## Architect chosen for library addition

The Library Board has selected the architectural firm of Wight and Company, Inc., of Downers Grove to design a 17,000-square-foot addition to the existing library building.

Wight was selected from a field of 17 contenders, all of whose work has been seen during the past six months by William Noreen (building chairman), Karen Davis, Rachele McClarren, and Peter Bury (Head Librarian). All competing firms were interviewed by the committee and members of the Library Board.

Wight and Company designed and planned Glenside Public Library (Glendale Heights), completed in 1982, and is now designing an addition to the Aileen S. Andrew Memorial Library in Orland Park.

A November referendum is anticipated, and the Library Board will present plans to the appropriate boards and commissions before construction work is undertaken.

## Building Department to hold Open House

The Glenview Building and Zoning Department invites the public to attend its Open House at the Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Road, 9am to 5pm, Monday, April 18, through Friday, April 22. The open house is Glenview's way of participating in National Building Safety Week.

Two slide shows will be presented daily at 2pm in the Board Room (lower level). "How to Build an Energy-Conserving House" features construction details and tables showing savings that can result from using various insulating materials.

"Home Energy Conservation" shows homeowners how energy-conservation measures and minor changes in lifestyle and house operation can lower utility costs.

## Notice of PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing will be held on Thursday, May 19, 7:30pm, in the Board Room of the Glenview Village Hall, to discuss results of the Sewer System Evaluation survey, which addresses the problem of infiltration and inflow to the village sewer system.

A draft report presenting the survey's findings and recommendations is available to the public at the Village Hall and the Glenview Public Library.

Recommended action will cost about \$200,000. A Federal Construction Grant will be sought to pay about \$75,000 of the cost, and the village's share amounts to about \$20 per household, to be paid by the Village from sewer revenues.

Those interested are encouraged to attend the May 19 hearing and make their views known. For further information call or write Stephen Pudloski, Glenview's director of development and public services, at the Village Hall.

Building safety involves proper installation of energy-saving devices, structural and safety features to look for in home-buying, the importance of properly installed and maintained smoke detectors, and the importance of building permits and proper inspections of both new construction and remodeling.

The concept of a National Building Safety Week originated with the National Conference of States on Building Codes and Standards, which is cooperating with the Council of American Building officials to publicize the week.

**THE GLENVIEW SENIOR CENTER** is located in the Rugen Community Building, 901 Shermer Road (telephone 724-4793). Please call for further information about any of the following.

**DEFENSIVE DRIVING CLASS** for those 55 and older will be offered again if enough people register. Call 724-4793. (The course is sponsored by AARP in conjunction with the Senior Center. There is a \$6 fee.)

**PLAYDIUM FACILITIES** are available to seniors Mondays through Fridays, 9 to 11am. On Mondays a **free exercise program** for all ages is offered by Jane Reidy. **Water ballet for seniors** begins this month, with simple strokes to music, floating formations and other easy movements.

**FREE EASY YOGA** is offered in the Rugen Center cafeteria on the second and third Mondays of the month, 11:30am to 12:15. A yoga series costing \$6 for eight sessions will also be offered by the Park District. Ask at the center desk for starting date.

## Police offer

### Crossing-Guard jobs

School Crossing Guards, employees of the Glenview Police Department, perform a valuable service in protecting the lives of school children (and other pedestrians) five days a week during the school year.

There is no way that Glenview could afford to employ full-time police officers for such work, as there are more school intersections in the village than police officers on duty during during any shift.

Men and women able to do part-time outdoor work, controlling traffic and leading children safely across streets, earn an average salary of \$85 a week, depending upon whether they work 4 or 5 hours per school day. (Some locations require longer hours than others.)

Adults of any age may apply. If positions are not immediately available, names will be placed on the reserve list for future assignment.

To apply for Crossing Guard positions, call 729-5000. Commander Jack Slivka and Officer Robert Helton of the Glenview Police Department are in charge of this important program.

*Achievements of nominees should be for the calendar year 1982, in one of the following categories:*

**YOUTH OF THE YEAR:** A Glenview resident of high-school age who has contributed significantly to school, family or community life by helping others in some extraordinary way, serving as a good example to others in his/her age group.

**CITIZEN OF THE YEAR:** Someone who either lives or works in Glenview who has performed a community service benefiting a large number of people. (Salaried officials and employees of Glenview public agencies NOT eligible.)

**PUBLIC SERVICE:** Someone who has given direct support to public authorities, or performed an outstanding act of bravery. (Glenview police officers, firefighters and firefighter/paramedics NOT eligible.)

**PUBLIC SAFETY:** A Glenview police officer, firefighter or firefighter/paramedic who has performed an outstanding act or service in the line of duty.

### Riding your bike:

## Like driving a car

**R**iding a bicycle on a public roadway is exactly like driving a car: **Bikers must obey all traffic laws, speed limits, signs and signals.**

Adults should know Illinois' rules of the road and children should be familiar with them through Police Department bicycle-safety programs in the Glenview schools.

**Please note:** Bicycles are not allowed on sidewalks in business areas.

**Register your bike** at the Police Department, 1215 Waukegan Road, free of charge. The bicycle license identifies your bike in case it is stolen and later recovered.

**Brakes** must be adequate for stopping on dry and level pavement, and the bike must have a **horn or bell** audible at 100 feet. (Sirens and whistles are illegal.)

**A white headlight** visible for at least 500 feet and a **red rear reflector** are required if you ride after dusk or before dawn.

**A basket or carrier** is required if you carry books or packages. Both hands must be on the handlebars except when signalling.

**Ride with traffic, single-file**, on the right-hand side of the road, except when passing or making left turns.

**Use hand signals:** For left turn, fully extend left arm; for right turn,



extend left arm bent at elbow, hand up; for stop, extend left arm bent at elbow, hand down. (Except when making hand signals, both hands must be on the handlebars.)

**Use bicycle paths** wherever provided. You may also ride on sidewalks, except in the business district, PROVIDED you give pedestrians ample warning of approach by sounding horn or bell, and allow them right-of-way. (Shouting and whistling are meaningless and rude; use the horn or bell.)

**Handlebar-riding is illegal.** No more than one person may ride on a single-rider bike, except that an adult may carry a small child if the child is securely attached to the cyclist's body in backpack or sling.

**Never attach your bike or yourself** to any other vehicle.

**STOP before reaching a standing school bus**, regardless of which direction the bus is headed. Bicycles, like cars, may not resume travel until the school bus is under way (or until the driver indicates it is parked).

**No U-turns** on hills, or on streets signed No U-turns. Where U-turns are allowed, look behind for following traffic, ahead for oncoming traffic,

and give a left-turn signal.

**Driver's doors of parked cars** may open suddenly, causing serious accidents. Be alert and ready for quick stops.

**Gratings** and other pavement hazards can upset bicycles.

**Traffic entering** from driveways or curb may not be able to see you. Be cautious.

**Wear light-colored clothes or reflective tape**, and put some tape on handlebars, frame and fenders if you ride after dark or before dawn. Wheel reflectors, arm and leg lights are available at low cost and could save your life.

**Parents:** Get free copies of "Bicycle Rules of the Road" at the Police Department and make sure children read it. **Bikers of any age will be ticketed if they break the law.**
