#### CHILD FINGERPRINTING

If you would like to have your children fingerprinted for identification purposes, the Glenview Police Department invites you to bring them to the Public Safety Building, 1215 Waukegan Road, on Saturday or Sunday, May 19 or 20, between noon and 4pm.

No appointment is necessary, and the service is free. Prints will be given to parents for safekeeping, and no copies will be retained by police. If you have questions, call the Police Department's information number, 729-5000, Monday through Friday between 10am and 6pm.

Some two million children are reported missing in the U.S. every year. Kidnappers have been known to alter hair colors to conceal identities. Children also grow quickly, often changing in appearance. Fingerprints, however, are unique identifications that last a lifetime.

The Police Department strongly recommends that, in addition to fingerprints, parents keep up-to-date photographs of each child, adding new ones every few months, especially during children's early years.

While the photographs and fingerprints are no guarantee that a child will never run away or be lost or kidnapped, they are valuable tools, should tragedy occur.

## No-show violators now summoned to court

### New system instituted last January 1

Beginning last January 1, civil lawsuits are being filed against those who fail to respond to summonses for traffic violations, including parking.

The procedure is as follows: When a traffic ticket is issued, the violator has the choice of paying the fine or requesting a court appearance.

If the violator does not respond, the Glenview Police Department sends two notices via U.S. mail. If the second notice brings no response, police turn the case over to the Village Attorney with a request to file a civil suit with a maximum fine of \$200 plus court costs.

Once the suit has been filed, only the court can make final disposition. The first batch of lawsuits are being filed this month.

About 40% of summonses currently outstanding are against Glenview residents. If you are one of them, you may be able to settle your case before a lawsuit is filed — if you act quickly. Go to the Police Department, 1215 Waukegan Road, and either pay the fine or request a court date.

The new Glenview system is similar to one adopted in Skokie three years ago which has proved effective in settling no-response cases.

# Safety Council explores "kids' line"

he Glenview Area Safety Council will soon conduct a survey to find out if a "Kids' Line" telephone service would serve local needs. The council is considering the following:

- \* After-School Check, for enrolled children to call and say they have arrived home safely.
- \* Phone Friend, for children to talk to when lonely or afraid.

- \* Crisis Line, for emergency help.
- \* Party Line, for parents to ascertain whether teenage parties will be chaperoned.

# If you jog for your health, don't risk your life

OGGERS' ALERT: You must use sidewalks wherever they exist, as mandated by state law. Where no sidewalk exists, the law says you may jog on the shoulder of the road, as long as you run ON THE LEFT-HAND SIDE, against traffic.

Observe all traffic signals, exactly as if driving a car. Stop and run in place if a traffic signal is red, and start forward when it turns green.

Run **single-file** if you're with someone else.

For your own safety, wear bright-colored clothes in daylight hours, and reflective material at dusk or after dark, so motorists can see you. If you run for your health, why risk your life?

Avoid places and times where traffic is heavy — you do yourself more harm than good by breathing exhaust fumes.

M OTORISTS' ALERT: It's a twoway street: Joggers are pedestrians, and you are required to respect

their rights. Yield to them at crosswalks, and exercise caution when you see them on the shoulder of the road.

## Pets are residents too

## Glenview has rules for good citizenship

LENVIEW HAS A DOG-LEASH LAW that mandates the wearing of a collar and leash (with human being attached) whenever a canine is not on the property of its owner.

The law also requires the person walking the dog to carry the means for immediate removal of animal feces from where they are dropped to the property of the owner for proper disposal.

A "pooper scooper" and a self-sealing plastic bag are practical dog-walking accounterments. (Some pet owners use two plastic bags, one worn over the hand, as a pooper-picker-upper.)

Whatever the means, the end is the same: You must pick up dog droppings on the spot, and carry them home to your own garbage or toilet. If droppings are left on pavements, sidewalks or grass they draw insects that can spread disease. (They also draw loud and justifiable criticism from your neighbors.)

Remember that Glenview's collarleash and pooper-scooper laws are in effect 365 days a year.

BOTH DOGS AND CATS must now wear 1984 Glenview license tags. If your pets' credentials are not up to date, take care of the matter as soon as possible at the Village Hall, for the health and safety of the animals.

Please bring a current rabies certificate for each pet, and a veterinarian's statement of neutering for each altered animal. (Licenses for altered animals cost less, but can't be issued without a DVM's statement.)

# Cable television installation now under way in Glenview

as reported in previous issues, Cablenet, Inc., of Mt. Prospect is the company selected to provide Glenview's cable communications.

The company guarantees that 88% of subscribing Glenview homes will be wired no later than September 30, 1984, and the remainder no later than July 1, 1985. Installations have been under way since March 1.

The Glenview Village Board adopted a franchise agreement with Cablenet on December 15 of 1982, giving the company permission to call on village residents to solicit subscribers.

Cablenet is fully bonded, and complete liability insurance is in force. Offices are at 1201 Feehanville Drive, Mount Prospect, and interested Glenview residents are welcome to visit or call.

All questions about cable television should be directed to Cablenet, not to the Village Hall, which has no more information than appears here. (Telephone numbers for Cablenet are listed in the box on this page.)

#### Subscribing to cable TV

Cablenet sales representatives are now working in Glenview, calling on potential subscribers. You will recognize Cablenet personnel by photo-identity cards worn on clothing. Sales reps explain Cablenet services and fees, including charges for connecting video recorders and other electronic components, describe installation procedures, answer questions, and assign installation dates to those who subscribe.

#### Installation of cable TV

A subscriber should clear a work area around the television set so the installer can attach cable and the converter box necessary to handle the number of channels and inputs, transmission frequencies, decoding, and off-air interference. (The box is necessary, even for so-called cable-ready units.)

The converter replaces the tuner of your television set, as all Cablenet programs are received on Channel 3. Remote control is available, although your existing remote-control unit is not compatible with the Cablenet converter.

Installation follows the placement of other utilities — aerial cable where utility poles exist, underground cable where existing utilities are buried.

Residents whose utility lines are underground will receive a brochure describing underground installation and offering three options for locating the cable. If you receive a brochure, mark and return the enclosed card promptly, so Cablenet engineers can install your cable as you prefer.

NOTE: Only residents with underground utilities receive the installation brochure and option card. (If utilities are above ground, the TV cable is affixed to the same poles.)

Representatives of Commonwealth Edison, Illinois Bell, Centel and Northern Illinois Gas supervise installation of underground cable, marking locations of their lines with stakes or temporary spray paint. (Please note that these markings do NOT indicate where TV cable will be laid, but where underground installations already exist.)

If you know of other underground lines such as sprinkler systems, gas, electric or bug lights, please inform Cablenet when you return your card, or call customer service, 299-9240. (Accidental damage caused by Cablenet will be repaired promptly at company expense.)

Restoration and replacement of sod or other landscaping disturbed during installation will be made within a day or two.

Once the cable is installed, Cablenet technicians will activate it to ensure proper delivery. After testing and certification, the service is ready for use.



### Highlights of recent board action

Approved, after a public hearing, Special Service Area #5 (Glenwood Sanitary Sewer), for 5 lots on Glenwood Avenue between Highland Terrace and Woodlawn Avenue.

Authorized an agreement with Harza Engineering for services (not to exceed \$34,250) in connection with rehabilitation of the sanitary-sewer system as required by the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago.
