primary Election (March 20), and the last day to validate registrations of voters who have moved since the last election. Bring **two documents**, one of which includes your current address. Voter registration is on the upper level of the Village Hall, Monday through Friday, 9am to 5pm. (National, state and county officers will be **nominated** in the primary; delegates to the national conventions will be **elected**.)

Fraud warning

Cook County State's Attorney Richard M. Daley and County Assessor Thomas Hynes have filed suit against a company calling itself "Cook County Assessment Reductions," with offices at 17 North State Street.

The firm is **not legally registered** to do business in this state. Daley says it mails postcards to homeowners titled Notice for Property Tax Reduction that are "deceptively designed to look like an official government notice." The postcard asks recipients to send \$8.50 for materials on how to have property taxes reduced.

The firm has no authority of any kind to lower assessments. The information being sold is available FREE at the offices of townships and the Cook County Assessor, 118 North Clark St., Chicago IL 60602.

Questions about property assessments should be directed either to your township office or the Taxpayer Assistance Department of the County Assessor, 443-7550.

Reminder for senior adults:

Feb. 29 deadline for housing aid

Glenview residents 65 or older who pay either rent or real-estate taxes and have been village residents for at least two years, may be eligible for financial help from Glenview.

Senior adults may benefit from the village **Senior Housing Assistance Program**, if their gross annual incomes do not exceed \$10,000 for a single person or \$12,000 for a married couple.

Those meeting the above qualifications should fill out an application **on or before Wednesday, February 29**. All information will be held in strictest confidence.

PUBLIC WORKS PERSONNEL plowing snow report that some residents have been putting plastic bags of refuse on roadways. This is strictly against the law in Glenview. **Yard debris in disposable containers** is the only kind of refuse allowed on parkways, but it is never to be put out until after dark the night before garbage-collection day. As there is no yard debris at this time of the year, **NO REFUSE** should be placed on parkways, and certainly not on the road. It is illegal in Glenview to put garbage or household waste anywhere but at the service door for pickup.

Babysitter School

On Saturday, February 18, the Glenview Fire Department offers an all-day (8:30am to 3pm) Babysitter School for those aged 10 and older.

Everyone who babysits should know the basics, including first aid, CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation), fire safety and home security.

The course is free. Call the Fire Department nonemergency number, 724-2141, and let them know you'll be there. **Bring your lunch.**

The Village of Glenview will pay \$600 a year toward rent or property taxes of a limited number of senior adults selected according to need.

Two locations and times Great Decisions begins Feb. 16

Great Decisions '84, a nationwide nonpartisan educational program sponsored by the Foreign Policy Association, provides factual and impartial analyses contributing to public understanding of vital foreign-policy issues facing the U.S. this year.

Among topics for discussion: the USSR under Andropov, Central America and Mexico, U.S. security, world peace, South Africa, the international debt crisis, international drug traffic, Saudi Arabia, Jordan, and China.

The 8-week program begins **Thursday, February 16**, at two locations for identical morning and evening sessions: **10am at Rugen Center**, 901 Shermer Road, and **7:30pm at the Glenview Public Library**, 1930 Glenview Road. **Registration is required.**

Material for discussion is contained in a concise 96-page booklet costing \$6, the only expense involved. Discussions will be led by Ed White and Ruth Graf.

Accepted bids: from North Shore Uniforms of Evanston (\$3,186.21) for Public Works and Water Departments; from Schaumburg AMC (\$12,662) for one Cherokee Jeep; from Freeway Ford of Lyons (\$18,804) for a 2.5-ton truck. . . . Amended the liquor ordinance to allow liquor to be served at the Park District's Golf Course. . . .
