# VEHICLE STICKERS NOW ON SALE AT LOWEST PRICES

Pehicle stickers for 1983-84 are now on sale at the Village Hall (upper level) during regular business hours, Mondays through Fridays. The new stickers are required for all vehicles — passenger cars, trucks, buses, motorcycles and RV's.

Preprinted forms were mailed in mid-May, and residents are still welcome to purchase stickers by mail. If any of the information on the form is wrong, please correct the form and return it to the Village Hall.

New vehicle stickers must be displayed on the lower right-hand (passenger) side of windshields, no later than



midnight, June 30. Police will ticket cars without new stickers in place by that time.

During the month of June only, stickers cost \$10 for cars under 35hp, and \$20 for cars over 35hp. Senior adults may license one car per household at \$3.75 (under 35hp), or \$7.50 (over 35hp).

As of July 1, prices increase 25%. As of August 1, prices increase 50%.

New state law effective July 1

# Child-restraint devices required

Parents (grandparents, guardians) of children up to age two must provide special child-restraint devices in their cars, if they intend to have the children as passengers.

Children aged three through five years old must be restrained either by a special device or by a seat belt.

The law goes into effect July 1, and will be enforced by Glenview police officers, as follows:

The first time a driver with an unrestrained child passenger is caught, a warning will be issued, and the driver told to provide a special device (or use the seat belt, in the case of three-to five-year olds) before carrying child passengers again.

If a driver is caught a second time not using child-passenger restraints, a traffic ticket will be issued. The driver will be subject to a fine of \$25, and ordered to produce a receipt showing that a child-restraint device has been purchased.

The law was passed because there have been nearly 4,000 child fatalities per year in the U.S. as a result of auto accidents. In two states (Washington and Tennessee), however, the injuries and fatalities to children were reduced as much as 90% after childrestraint laws were passed.

#### IMPORTANT NOTICE:

The Federal Department of Transportation has developed certain standards for child restraints, and the American Academy of Pediatrics has prepared a SHOPPING GUIDE for people seeking devices meeting these standards. ### June is Burglary Prevention Month

## Village officials request cooperation

Durglary is the leading major crime in the U.S., frequently resulting in substantial loss of property. Burglary also constitutes an emotional infringement upon the privacy of its victims.

"Crime prevention is a team effort," says Glenview Police Chief David J. Kelly. "We want every resident of Glenview to join the team. Police efforts towards crime prevention are always enhanced by the understanding and cooperation of the public."

Chief Kelly is not making a theoretical statement: Burglaries in Glenview declined by 13% during 1982, due to the interest and cooperation of residents. Eleven Neighborhood Watch groups have been organized, with the help of the Police Department, and have proved their effectivness in deterring crime.

The following homeowner groups are now involved in the Neighborhood Watch program: Hackberry/Glenview Road, Larkdale (the 2100 block), Bonnie Glen, Surrey/Windsor/Wagner, the North Glenview Mobile Home Park, the Canterbury Improvement Association, Valley Lo South, Tall Trees, Estate Lane, Valley Lo North, and Glenayre Park.

Information about Neighborhood Watch can be obtained by other residential groups interested in "crime-proofing" their neighborhoods by calling the Developmental Services Division, Glenview Police Department, 729-5000. Do it — it works!

To point up the importance of crime prevention, Village President Thomas E. Smith has issued a proclamation designating June as Burglary Prevention Month in Glenview.

If you do not live in a Neighborhood Watch area, the following tips from the Police Department are good ones to follow until your neighborhood joins the team:

Ask for a free security inspection

of your home or business. The Police Department has officers specially trained to conduct such inspections. Call 729-5000 for an appointment.

When you are at home, keep the garage door closed and locked except when it is actually in use. An open garage door is an open-house invitation to thieves. Keep your doors locked too — why make it easy for home invaders?

Whenever you leave the house, lock all the doors and windows. Outside doors should be equipped with deadbolt locks. Sliding glass doors should be equipped with one of the devices now on the market to prevent removal of panels from the outside. The ideal protection device for sliding patio doors has a lock and key.

Don't advertise vacations in advance. The more people who know you will be away, the more danger that your house will be burglarized.

Before you leave, go to the Police Department and sign up for House Watch, which alerts the beat officer to investigate if anything looks suspicious during your absence. Borrow timers, free of charge, for lamps to turn on and off automatically, making the house look lived-in.

Have the lawn mowed regularly, and ask a neighbor to pick up mail and papers. Nothing alerts burglars like uncut grass, a stuffed mailbox or newspapers lying on a driveway.

Have a neighbor keep an eye on things. Any police officer will tell you that a responsible neighbor is the best crime deterrent there is. (It's one of the prime elements of the Neighborhood Watch program.) You can watch your neighbor's house in return. If the neighbor is willing, ask him/her to hold a key to your house, park a car in your driveway occasionally, and put some garbage out on pickup days.

Accepted bids: From Glenbrook Ford (\$15,307.60) for two small pickup vehicles; from ITEC of Rosemont (\$9,200) for aluminum utility bodies for the trucks; from ITEC (\$5,965) for one lawn tractor. . . . Appropriated Motor Fuel Tax funds: \$188,000 for road construction on Harrison Street and on Lizette Lane, and \$15,000 for resurfacing Overlook Drive and Pfingsten Road. . . . Authorized: An agreement for sharing the cost of professional services of Richard A. Miller & Associates (\$31,668) with the Village of Northfield, Cook County and the state, for a design for the improvement of Waukegan Road (from south of Winnetka Road to north of the Marillac High School driveway). Glenview's involvement because of intersection improvement at Winnetka Road (share of expense to be minimal). . . .
