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THE ESTIMATED TOTAL of the 1983 village budget is \$16,858,111, a 6.01% increase over the 1982 budget, maintaining the same levy appropriation for the corporate fund as in the past four years. The new budget includes \$12,000 for the purchase of bullet-proof vests for police personnel. An extensive analysis of the village budget will appear in the February issue.

APPLICATIONS FOR EMPLOYMENT as School Crossing Guards are now being taken at the Police Department. Crossing Guard positions pay \$5 an hour for a weekly minimum of 15 hours (some assignments are for 20 hours a week). Men and women over age 18 are invited to apply by calling the Police Department, 729-5000.

Trained specialists enforce the law

Time was when anyone who fit a police uniform was handed a nightstick or gun and told to go out and enforce the law. Fortunately, those days are long gone.

Among Glenview's 56 police officers there are many highly educated and well-rounded people. Among the college degrees held by sworn personnel are a master's and three bachelor's degrees in education, as well as bachelor's degrees in economics, history, biology, chemistry and political science, and one each in criminal justice and law enforcement.

There are several associate degrees in criminal justice and law enforcement, and one diploma in criminal justice management.

All of Glenview's sworn police officers are graduates of police training schools, including the Cook County Sheriff's Police Academy, the Chicago Police Academy, the University of Illinois Police Training Institute, and the Illinois Department of Law Enforcement Academy.

One Glenview officer is currently enrolled in a nine-month Traffic Institute course at Northwestern University. Several others have taken special work at the Southern Police Institute and the FBI Academy.

David Kelly, the Glenview Chief of Police, is a graduate of the Northwestern University Traffic Institute, the Southern Police Institute, the University of Minnesota Juvenile Officers' Institute, and is now finishing work at

Northwestern University for a degree in sociology and business administration.

Specialized police training never stops, because new and better crime-prevention techniques are continually developed and perfected. In 1981 the Police Department had a training budget of \$14,370. In 1982 the figure rose to \$23,584. In 1983, the projected amount is \$26,950. The funds are used for recruit training, tuition for special courses, and travel expenses to and from such points as Louisville (the Southern Police Institute) and Quantico (the FBI Academy).

Occasionally a special grant for education is received, such as the one from the Illinois Department of Transportation this past November (\$17,000) for an 80-hour course in accident investigation, conducted by Northwestern University Traffic Institute personnel at the Glenview Police Department, and attended by seven of our own officers and 27 from other communities.

Another recent no-cost bonanza: a three-day defensive-driving school, conducted by the Illinois Department of Law Enforcement at the Glenview Police Department, and attended by all Glenview sworn police personnel, the police cadets, the Animal Control Officer and one dispatcher. This was the first time the course had been offered away from the Springfield academy, and was available to our department as a pilot program. Considered a success here, it now takes to the road for the benefit of other Illinois communities.

MONDAY, JANUARY 24, is the final filing date for candidates for **Village Trustees** (3 to be elected for 4 years), **Village Clerk** (1 to be elected for 2 years), **Library Directors** (3 to be elected for 4 years; 1 to be elected for 2 years), and **Park Commissioners** (2 to be elected for 6 years). WATER QUALITY CONTROL**

Glenview is required by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to collect 52 water samples every month from all areas of the water distribution system. Forty-six samples are sent to a local state-approved laboratory for analysis, and the remaining six samples to the IEPA laboratory.

All public water suppliers in the state are mandated by Chapter 6 of the Illinois Pollution Control Board Rules and Regulations to notify consumers publicly whenever sample results indicate that the maximum allowable concentration for bacteriological quality is exceeded.

During the sampling period of August 30 through September 26, 1982, although there was no emergency situation, three unsatisfactory and two questionable samples were found. As is standard practice, a resampling of the five locations was done immediately. The resamples all proved satisfactory.

Based upon the satisfactory results obtained in resampling and the facts that system pressure was constant and system chlorine concentrations within acceptable levels during the testing period, Water Department officials attributed unsatisfactory and questionable samples to either contamination of the bottles used or errors in sampling technique.

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Schedule of official meetings

Village boards and commissions meet at 8pm in the Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Road. Residents are welcome to attend meetings of public bodies, as provided by the Illinois Open Meetings Act.

The regular meetings of the following bodies are scheduled on these dates during 1983:

APPEARANCE COMMISSION — on the second and fourth Wednesdays of every month.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES — on the first and third Mondays of every month, with these exceptions: **Tuesday, July 5**, and **Tuesday, September 6** (because the two preceding Mondays are holidays).

PLAN COMMISSION — on the second and fourth Tuesdays of every month.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS — on the second and fourth Mondays of every month.

(Notices of postponed, cancelled or special meetings are posted at the Village Hall.) Glenayre Park

Residents aid police in crime prevention

Glenayre Park residents are the newest members of **Neighborhood Watch**, a program of the Glenview Police Department. Glenayre is the third neighborhood to join the police in observing and reporting suspicious activities, cars and strangers.

The goal of Neighborhood Watch is to reduce the opportunity for criminals to operate in Glenview. Residents who have joined receive information about crime-prevention techniques and how to practice them successfully.

Signs like the one pictured here also warn criminals that they will be watched by residents and their activities promptly reported to police if they enter that neighborhood.

In December The Glenview trustees

¶ Approved the 1983 budget (see item on first page, column 1).

¶ Abated 1982 tax levies for general obligation bonds issued in 1976, 1977 and 1979 (already retired by sewer and water user fees).

¶ Granted conceptual approval for Motivation Media's proposed \$1,100,000 industrial revenue bonds (for a 22,915-square-foot building on Milwaukee Avenue to house offices and production facilities), which will provide \$30,000 annually in property taxes and add 15 job opportunities, without financial obligation to the village. (Final approval depends upon results of financial and legal reviews.)

¶ Annexed: 4 lots on Brookdale; 1 on Landwehr; 30 on Balmoral Avenue, Balmoral Lane, Brandon Lane, Kings Lane and Lois Lane; 1 on Countryside Lane; 1 (approximately an acre) at 1223 Milwaukee Avenue.

¶ Accepted the bid of Di Paolo of Niles (\$295,601.15) for water-main replacements on Highland Terrace, Pflingsten, Linneman, Rosedale, Hillside, Meadow, Revere and Greenwood.

¶ Authorized a \$90,000 bond issue for the Glenway Sanitary Sewer.

¶ Accepted bids: Glenbrook Ford (\$77,229) for 8 police cars and (\$47,022.66) for 4 Public Works vehicles; W. Wanzenburg & Co. (\$22,400) for surge control at Rugen pumping station (cost to be shared by two water systems); Dictaphone (\$12,685) for Police Department logger-recorder replacement; Theodore Ebert & Co. (\$7,430 for walls, ceiling and trim) and Archem, Inc. (\$4,150) for floor resealing) for the Fire Department apparatus room; North Shore Uniform (\$4,597.68) for Public Works uniforms.

¶ Agreed to provide maintenance and energy for the new Carillon Square traffic signals.

¶ Approved a delivery service (4 trucks) at 2033 Johns Drive (B-2 conditional use in I-2 zone), and conditional use for a public building (the new Public Works Service Center) at 1313 Shermer Road (in R-4 zone).

¶ Amended the traffic code to prohibit stopping, standing or parking on both sides of Happy Hollow Road between 2:30 and 3:30pm on school days.

¶ Rezoned the recently annexed Lehigh/Chestnut area from R-1 to I-2,

and amended the zoning ordinance to allow multiple conditional uses.

¶ Accepted roads on Indian Ridge Court, Miller Drive and the east portion of Westfield Lane.

¶ Confirmed reconstruction of Glenview Road between Waukegan Road and Milwaukee Avenue as a 2-lane (cross section) for its entire length, except for possible parking lane between Elm and Spruce for church use.

¶ Approved an easement for the north 30 feet of a portion of Mulberry Court west of Laramie, enabling the adjacent land-owner to maintain the parcel for 5 more years.

¶ Increased the number of Class A and B liquor licenses to 23.

¶ Approved a 4-lot subdivision at 535 Shermer Road.

¶ Amended the building code to update energy requirements.

¶ Allocated Motor Fuel Tax funds for rubberized railroad crossing already installed on West Lake Avenue.

**How to control your car
On slippery roadways**

We all experience a split second of helplessness when our cars swerve or skid on slippery roads. Here's how to regain control:

Take your foot off the accelerator, but do NOT step on the brake pedal. Keep steering until the car is straight on the road again. Avoid oversteering, or you can fishtail.

Pumping the brakes for a gradual stop used to be recommended. **Now that disc brakes have become standard equipment, however, the pumping technique can be dangerous.** Disc brakes do not release as quickly as drum brakes and may lock, causing loss of control.

The National Safety Council recommends squeezing brakes with a slow, steady pressure whenever you have to slow down on winter roadways. When brakes approach the lock-up point, ease off until wheels roll, then repeat the procedure.

WINTER-DRIVING TIP: A slippery shoe or boot can cause your foot to slip off the brake pedal and turn a close call into a collision. Clean off the bottoms of your footwear before driving.

PARKING TIP: Try to avoid parallel parking in winter weather. It's tougher to get moving when you have to turn the wheels to get out of a parking space.

St. Francis Hospital (Evanston) says that physicians and pharmacists are concerned about possible interaction of new, more potent prescription drugs with nonprescription remedies.
