Delia B. Stowe, an 18-year Glenview resident, was elected to the Glenview Board of Trustees on April 12, to serve a 4-year term.

In 1973 she founded the Save The Grove Committee, a group that obtained landmark status for the Kennicott property on Milwaukee Avenue. She has also been active in schools and scouting. She and her husband Bob, whose family has lived in Glenview since 1921, have four children.

Trustees James W. Smirles and James M. Weiss were reelected, also to 4-year terms. Katherine G. Appert, appointed Village Clerk last October to fill a vacancy, was elected to a 2-year term.

Local agencies giving free cheese, butter to qualifying low-income households

Northfield and New Trier Townships and the North Shore Senior Center are now distributing government surplus butter and cheese to low-income residents. The food will be given once a month for as long as surpluses are available.

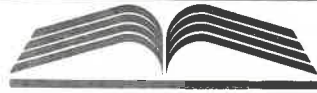
In order to qualify, the head of a low-income household, or a single low-

income person living alone, must make such application as is required by the above agencies, and present documentary proof of residency.

Applicants must certify that total gross family income, or personal income for a one-person household, does not exceed the following for the past 12 months:

\$ 8,190 ..	Single person, living alone
10,885	Two-person household
13,580	Three-person household
16,275	Four-person household
18,970	Five-person household

(Add \$2,695 for each additional person in households larger than five.)



GLENVIEW PUBLIC LIBRARY directors will discuss the 1984 library budget at the Tuesday, May 17, regular meeting. Meanwhile, Wight & Company, a Downers Grove architectural firm, has been engaged to design a plan (\$7,000) for the library addition, in anticipation of a November referendum.

A PUBLIC HEARING will be held on Thursday, May 19, 7:30pm, at the Village Hall, to discuss a recent survey of the Glenview sewer system, addressing the problem of infiltration and inflow. Recommended action will cost about \$200,000. A federal construction grant would pay about \$75,000 of such cost, the remainder coming from village sewer revenues. A draft of the report presenting the survey's findings and recommendations is available at the Village Hall and the the public library, or call Stephen Pudloski, 724-1700.

Bienvenu, French exchange students!

Glenview is one of seven Chicago suburbs participating in this year's "French Back-to-Back" program. That's why you see the French red, white and blue flags flying alongside our own this month.

Nineteen Glenview fifth and sixth graders (from public schools and Immanuel Lutheran School) went to Rocquencourt, a Paris suburb, in April for a 3-week cultural exchange, sponsored by Campus International and Glenview School District 34.

The Glenview children attended a public school across the road from the Palace of Versailles, took sightseeing tours with their French host families, and presented a musical show about life in the United States.

On May 8 a group of French children arrives in Glenview for a 3-week return visit, being welcomed at Lyon School by village officials and the Springman Junior High band.

They and their host families will take field trips to Chicago (including one to a Cubs game), tour Kraft's computer facilities, have a family picnic at The Grove, and attend the May 16 Village Board meeting.



On May 26 an official Glenview-Rocquencourt party will be held at Springman Junior High School, where Village President Smith will present honorary citizenships.
