## Children's Health and Safety Fair July 21

Glenbrook Hospital's annual Children's Health and Safety Fair will be held Saturday, July 21, from 10am to 3pm, on the hospital grounds (in the Glenbrook South High School gym, in case of rain). Admission is free, and parking is in the high-school lot.

Children from 4 to 13 will enjoy experiences that teach safe play habits, increase awareness of everyday hazards, and familiarize them with hospitals and physical examinations.

A new feature this year: **Free fingerprinting of children for identification** by the Glenview Police Department.

A rescue demonstration will be performed at 1:30 by a Coast Guard helicopter in cooperation with the Glenview Water Rescue Unit. The helicopter itself will be on display beginning at 11:30.

Among other equipment and displays will be those of the Glenview Fire and Police Departments, the Glenview Safety Council, Glenbrook Hospital, and the Boy Scouts of America.

Children will receive free balloons, Frisbees and popcorn, and adults as well as children will enjoy the entertainment, including a puppet show.

## New village facility complete Architect lauded for design

Andrew Metter of the firm of Sisco/Lubotsky Associates, Ltd., of Chicago, architect of the new Glenview Public Works Service Center at 1325 Shermer Road, has received an American Institute of Architects Distinguished Building Award for the structure's unique design.

The odd-shaped site, as well as the building's purpose, made Metter's job a challenging one, yet his design won against those of some 100 other Chicago architects designing buildings of different kinds.

Slides of the Public Works Center

interior and a scale model of the structure will be on exhibit at the Chicago Art Institute next month, when Metter's award will be officially bestowed.

The Public Works Department is in the process of moving into the new facility, which contains space and features needed for Public Works personnel, operations, vehicles, equipment, supplies, and storage.

The old and long-inadequate Public Works garage at 1222 Depot Street will be maintained until subsequent project phases have been completed.

The only way the department can find out about an invalid living in your house is if you register, so your address can be added to the computerized list. **TREES AND SHRUBBERY** on private properties must not overhang sidewalks, streets or alleys, or cover traffic or street signs. Visual blockage is hazardous to motorists, cyclists and pedestrians. Private shrubs and low-hanging limbs must be trimmed back by property owners at least one foot from any public way. Shrubs and hedges at corner locations must not be higher than 36 inches from the ground. Please cooperate.

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## Pets need special care in hot weather

**D**on't leave your pet in a parked car on a warm day. In 10 minutes the temperature inside can reach 102 F — enough to cause heat stroke, collapse, brain damage, and agonizing death. (If you park in the shade, the sun can move within minutes, causing excessive heat buildup, even with all the windows open.)

Heat stroke must be treated immediately by getting the animal into cool water and then to a veterinarian for emergency treatment.

Pets eat less in hot weather, but need more fresh, cool drinking water. If you feed and water pets outdoors, make sure the food is not left out for any length of time to breed dangerous toxins and attract insects. **Make sure water supplies are kept plentiful and fresh.**

Don't exercise pets as often or as much in hot weather, and do it in the cooler hours of morning and evening. Make sure your animals have **shady places to rest**. Be alert for unusual drooling or panting, which can indicate the onset of heat stroke.

If your pet is stung by a bee or wasp, take it to a vet as soon as pos-



sible. (Tip: Meat tenderizer relieves the pain temporarily while you get professional help.)

Watch for patches of raw skin or excessive scratching — fleas and ticks can cause serious problems in the summer. Ask your veterinarian for help before an animal becomes dangerously ill.

Dennis Goessele, Glenview Animal Control Officer, reminds you that **your pets are dependent upon you for their very lives**. Don't let them down.

## Highlights of recent board action

**Adopted agreements** in connection with the Glenview Road improvement project (reconstruction, resurfacing and widening of the roadway, closed storm drainage, curbs, gutters and sidewalks, bridge repairs and incidentals), adding Glenview Road (state thoroughfare) to Glenview's street system for maintenance, and allocating \$85,646 from local Motor Fuel Tax funds for Glenview's share of the \$3.8 million total cost. . . . **Approved a supplemental agreement** for storm-water detention between Milwaukee Avenue and Greenwood Road (Glenview's share being \$4,391 of the \$29,273 total). . . . **Prohibited parking** between Milwaukee Avenue and Lincoln Street for duration of the Glenview Road improvement project. . . . **Authorized issuance** of \$3,100,000 in General Obligation bonds for the addition to the Glenview Public Library, sold on July 2. . . . **Approved additional funds** (\$13,316 from Motor Fuel Taxes) to finish payment for Linneman Street paving. . . . **Authorized extension** of the Northeast Multiregional Training agreement for the Police Department to June, 1985. . . . **Approved village water service** for an office building at 2140 Sanders Road (unincorporated). . . . **Annexed** one lot at 1034 Linden Lane, at request of owner. . . . **Rezoned 3605**

**Lawson Road** to permit use as a 5-lot residential subdivision. . . . **Approved two subdivisions** in the unincorporated area (within village jurisdictional boundaries of 1½ miles) for multifamily housing. . . . **Appointed Linda Kreer Witt, Michael Downing and Joseph Slattery** Glenview's representatives to the 6-person North Shore Cable Commission overseeing Cablevision service to Glenview and Northbrook.

**SOME PROPERTY-TAX BILLS** could be down this year because of the lower state multiplier ("equalizer") — **1.9122**, as compared to **1.9288** last year. Most Cook County tax bills will be about the same, however (or even higher), due to higher levies by local taxing bodies such as libraries, park districts and school districts.

By state law, the assessed value of homes must be 33% of current market value. Cook County assesses them at a little over 17%, which is brought up to the 33% requirement when multiplied by the equalizer.

In the August issue we will explain how to analyze your tax bill and what to do if you think it is too high.

## You can show at art fair

**T**he Glenview Art League and the First Trust and Savings Bank of Glenview will cosponsor the 31st Annual Outdoor Art Fair on Saturday and Sunday, July 28 and 29, 11am to 5pm, on the grounds of Lyon School, corner of Lake Avenue and Waukegan Road.

**Art by students** age 6 through college will be exhibited in a special student section, without fee or registration required. Bring your work to the grounds early Saturday morning and set up your own display. It will be judged and prizes awarded.

**"Glenview's Own,"** also without fee or registration, is for residents of the village who paint. Bring one or two of your works, framed and ready to hang on display boards furnished by the Glenview Art League. They will also be judged and prizes awarded.



**TEMPORARY HANDICAPPED PARKING "Blue Cards"** are now available upon application to the Glenview Police Department. Like the permanent Blue Cards, they enable the temporarily handicapped to use Handicapped Parking spaces. A physician's statement is required, attesting to the driver's temporary inability to walk more than 100 feet at one time. Valid for three months from date of issue, the cards must be returned to police upon expiration. Inquire at the Police Information Desk or call 729-5000.

## Blood Center reduces fees, helps lower health costs

The Blood Center of Northern Illinois, a nonprofit organization headquartered at 1255 North Milwaukee Avenue in Glenview, provides all blood and blood components for patients in 26 Chicago area hospitals, including Evanston, Glenbrook, Highland Park, Holy Family, Lake Forest, Lutheran General, Saint Francis, and Skokie Valley.

As of July 2 the Blood Center board has reduced its service fees for the three most-used components — red cells, platelets and frozen plasma — by \$2 each. These reductions, made possible by volunteer donors and organizations and astute cost-cutting

measures, will result in annual savings to hospitals of more than \$260,000.

A close working relationship between the Blood Center and member hospitals has utilized blood so as to reduce outdated supplies to less than 2%.

The center maintains permanent donation points in Glenview, Chicago, Hoffman Estates and Elmhurst. You can help keep the cost of medical care down by donating weekdays (1 to 8pm, and 1 to 4pm Fridays) and Saturdays (8am to 1pm) at the Milwaukee Avenue address. **THE ONLY KNOWN CURE** for Dutch elm disease is removal and destruction of afflicted trees. Beetles breed in diseased wood, and unless such wood is burned will spread to healthy trees. Forestry experts say losses of the *ulmus americana* species will probably continue, but development of new and more resistant species will assure the longevity of new and future elms. Meantime, watch for evidence of disease in old elms (dead leaves, twigs and small branches) and call the Village Hall (724-1700). Public Works personnel will test suspect elms.

## Play safe with food in hot weather

Food poisoning, an intestinal infection caused by bacteria or toxins emitted by bacteria, is temporary but painful. Vomiting and diarrhea are usual.

Depending upon the kind of bacteria involved, there may also be abdominal pain, headache, chills, and fever. Sickness can occur within one to five hours of eating.

Poisoning usually occurs after eating prepared food kept at warm temperatures too long. In any season, foods not eaten immediately should be either refrigerated or frozen if they are saved for eating later.

Refrigeration slows the growth of bacteria, and freezing stops it, but



neither can be depended upon to destroy toxins already formed.

Keep hot foods **really hot** — above 140 F, and cold foods **really cold** — below 40 F (which is the temperature inside most refrigerators).

Bacteria reproduce themselves rapidly. If you're not sure patio or picnic foods have been properly handled, **throw them away**. Why risk getting sick?

## Glenview detective, businessman receive county awards

**D**etective Ronald Tomanek, a five-year veteran of the Glenview police force, was recently honored by Cook County State's Attorney Richard M. Daley at a ceremony held at the Second District Circuit Court House in Skokie.

The recognition was for Officer Tomanek's successful efforts in tracing to Wisconsin and apprehending a man responsible for a series of thefts in northern Illinois communities, including Glenview.

At the same ceremony, Daley presented an award to Glenview service station attendant Rick Suddeth, who saw someone entering the deserted

house at Harlem Avenue and Glenview Road, across the street from his station, called police, and described the man's movements until police arrived and arrested the intruder.

Glenview Police Chief David Kelly, who was present at the awards ceremony, is proud of Officer Tomanek's devotion to duty. Of Suddeth's alert and prompt action Chief Kelly says, "This is exactly the kind of cooperation police need from members of the public in order to deter crime."
