Vehicle stickers now on sale Display deadline: midnight June 30

Vehicle stickers for 1984-85 are now on sale at the Village Hall (upper level) during regular business hours, Mondays through Fridays. The new stickers are required for all vehicles — passenger cars, trucks, buses, motorcycles and RV's.

You may also buy vehicle stickers at the Street Sale on June 30, at the Fire Department (1815 Glenview Road), **inside the garage, from 9am to noon.** Please bring preprinted forms if you have them.

Vehicle sticker forms were mailed in mid-May, and you may buy stickers by mail. If any of the information on the form is outdated, make the necessary corrections and return it to the Village Hall.

If you received an application form for a vehicle you no longer own, make a note of it on the application and return it to the Village Hall, or call the Finance Department, 724-1700.

New vehicle stickers must be displayed on the **lower right-hand (passenger) side of windshields, no later than midnight, June 30.** Police will ticket cars without new stickers in place by that time.

During the month of June only, stickers cost \$10 for cars under 35hp, and \$20 for cars over 35hp. Senior adults may license one car per household at \$3.75 (under 35hp), or \$7.50 (over 35hp).

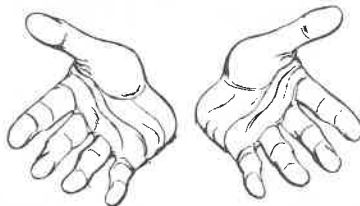
As of July 1, prices increase 25%.
As of August 1, prices increase 50%.

SOME METERED PARKING SPACES are available along Railroad Avenue south of Dewes Street. If you take a train to Chicago only infrequently, you may be interested in using them.

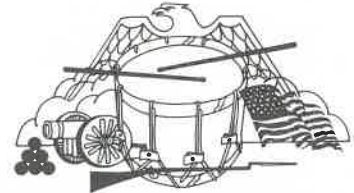

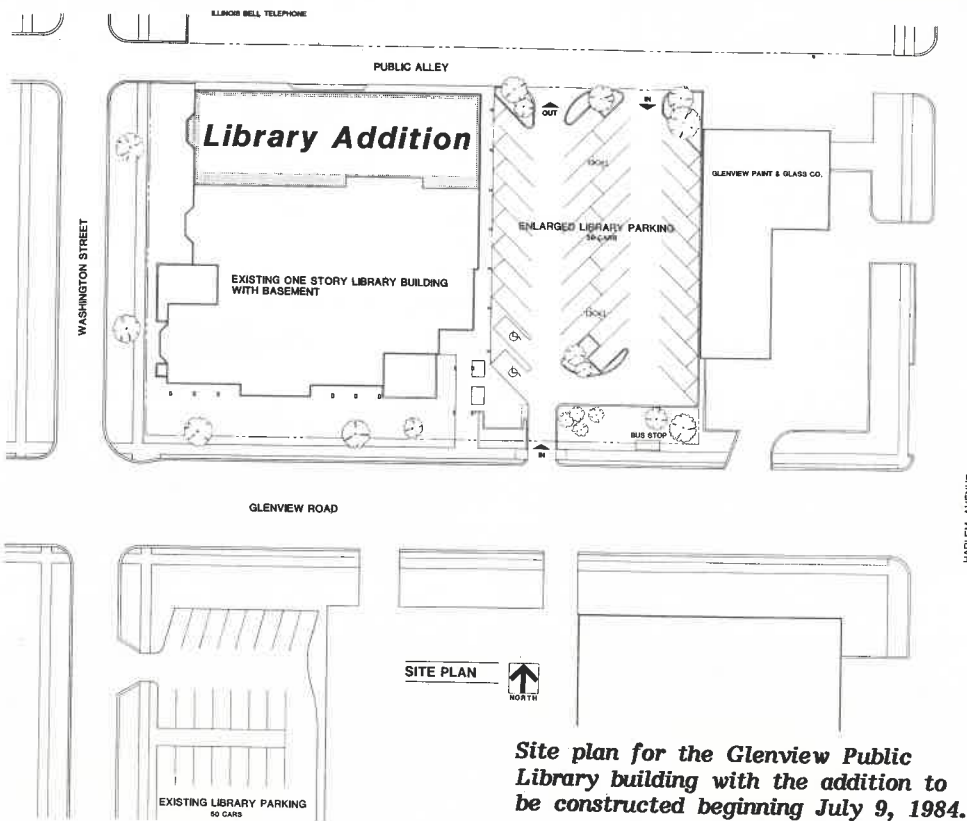

Recent action of the Village Board

Appropriated Motor Fuel Tax funds for resurfacing Miller Drive (\$160,000) and Grace, Imperial and Wildberry Drives, Joy and Marie Lanes (\$283,000). . . .

Approved an engineering agreement for Special Service area 5 (Glenwood, from Sunset Ridge to Highland Terrace) with Norman J. Toberman Associates of Arlington Heights (\$3,500). . . .

Approved an agreement with the Illinois Department of Transportation for a 12-community North Shore Intermittent Resurfacing plan handled by a single contractor, and **authorized Motor Fuel Tax funds** (\$3,000) for engineering services by Ciorba Group, Inc. . . .

Fire Department reminders

TAKE CARE WITH outdoor equipment this summer. Use only electric grill starters bearing the UL (or other approved testing agency) labels. Only **heavy-duty outdoor extension cords** should be used out-doors. Never use liquid fire starter after coals are lit — flareups can inflict serious burns and start fires.

Store gasoline for mowers in approved, tightly capped, labeled containers used for gasoline (never kerosene) only. **Never refuel a hot lawnmower** — gasoline dripping onto the muffler exhaust can ignite vapor and cause serious injury.

JOGGERS PLEASE NOTE: It is against the law to jog on the road if a sidewalk is available. Where there is no sidewalk, jog on the shoulder against traffic. Jog in place at a red light (pedestrians must obey all traffic signals). Jog single file when with another jogger.

Blood needed -- donors safe

Blood donors are needed at the Blood Center of Northern Illinois, 1255 Milwaukee Avenue, Glenview, to help supply 25 hospitals in the Chicago area depending solely upon the center for both whole blood and blood components.

Blood use has increased recently, as transfusions are now routine in treatment of cancer, heart disease, and many other ailments.

There is absolutely no danger of catching any form of disease through blood donation. If you're in doubt about this, consult your family doctor,

who will reassure you.

Donation hours at the Blood Center are 1 to 8pm Mondays through Thursdays, 9am to 4pm Fridays, and 8am to 1pm Saturdays.

Appointments are suggested — call 298-9660, but walk-in donors are also very welcome.

Persons in good health between 17 and 65 who weigh at least 110 pounds are probably eligible blood donors. If you have questions, call the Blood Center at 298-9660.

GASP got you down? Maybe NORTRAN's the ticket

Due to Glenview Area Street Projects and other road work throughout the metropolitan area this summer and fall, you may find NORTRAN (North Suburban Mass Transit) a big help in getting around.

Inexperienced riders should note the following ticket possibilities:

RTA Regular Monthly Pass, \$40 (\$18 for seniors and handicapped with proper identification), good for unlimited rides on NORTRAN, RTA and CTA buses and rapid transit lines.

— Can be bought by mail with a form from NORTRAN drivers, and a form for the following month will be enclosed with each pass. (Can also be bought in some suburbs from the 25th of one month to the 5th of the next; ask the bus driver for a list.)

— Best buy for daily riders and those dependent upon public transportation.

RTA Local/Feeder Monthly Pass, \$23 (\$9.50 for seniors and handicapped), good for unlimited rides on local routes.

— Can be bought by mail with a form from NORTRAN drivers, and a form for the following month will be enclosed with each pass.

— Best buy for those taking local buses to railway stations or making regular trips within a local area.

— Can be bought by mail from NORTRAN, P.O. Box 388, Des Plaines IL 60016 (call 297-0135).

— Eliminates the need for exact change to ride the bus.

— Best buy for occasional riders.

CTA Supertransfers, \$1.40 (70¢ for seniors and handicapped), available Sundays and holidays.

— Can be bought from NORTRAN drivers.

— Good for all-day riding, any direction, on NORTRAN, RTA and CTA buses and trains.

Work offered for seniors who qualify

The federally sponsored Senior Companion Program is seeking men and women 60 and older who are not otherwise employed, and whose annual incomes do not exceed the following:

**\$6,080 for a 1-person household,
\$8,180 for a 2-person household,
\$10,280 for a 3-person household.**

The work consists of visiting house-bound elderly or younger disabled people regularly, one day a week (talking, reading, listening, walking — whatever is needed), and attending two meetings a month in a convenient location.

One day of orientation training, held in downtown Chicago, starts you off.

Pay is \$2 per hour, transportation is reimbursed at \$1.75 per day (bus or train) or 20¢ per mile (car), meal allowance is \$1.35 per day of 4 or more hours, and Worker's Compensation Insurance is offered on the job.

A COMPUTERIZED LIST of homes with invalids is maintained by the Glenview Fire Department. It enables firefighters to know where someone needs special attention in case of fire. The only way the department can know of an invalid in your home is if you register, so your address can be placed on the list. **If you have an unregistered invalid in your home, call 724-2141 between 8:30am and 5pm.**

Beware of scams and con games

Especially during spring and summer months, swindlers play confidence games with suburbanites by offering home and property improvements at "bargain" prices.

Beware of the person who knocks on your door selling a blacktop job for your driveway. (It may be done with used crankcase oil that glistens but never dries.)

Beware of the person offering roof or chimney repairs. (They may not be needed.) Often the pitch goes, "We are working in the neighborhood and have material left over, notice your driveway (roof or chimney) needs repair, and can do it **right now** at a discount." (It's always "right now," because they don't want you to do any checking.)

Don't bite. When your property needs improvements or repairs, follow these steps:

- 1 - Phone at least three contractors (preferably established local businesses who appear in the Yellow Pages), and get bids.
- 2 - Ask the one whose bid is most attractive for names, addresses and

phone numbers of at least three people for which similar work has been done.

- 3 - Call or visit these people to see whether the work is satisfactory.
- 4 - **Never** pay anyone in advance — reliable businesses don't ask.

Older people and women living alone should be especially careful, as confidence operators consider them the easiest targets.

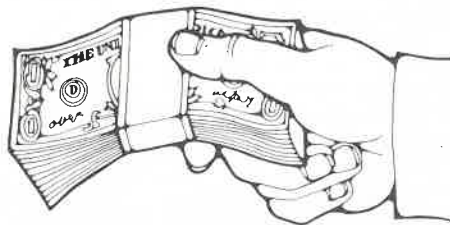
Other scams to watch out for are **medical frauds** ("miracle" cures or remedies for common ailments), the **pigeon drop** (in which "found" money is matched with yours and held by a "lawyer" — who then disappears with it), and the **bank examiner** (claiming to be an official of your own bank, who asks you to help trap a "dishonest employee" by withdrawing money from your own account).

If you suspect you are being victimized, call the police immediately. **If you've already been defrauded, call police and report it.** Don't be embarrassed — criminals count on you to keep your mouth shut so they can go on stealing. Don't cooperate!

TREES AND SHRUBBERY on private properties **must not overhang sidewalks, streets or alleys, or cover traffic or street signs.** Visual blockage is hazardous to motorists, cyclists and pedestrians. Private shrubs and low-hanging limbs must be trimmed back by property owners **at least one foot from any public way.** Shrubs and hedges **at corner locations must not be higher than 36 inches from the ground.** Please cooperate.

Solicitors misrepresent: Glenview doesn't benefit

Police Chief David J. Kelly and Acting Fire Chief John Robberson issue the following warning to Glenview residents:

Solicitors claiming to collect money for police and fire organizations are continuously at work in the suburbs. Glenview's Police and Fire Departments are NOT part of any organization that raises money or sells ads.

Representatives of the Combined County Police Association and police benevolent societies and funds may visit businesses for ads, or telephone residents selling tickets for various events.

These organizations have nothing to do with the Glenview Police Department, which is financed by the Village of Glenview and does not profit in any way from donations, sales or ads.

Robberson reports that solicitors for Associated Firefighters of Illinois may ask Glenview businesses for ads to run in a publication called Illinois Firefighter, and Friends of Illinois Firefighters may solicit funds from both businesses and residents.

Neither organization has anything to do with the Glenview Fire Department, which is financed by the Village of Glenview and does not profit in any way from the efforts of solicitors.

Disregard anything solicitors say to the contrary. If you give or buy, be advised that it does not benefit our community.

The best advice: Don't give donations just to get rid of solicitors. It only encourages them to return year after year.
