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State opens hotline for nursing-home complaints

The Illinois Department of Aging now has a 24-hour toll-free hotline for complaints and questions regarding nursing homes: 1-800/252-4343.

The Cook County Department of Public Health has appointed **Karen Lewandowski** as ombudsman, to respond to calls concerning nursing homes in Cook County.

Hotline calls are referred to the appropriate agency. Lewandowski will follow up Cook County violations posing no immediate danger to life (such as complaints of cold food or room assignments). More serious violations will be investigated and resolved at a higher level.

The North Shore Senior Center provides such services as visitors for lonely nursing-home residents in Northfield Township. Call **Hertha Rhode, 446-8750** for more information about the visitor program, which uses services of volunteers and is eager to have more.

THE COOK COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH offers a number of free services for suburban residents. For information call the North District Office, 470-7227.

Winter parking rule in effect Sat., December 1, at 2 am

Although you may be reading this under the balmiest of weather conditions (we have no way of knowing at press time), winter legally arrives on December 1.

On Saturday, December 1, the winter **No-Overnight-Street-Parking** rule goes into effect in Glenview. Cars parked on the street between 2 and 6am will be ticketed by police, even if no snow has fallen. In the event of a snowfall, vehicles illegally parked may be towed away.

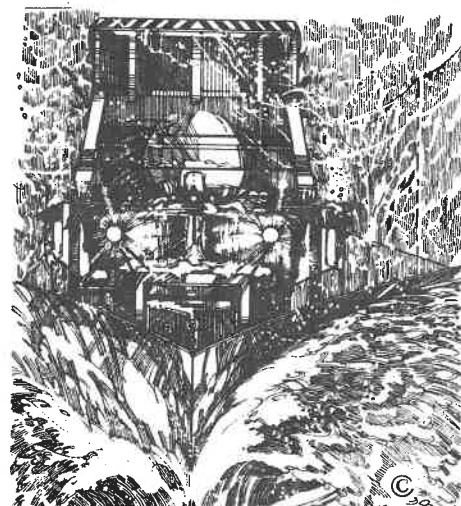
Since 1979 Glenview has had an ordinance prohibiting parking on village streets between 2 and 6am from December 1 through March 31, because Public Works crews must work before dawn to clear streets of snow and ice, and cars parked on roadways make the job impossible.

Prior to the ordinance residents were requested not to park overnight during winter months, but the request

WINTER DRIVING presents more hazards than are encountered during more benign seasons, especially at night. **Pedestrians**, including joggers, should be careful after dark or before dawn, and wear either light-colored clothing or reflective vests or tapes to prevent being run down. Glenview also has a law concerning winter care of sidewalks:

"Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the village abutting upon any public way or public place shall remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk in front of such building or lot of ground."

Please obey the law by removing snow and ice from your sidewalks promptly after each snowfall. Mail carriers, children and senior adults have to use the sidewalks every day.

SOIL AT THE BASE OF TREES should be graded level, in order to make the roots grow down instead of sideways. Dirt piled around a tree trunk can cause girdling of roots and eventual death of the tree. Frequent cultivation of soil around the tree trunk allows moisture and air to enter and benefit the roots. Birches and hard maples should be watered in late November before the ground freezes, to prevent winter kill.

Appropriated \$238,838 (from local Motor Fuel Tax funds) for construction engineering to improve Glenview Road from Waukegan Road to Milwaukee Avenue. . . . **Approved** the Cable Commission budget (\$117,564) from Cable-net revenue (no tax dollars involved). . . . **Amended** the zoning ordinance to allow village trustees to make variations in Planned Development districts. . . . **Approved** sale of village water: To one lot near the corner of Harms and Old Orchard Roads in Skokie (just over the Glenview boundary, where an office building is planned; and to a 2-acre lot on the east side of Milwaukee Avenue just south of Countryside Lane, where a small warehouse is planned. . . . **Issued the annual denial** of the library's request for part of the village's general revenue-sharing funds. . . . **Amended** the zoning ordinance to remove certain restrictions regarding building setbacks in areas for public and industrial uses. . . . **Rezoned** 4515 West Lake Avenue for Planned Development (hotel and restaurants), approved outdoor dining and drive-in use, and gave final approval of the subdivision. . . . **Approved** dedication of right-of-way at 990 River Drive (for roadway turnaround required by the closure of River Drive at Waukegan Road). . . . **Approved** automo-

tive repair as a conditional use at 2003 Johns Drive and 2105 Johns Court (industrial district I-2). . . . **Annexed** one lot at 10335 Dearlove Road. . . . **Approved** a 1-lot subdivision at 3615 Countryside Lane. . . . **Authorized** purchase of a Motorola cardiac monitor defibrillator for paramedic use (not to exceed \$7,395). . . . **Accepted bids:** \$1,211 for sale of a house at 1253 Shermer Road (to be moved by buyer); Nels J. 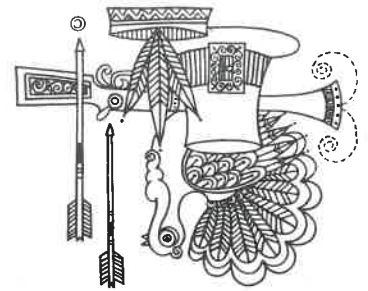
POLICE CHIEF DAVID J. KELLY reminds Glenview residents that from now until after the Christmas holidays burglars and prowlers are planning the best season of their year: Breaking into homes and autos to steal expensive new merchandise. Though your home and auto security should remain tight all year round, police urge you to be especially careful from now on. Put parcels and packages in the trunk of your car, never on the seats where they can be seen. Keep your house and car locked all the time, even when you're at home or think you'll be gone for only a minute. Thieves count on carelessness and trustfulness. **Don't cooperate!**

A NEW ENGRAVING TOOL using no electricity (it works like a ball-point pen) is now available at local stores at very low cost. Police believe that property engraved with the owner's name and driver's license number is less likely to be stolen, and if lost can be easily identified and returned. Electric engraving tools are loaned free at the Police Department — just ask at the Information Desk.
