### Glenview receives certificate

The Municipal Finance Officers' Association of the United States and Canada has given its **Certificate of Conformance** to Glenview's comprehensive financial report for 1982.

The certificate is North America's highest form of recognition for governmental accounting and financial reporting. Entries are judged by impartial finance officers, CPAs, educators, and other accounting experts.

An **Award of Financial Reporting Achievement** to Glenview's Finance Director, Dennis M. Lauer, accompanied the certificate. Lauer has commended village officials for allowing the Glenview Finance Department the resources to function in a professional manner.

We congratulate Dennis Lauer and his staff for a significant accomplishment in achieving honors sought by many and awarded to few.

## Rules of the road -- similar to those for driving Bikers must obey the traffic laws

**R**iding a bicycle on a public roadway is exactly like driving a car: **Bikers must obey all traffic laws, speed limits, signs and signals.**

Adults should know Illinois' rules of the road and children should be familiar with them through Police Department bicycle-safety programs in the Glenview schools.

**Register your bike** at the Police Department, 1215 Waukegan Road, free of charge. The bicycle license identifies your bike in case it is stolen and later recovered.

**Brakes** must be adequate for stopping on dry and level pavement, and the bike must have a **horn or bell** audible at 100 feet. (Sirens and whistles are illegal.)

**A white headlight** visible for at least 500 feet and a **red rear reflector** are required if you ride after dusk or before dawn.

**A basket or carrier** is required if you carry books or packages. Both hands must be on the handlebars except when signalling.

**Ride with traffic, single-file**, on the right-hand side of the road, except when passing or making left turns.

**Use hand signals:** For left turn, fully extend left arm; for right turn, extend left arm bent at elbow, hand up; for stop, extend left arm bent at elbow, hand down. (Except when making hand signals, both hands must be on the handlebars.)

**Use bicycle paths** wherever provided. You may also ride on sidewalks, **if you give pedestrians ample warning** of approach by horn or bell, and **allow them the right-of-way at all times.** Shouting and whistling are meaningless and rude; **use a horn or bell to warn pedestrians.**

**Handlebar-riding is illegal.** No more than one person may ride on a single-rider bike, except that an adult may carry a small child if the child is securely attached to the cyclist's body in backpack or sling.

**Never attach your bike or yourself** to any other vehicle.

**STOP before reaching a standing school bus**, regardless of which direction the bus is headed. Bicycles, like



cars, may not resume travel until the school bus is under way (or until the driver indicates it is parked).

**No U-turns** on hills, or on streets signed No U-turns. Where U-turns are allowed, look behind for following traffic, ahead for oncoming traffic, and give a left-turn signal.

**Driver's doors of parked cars** may open suddenly, causing serious accidents. Be alert and ready for quick stops.

**Gratings** and other pavement hazards can upset bicycles.

**Traffic entering** from driveways or curb may not be able to see you. Be cautious.

**Wear light-colored clothes or reflective tape**, and put some tape on handlebars, frame and fenders if you ride after dark or before dawn. Wheel reflectors, arm and leg lights are available at low cost and could save your life.

**Parents:** Get free copies of "Bicycle Rules of the Road" at the Police Department and make sure children read it. **Bikers of any age will be ticketed if they break the law.**

**ALL GLENVIEW DOGS AND CATS** must now display their 1984 license tags. If you need new tags for your pets, bring the following to the Village Hall: A current rabies certificate for each animal, and a veterinarian's statement of neutering for each altered pet. (License tags for altered animals are cheaper.)

**DO SOMETHING WILD!** On your state income-tax form (IL 1040), you can donate \$10 or the amount of your refund, whichever is less, to the Non-game Wildlife Conservation Fund. The donation can be reported on your next year's federal tax form as a contribution to charity. Why not do it?

**COLON/RECTAL SCREENING** and cancer-risk assessment will be held at Glenbrook Hospital Saturday, March 24, from 10am to 3pm. **Reservations must be made by Wednesday, March 14.** The only charge is \$2 for hemocult slides.

The exchange program fosters understanding of the countries, language and customs of others. Student exchange is sponsored by Campus International of Westmont, Illinois, and the French-American Snow Class Association of France.

## Village Board action

O'Hare Airport  
Noise abatement

The area affected by O'Hare Airport's "unacceptable" noise levels has now been reduced (from 89 to 79 square miles), according to a February report by the City of Chicago.

Experimental takeoff and landing patterns were introduced on January 2, and will remain in use through April. (Experimental routing is not used, however, when there are weather problems such as excessive wind or snow and ice on runways.)

Complaints since January 2 have been mostly in regard to night flights, and have come mostly from the northwest side of Chicago, and the suburbs of Elmhurst, Arlington Heights, Elk Grove Village, Schiller Park and Northridge.

## A review of THE 1984 MUNICIPAL BUDGET

On December 19, 1983, the Glenview Village President and Board of Trustees adopted a budget for Fiscal Year 1984. It is different from those of previous years in that it is composed of two separate documents.

One document, containing all municipal operating funds, is called the **ANNUAL OPERATING BUDGET**. The other document, containing funds for capital improvements, is called the **CAPITAL BUDGET**.

Glenview Finance Director Dennis M. Lauer has prepared the following information to explain the 1984 budgets and the changes in municipal capital-budgeting policy.

The 1984 Annual Operating Budget contains a financial overview of the Village of Glenview and an account of programs and services provided to residents. Its total — \$14,640,095 — is an increase of 10.2% over the 1983 budget total.

The Annual Operating Budget contains funds designated for transfer to the Capital Budget for specific public-improvement projects. (A description of the Capital Budget is given further along in the article.)

**Q: Exactly what is included in the Annual Operating Budget?**

**A: The Corporate Fund** makes up most of it, accounting for social services (police and fire protection, public works, building and engineering, health services, and general administration).

**Other funds are:**

**The Water and Sewer Fund**, which handles costs of supplying water and sewer services to the village and certain unincorporated areas. It includes the cost of purchasing Lake Michigan water from the Village of Wilmette.

**Retirement Funds** — monies being accumulated for pensions of police officers, firefighters, and other village employees. (There are several different retirement programs.)

**The Debt Service Fund**, which pays principal and interest on bonded debts as they mature. (General obligation bonds issued by the Village of Glenview are recorded in this fund.)

**The Library Fund** — money (mostly from real-estate tax revenue) used for administration of the Glenview Public Library.

**Q: How does the village create an annual budget?**

**A: The process begins in August of every year**, when municipal operating departments (Police, Fire, Administration, and Development and Public Services) prepare their individual budget requests and submit them to the Village Manager. (The Library Board of Directors prepares the library's budget requests.)

At the same time, the Finance Director prepares an estimate of revenues available to each fund during the fiscal year ahead, estimating year-end reserves that will be available, if needed, for the following fiscal year.

The Village Manager and department heads collectively review budget proposals, making whatever changes are necessary to ensure that the total budget proposal is compatible with available income.

A proposed budget is then submitted to the Village Board for consideration, and a final budget is adopted by the Village Board in December.

**Q: How much of each property-tax dollar goes to support the Village of Glenview?**

**A: Less than 10 cents.** In 1983 the Village Board passed a net tax levy of \$2,851,852, of which \$2,187,064 will be spent for municipal purposes during Fiscal Year 1984.

The rest — \$664,788 — will go toward the operation of the Glenview Public Library. (The library's budget and tax-levy request are approved by the Library Board of Directors before being included in the village tax levy.)

For the average Glenview taxpayer, municipal taxes represent only about 12.5% of the total tax bill — 9.6% for the village, and 2.9% for the library.

See Graph I, which shows how 1983 tax bills will be divided.

(NOTE: Information used is for an average residential property in Northfield Township, but tax distributions in Maine, Niles and New Trier Townships will be almost the same.)

**Q: For what will the money collected from real-estate taxes be spent?**

**A: One-third will be spent on pensions and social security, as required by federal and Illinois laws.**

**As for the rest:**

**General Services gets 30%** (for public safety and public works), and **Debt Retirement gets 10%**. The remainder, **27%**, is for salaries, materials and upkeep of the library.

**Q: Does the Village of Glenview have income from sources other than the property tax?**

**A: Yes. The municipality has several other sources of income, the largest of which is the sale of water** (see Graph II).

Water revenue, however, merely pays the debt and operating expenses of the water system, and has no direct effect upon other village services or programs. (Nevertheless, the law requires that water revenue be included in the annual budget.)

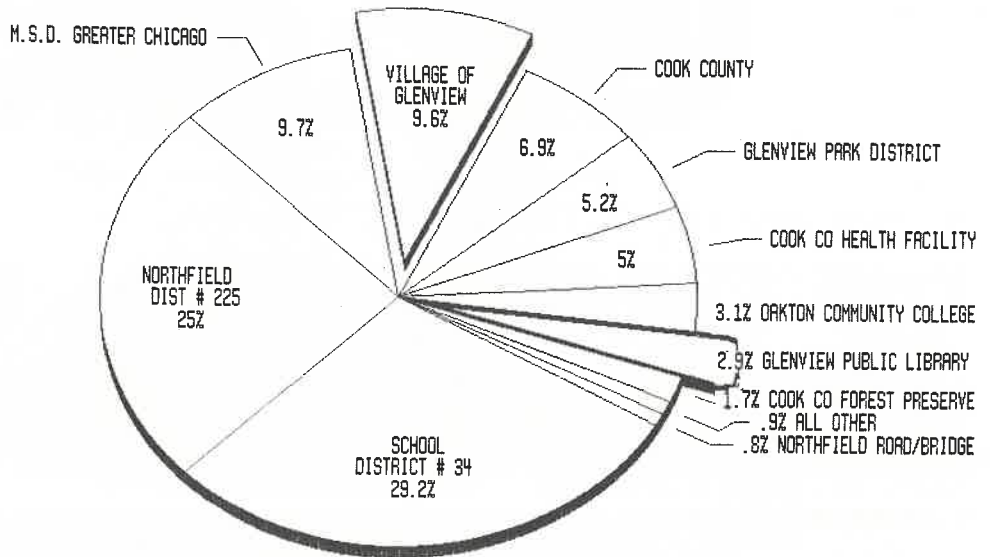
Please note that debt repayment and purchase of lake water from the Village of Wilmette will take 59.5% of 1984's anticipated water revenue. The remainder will be used to pay for personnel, maintenance, insurance, pumping, storage costs, and improvements to the water system.

The village also receives money from **utility taxes**. The 5% local utility tax is collected by electric, gas and telephone companies and remitted to the village. (There is no utility tax on water.) It is expected that utility taxes will provide 12.1% of Glenview's total revenue for 1984.

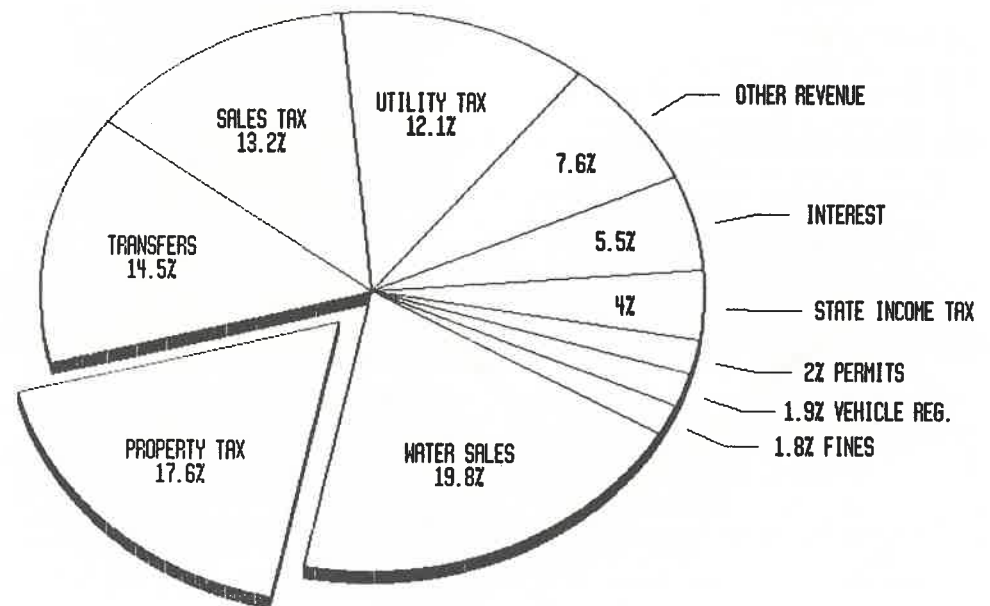
Finally, the village receives money from the **sales tax**. Sales-tax money collected by Glenview merchants is forwarded to the state, which then sends the village its rightful portion. Glenview expects \$2,200,000 in sales taxes for Fiscal Year 1984 — 13.2% of its total anticipated revenue.

**Graph III** shows a breakdown of industries paying sales taxes to Glenview, and their relative rank. (Although based upon 1983 data, figures will be about the same for 1984.)

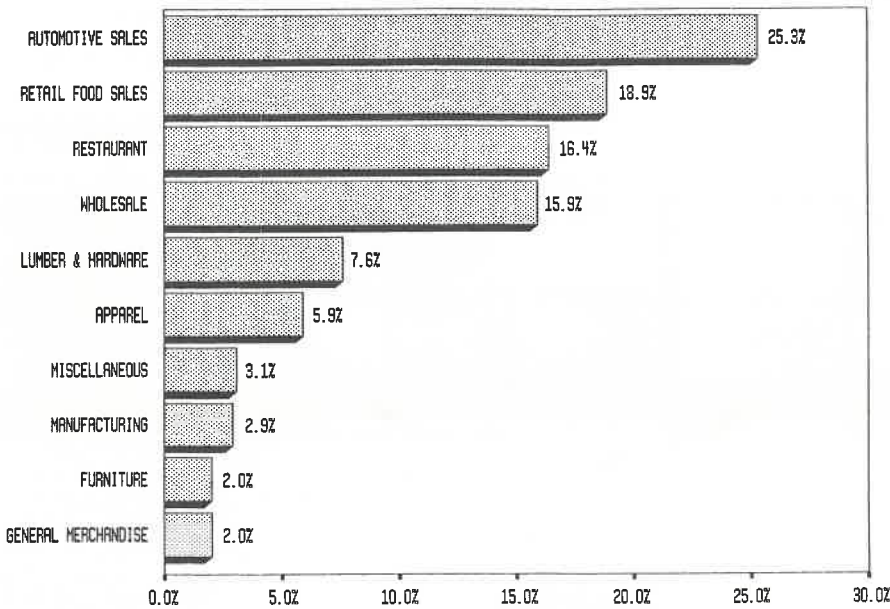
## Graph I: 1983 Real Estate Taxes



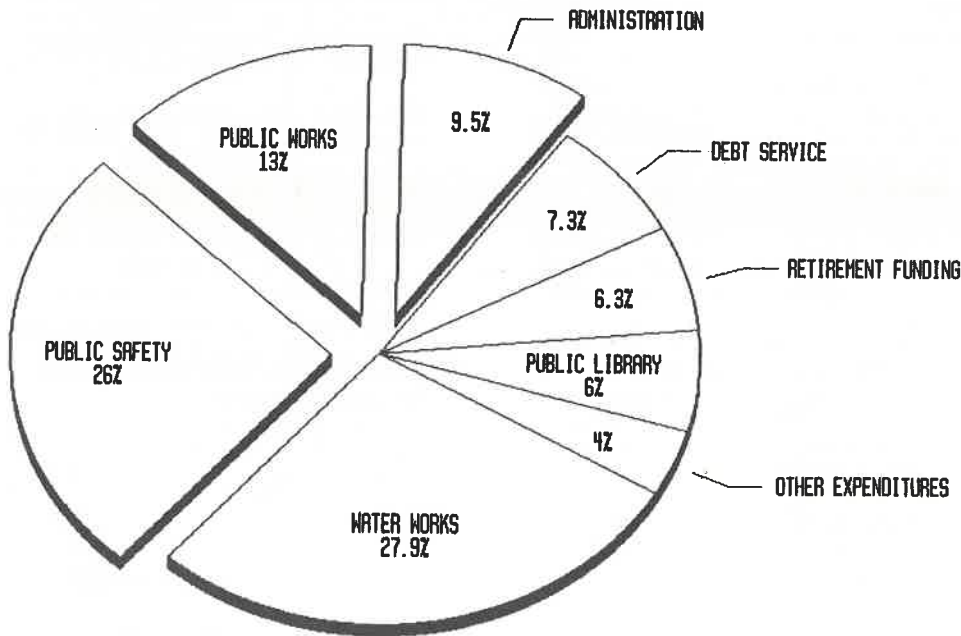
## Graph II: 1984 Revenue All operating funds

**Q: Where does this money go?**

**A: Into 20 different funds, each one earmarked for specific kinds of expenditures.**

The **Corporate Fund** maintains accountability for the majority of village activities — police and fire protection, building inspection, health, engineering, outdoor maintenance and administration. The pulled-out pieces of **Graph IV** show expenses to be paid from the Corporate Fund.

(NOTE: Although water purchase is the largest single expense, the water system operates on a break-even basis, as has already been explained. It is accounted for separately, and appears here for legal and informational purposes only.)

This year the **Corporate Fund** will pay for the following capital improvements:

**Public Works Garage construction** (\$150,000, to be transferred to the Capital Budget).

**Sidewalk construction** near the North Shore Country Club and along a section of Pfingsten Road (\$3,000).

**Sidewalk extension** (\$40,000, to be transferred to the Capital Budget).

**Sidewalk replacements** (\$25,000, to be transferred to the Capital Budget).

**Completion of the storm-water management plan** begun in 1983 (\$50,000).

**Pavement and curb repairs** (\$30,000, to be transferred to the Capital Budget).

**Crack sealing on roadways** (\$15,000).

**Television inspection of certain storm sewers** (\$3,000).

**Tree planting and pruning** (\$30,000).

Graph V compares the 1984 Corporate Fund Budget with those of the last four years. Continuing expenses for general administration, as shown in the white sections, include grants to the following organizations:

- Youth Services of Glenview**
- Glenview Area Safety Council**
- Northfield Township Dial-A-Ride**
- Senior Citizen Program**
- 4th of July Commission.**

A new account, the **Emergency Services and Disaster Agency** (formerly called Civil Defense), has been added to the Administration Department for 1984. Its purpose is to limit the impact of any large-scale disaster, and aid the community in returning to normal after such an occurrence.

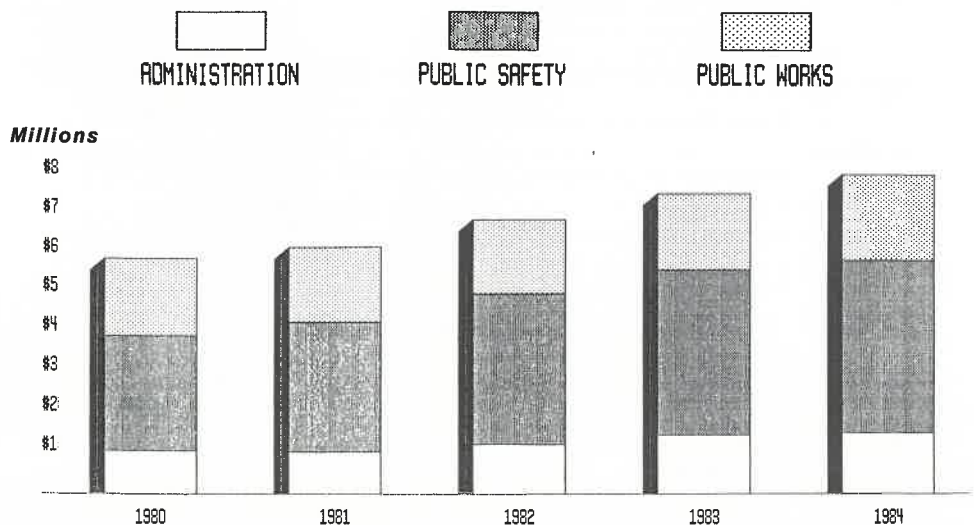
**Insurance** is one of the largest expenses in administration. Glenview will spend \$200,000 in 1984 for general insurance, and \$450,000 for medical insurance for employees. (Because of favorable loss experience, premiums for general insurance have decreased in the past few years.)

**Public safety** (Police and Fire Departments) has always been the most costly item in the Corporate Fund, this year 54% of its budget.

Cost-saving measures have been taken, the most significant being the Fire Department's joining the Regional Emergency Dispatch (RED) Center in 1977. Sharing the costs of fire dispatching with other communities has saved the Village of Glenview more than \$125,000 annually.

**Public Works** (street maintenance, snow and ice removal, engineering, health services, building inspection and traffic control) has traditionally been the most stable budget item, this year representing 26% of the Corporate Fund. During the past five years the cost has decreased from 33% to its present level.

**Q: What is the purpose of the new Capital Budget?**

**A: It is part of a five-year capital improvement program, designed to amortize the costs of constructing and maintaining the municipality's physical assets.**

The program forecasts estimated revenues and expenses of the operating funds over a five-year period, so that projects can be timed to match available funds.

One of the benefits of a capital improvement program is that funds can be accumulated for future projects, minimizing large budget fluctuations and tax levies in the years when such projects are undertaken.

Several road projects are included in 1984's capital improvements, 90% to be paid by Motor Fuel Tax funds, and 10% to be paid by the village. The major ones are as follows:

Reconstruction of **Miller Drive** from Pfingsten Road to Chester Drive (\$150,000).

Resurfacing of **Waukegan Road** from Golf Road to Woodlawn Avenue (\$2,000,000).

Improvements to **Glenview Road** from Lincoln Avenue to Milwaukee Avenue (\$2,725,000).

Reconstruction of **Chestnut Avenue** from Lehigh Avenue to Waukegan Road (\$1,760,000).

Resurfacing projects scheduled for 1984, to be paid for by the village, are as follows:

**Joy Lane**, from East Lake Avenue to Grace Lane.

**Marie Lane**, from Joy Lane to Grace Lane.

**La Fontaine Drive**, from Joy Lane 200 feet west.

**Grace Lane**, from Marie Lane to 100 feet west of Joy Lane.

**Executive Lane**, from Bellwood Lane to the cul de sac.

**Imperial Drive**, from one Executive Lane intersection to the next Executive Lane intersection.

**Wildberry Drive**, from Waukegan Road to the west end.

**Depot Street**, from Grove Street to the south end.
