Police Department issues **RABIES ALERT**

Several pets in Cook and Lake Counties have recently been found rabid. Rabies, a fatal animal disease spread by saliva of infected animals, has been well controlled among pets for many years by antirabies serum. Rabies immunization of dogs and cats is required by law.

When human beings come in contact with a rabid animal, a series of painful injections must be taken. Rabies, in either human beings or animals, is usually fatal if not treated promptly.

Glenview Animal Control Officer Dennis Goessele recommends immediate antirabies vaccination of all pets, as the law requires. Please check your pets' records or call your veterinarian to determine whether their shots or boosters are up to date.

Keep pets on your own property (cats indoors, dogs on leashes), and if they show signs of illness or injury have them examined immediately by your veterinarian.

ANTIFREEZE ALERT: The smell of antifreeze solution is apparently very attractive to pets, who will taste it when possible. A Glenview pet recently died of ethylene-glycol poisoning, from ingesting only a small amount of antifreeze solution dumped or spilled on a pavement. (An autopsy revealed death was caused by the toxic material's having reached the kidneys.) Be sure your pets never have access to antifreeze or other toxic substances.

ALL GLENVIEW PETS MUST NOW DISPLAY 1983 LICENSE TAGS. Bring to the Village Hall a current rabies certificate for each animal, and a veterinarian's statement of neutering for each altered pet. (License tags for altered dogs and cats are less expensive than for unaltered animals.)

Adults made responsible for illegal drinking

As announced in the February **Newsletter**, the Glenview Village Board has amended the local liquor ordinance to make it illegal for any adult (parent, guardian, owner/lesser/manager of property) to supply alcoholic beverages or knowingly allow anyone under age 21 to consume or possess them.

The ordinance calls for fines of up to \$500 and jail sentences of up to six months for each offense. Glenview is the fourth north suburb to enact such an adult-responsibility law, and other North Shore communities are considering similar action.

The new ordinance supports adults who refuse to permit underage drink-

ing, by allowing them the final word when pressured to allow minors to drink alcoholic beverages at parties: **It's against the law.**

Glenview Police Chief David Kelly expects fewer intoxicated drivers, fewer accidents and injuries, less vandalism, rowdiness and other antisocial behavior in Glenview as a result of the new law.

Because parents, guardians and other adults are now directly responsible for underage drinking, and will be given heavy fines and/or jail sentences if caught, Glenview residents should actively discourage the practice of allowing minors to drink alcoholic beverages of any kind.

HOME ENERGY AUDITS still available at \$15

Home energy audits are still available for only \$15 from the Illinois Energy Audits Association. (The same service, if performed commercially, would cost you more than \$100.)

The energy audit, offered to single-family and multifamily dwellings of no more than four units, shows how homeowners can use less energy and significantly reduce utility bills. A computer printout is produced on the spot.

Depending upon the construction and condition of a house and the lifestyle of its residents, **energy costs can be cut between 30 and 50%** — important in the face of deregulation of natural gas and the expected sharp increase in cost. DOGS MAY NEVER RUN LOOSE in Glenview. Except when they are on the property of their owners, dogs must be walked on leashes, and walkers are required by law to carry some means of picking up excrement, and to pick it up as soon as deposited.

BEFRIEND A YOUTH, a program of Glenview Youth Services, needs volunteers age 17 or older willing to spend two to five hours a week for at least nine months with younger people needing support, friendship and guidance. Volunteers will be carefully screened and trained for ten hours in communication, listening, relationship building and nondirective guidance. Please call 724-2629.

Residents of Glenview, please take notice: **IT IS AGAINST THE LAW** to put garbage cans on the parkway or edge of pavement. Household waste is collected **only from service doors** (or other accessible places on private property). Garbage cans are unsightly and incompatible with the beauty of our village, and displaying them on the street is offensive to most Glenview residents.

Yard debris in disposable containers is the only kind of refuse to be tolerated on Glenview parkways, but it must never be put out until after dark the night before collection.

Please observe the law: **NO GARBAGE CANS ON GLENVIEW STREETS OR PARKWAYS AT ANY TIME!**

Thursdays, 11:30-12:30pm at the Glenview Senior Center: **FREE BLOOD-PRESSURE TESTS**. (Any day of the week, between 9am and 5pm, free service is also available at the Fire Station, 1815 Glenview Road. The Heart Association recommends that older adults have blood pressure tested at least once a month.)

Mondays through Fridays, 9-11:30am, Playdium pool, **SENIOR SWIM** for those with senior ID's. Admission charge: \$1.

BENEFIT SHEETS AND BOOKLETS detailing assistance available to older adults are free at the Glenview Senior Center.

In February the Glenview trustees . . .

¶ Approved a formal cash-control and investment policy, to protect municipal funds, maximize investment returns, and minimize risks.

¶ Allocated \$150,000 in local Motor Fuel Tax funds for resurfacing the following roadways: **Bel-Air Drive** from Harrison Street to the south cul-de-sac; **Covert Road** between Washington Street and Michael Manor; **Fredric Court** from Glenway Drive to the south cul-de-sac; **Glenway Drive** from Landwehr Road to the dead end; **Jefferson Avenue** from Waukegan Road to the dead end; **Leanne Court** from **Glenway Drive** to the south end; **Monroe Street** from Chestnut Avenue to the dead end; **Norwood Terrace** from Washington Street to the west cul-de-sac; **Pfingsten Road** and adjacent cul-de-sacs from Glenview Road to the cul-de-sac north of Rugen Road; **Rogers Avenue** from Monroe Street to the dead end; **Tanglewood Drive** from Chestnut Avenue to the cul-de-sac north of Valley Lo Lane; **Woodlawn Road** from Waukegan Road to about 100 feet east of Highland Terrace.

¶ Allocated \$135,000 for preliminary engineering design services for Phase II of the improvement of Glenview Road between Waukegan Road and Milwaukee Avenue. (Estimated total cost of the Glenview Road improvement project is \$3 million, of which \$530,000 will be spent during the current fiscal year. See municipal budget insert delivered with the February issue of this **Newsletter**.)

¶ Approved a recapture agreement with the Park District for the water main to Kennicott Lane (serving park facilities at The Grove and ensuring fire protection for the area), whereby the Park District will eventually recap-

ture \$17,064, and the village will recapture \$12,447 of their original investments.

¶ Accepted the following bids: Free-way Ford of Lyons (\$45,028) for two two-and-a-half-ton truck replacements; Aurora Truck Body (\$6,194) for two 6-cubic-foot dump bodies for truck replacements; Lang's Auto Accessories of Northbrook (\$5,180) for four 90" replacement snowplows, installed (on vehicles purchased earlier); Illinois FWD of Rosemont (\$7,346) for two 132" reversible snowplows for the two-and-a-half-ton truck replacements; DiPaolo of Niles (\$223,697) for pavement reconstruction on **Hunter Road** between Wilmette Avenue and Ferndale, and on **Heatherfield Lane** from Hunter Road to south of Arbor Lane.

¶ Authorized an agreement with Paul Spies Engineering for design (\$3,500) and construction inspection (\$5,100) for recycling/reconstruction of pavement on **Lizette Lane** and **Harrison Street**.

¶ Approved an entertainment license for a restaurant at 630 Waukegan Road and an entertainment-license renewal for a restaurant at 3222 Glenview Road.

¶ Increased the number of waste-disposal licenses to include the Buffalo Grove Disposal Company.

¶ Approved creating a lot of record at 2224 Chestnut Avenue.

¶ Granted a request for a permit to hold the annual picnic of Sts. Peter and Paul Church on July 15 and 16.

¶ Approved outdoor display and sale of spring plants and flowers at 1850 Glenview Road.

CONGRATULATIONS to the Evanston Hospital Corporation, owner and operator of Evanston and Glenbrook Hospitals, which has been selected by the American Academy of Nursing and the American Nurses' Association as "a model of hospital nursing practice." Evanston and Glenbrook Hospitals were listed among 41 magnet hospitals in the U.S. which have demonstrated success in attracting and retaining nurses.

FREE FOOT AND MOUTH SCREENING will be offered to residents of all ages on Wednesday, March 16, between 1 and 5pm, at Rugen Community Center, 901 Shermer. An examination for oral cancer will be performed by Glenview dentist Joel R. Weiss, D.D.S., Ph.D. Foot-screening examiners from the Dr. Scholl College of Podiatric Medicine will be supervised by Glenview podiatrist Lee Simeone, D.P.M. ABSENTEE VOTING in advance of the April 12 village election

Registered voters who will be absent from Cook County on Tuesday, April 12, the date of the upcoming municipal election, may cast absentee ballots.

YOU MAY CAST AN ABSENTEE BALLOT IN PERSON at the Glenview Village Hall anytime from Monday, March 21, through Monday, April 11. Just walk in during business hours (9am to 5pm Monday through Friday) and go to the cashier's office, upper level.

IF YOU WILL BE ABSENT FROM COOK COUNTY BETWEEN MARCH 21 AND APRIL 12, you may apply for an absentee ballot to be mailed to you at your out-of-county address. Application forms for absentee ballots by mail are now available at the Village Hall, and must be received by the County Clerk's office no later than April 7. **Note: Only street addresses are valid as addresses for delivery of absentee ballots; P.O. box numbers may not be used.**

Parents: College students who are registered Illinois voters and who attend school outside Cook County, will need absentee ballot applications sent to them at school. Pick up application forms NOW for your college students, so the necessary postal procedure can be completed in time for the ballots to reach the voters, be returned, and be counted. (Allow at least five days for each mailing.)

Be a friend for life

Glenview residents are asked to be **friends for life** by volunteering as blood donors at Blood Center North, part of the Blood Center of Northern Illinois, 1255 North Milwaukee Avenue (between Glenview Road and Lake Avenue). There are morning, afternoon and evening donor hours six days a week. Call 298-9660 to schedule an advance appointment.

Volunteers are **friends for life** because their blood can mean the difference between life and death for recipients of blood donations.

The blood center expects blood use to increase about 8% this year. If you are between 17 and 65, in good health, and weigh at least 110 pounds, you can safely donate blood every eight weeks. By donating only once a year, you can help meet the increased need for blood in the north suburbs.

At 12:45 the Senior Choral Group will entertain, followed by dance routines by Rock 'n Jazz tap-dance classes. FOR TREES PLANTED LAST FALL: Mix mulch at trunk base and cultivate base to let water and air penetrate to roots. Leave trunk wrapping on to protect bark from sun-scald and mower damage. (It will eventually fall off by itself.) Water only when soil is too dry to stick together when a handful is squeezed; then water thoroughly. **Don't fertilize this year;** food was put into the ball to nourish the tree until next year.

COLORECTAL SCREENING for bowel diseases is being sponsored by Glenbrook Hospital **for those who make appointments by March 16.** (Tests are completed in the privacy of one's own home, and results explained on Saturday, March 25, 10am to 3pm, to those who have made advance appointments.) (Although this program is a service of the North Shore Senior Center, please note that it is available to heads of households of ANY AGE, provided the household's gross income qualifies.)

ADVICE AND ASSISTANCE in filling out forms for food stamps, Medicare and Medicaid, tax exemptions, housing assistance, supplementary health insurance, and anything else for which help is needed -- all are available to Glenview residents by calling the North Shore Senior Center, 446-8750. Ask for Jean Cleland, who will make an appointment either at Rugen Community Center (901 Shermer) or at the home of anyone who is housebound.
