Federal funds granted for Glenview senior housing

HUD approves more than \$4.5 million low-interest loan

The federal department of Housing and Urban Development has approved a low-interest loan of more than \$4.5 million (\$4,544,900) to the Village of Glenview for construction and site development of senior housing at Harlem Avenue and Glenview Road.

The Glenview development was one of 10 Illinois projects receiving HUD grants in 1984. Village officials were notified of the approval on Sept. 25.

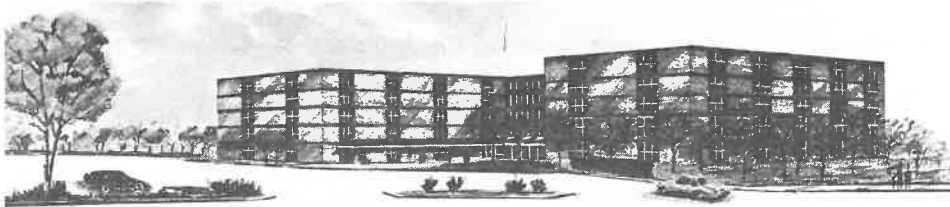
Evangelical Health Systems of Oak Brook, sponsor of the development, has appointed EPB/McBride of Schaumburg as architects and engineers.

Residents should understand that securing the loan approval is only the first step in a series, involving considerable federal paperwork, and no timetable has yet been established.

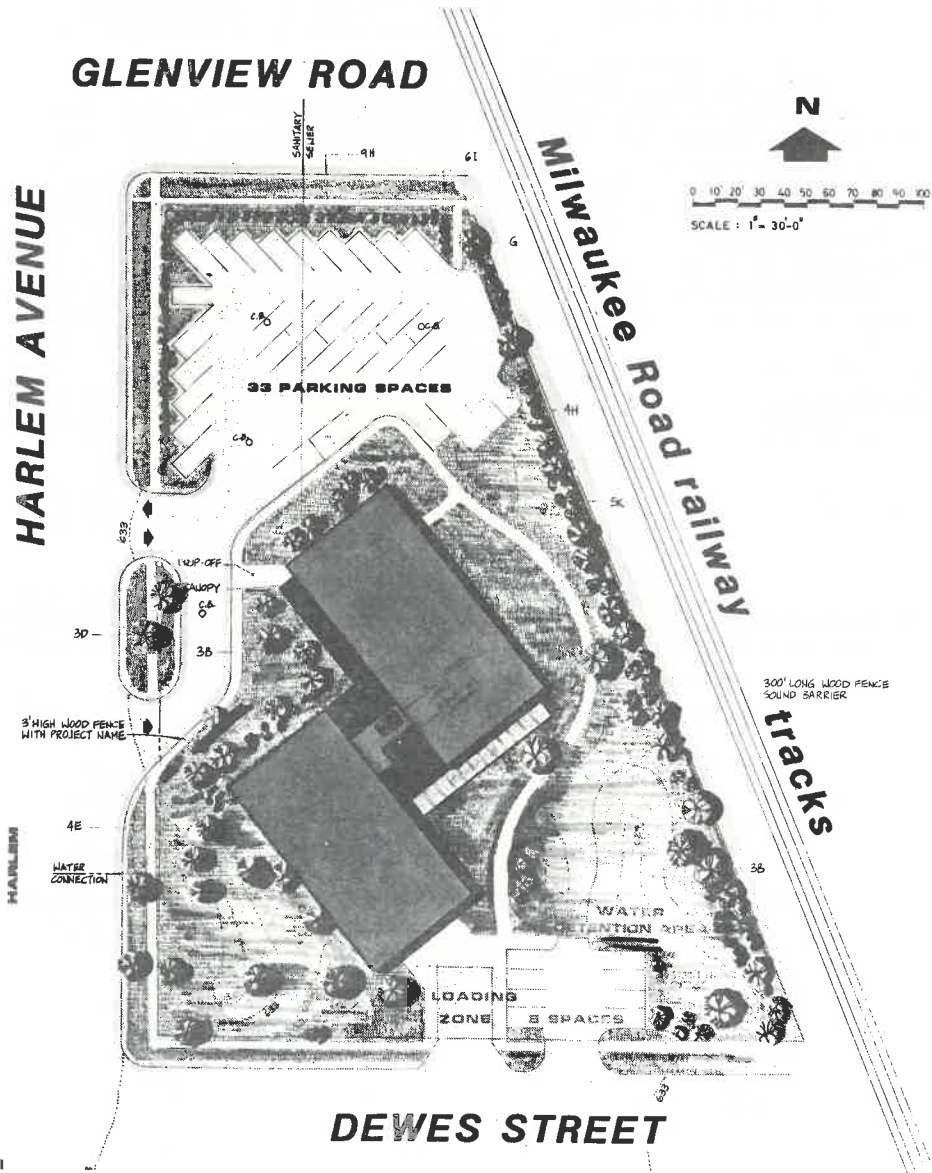
Village officials estimate that construction will probably not begin for another 12 to 18 months. Guidelines for tenant eligibility and applications for tenancy will not be decided upon until construction is finally under way. Progress will be reported here as news is made available and decisions are made.

Parents should encourage children to attend parties and community events this year instead of going door to door on Halloween.

Those who do not attend parties should limit door-to-door visits to **Wednesday, October 31, from 3 to 8pm.** Village President Tom Smith and Police Chief David Kelly urge parents to see that their children **strictly observe the time frame.**

Children should be accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult and visit **only homes in their own neighborhoods where residents are known to them, and then only if outside lights are burning.**

The chaperone should make sure children **do not go inside any house or put anything in their mouths while on their rounds.** Everything collected should be brought home for careful inspection by parents.

Residents willing to treat children should do so **only between 3 and 8pm on Wednesday, October 31,** turning on outside lights and securing pets.

Crossing Guard jobs open at Police Dept.

School Crossing Guards, employees of the Glenview Police Department, perform a valuable service by protecting the lives of school children and other pedestrians during the school year.

There is no way that Glenview could afford to employ enough full-time police officers for such work, as there are more school intersections in the village than there are police officers on duty during any one shift.

Men and women able to do part-time outdoor work earn \$5.25 an hour (\$21 a day, \$105 a week, or \$420 per average school month). Adults of any age may apply. A VERY SMALL PERCENTAGE of residents have had problems with Cablenet installation, and the Northshore Cable Commission is investigating each case with care. This takes time, as commissioners aim for long-term satisfaction rather than the quick fix.

Those now considering subscribing to Cablenet should talk with neighbors regarding front vs. rear installation, making sure everyone involved understands agreements affecting the entire street or block.

Help offered to first-time home buyers

A plan to assist first-time buyers purchase single-family homes offers a limited number of mortgage loans at lower than market rates to those qualified. Congress has extended the time for issuance of tax-exempt mortgage revenue bonds, and Cook County is now financing the plan.

There is no annual income requirement, and houses may be either old or new. Maximum purchase prices average \$103,840 for existing structures and \$124,960 for new ones.

Minimum down payment is 5% of the purchase price. If less than 20% is put down, a private mortgage insurance policy is required.

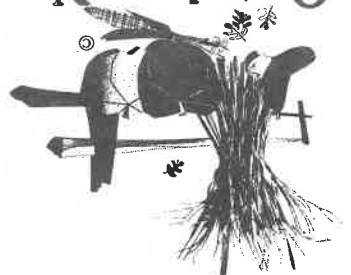
