Computer reference service available at the library

Computerized reference service is now available at the Glenview Public Library, which has access to **Dialog Information Retrieval Service**, a vendor carrying more than 150 databases containing more than 55 million records.

Computer databases, which are more comprehensive and up-to-date than printed indexes and card catalogs, provide more sources than any one library can supply.

Databases are helpful in many fields, including business, medicine and education. A computer search of a given topic will yield a list of publications in which relevant information can be found.

The cost of a computer search varies, depending upon the databases used, and Dialog bills the library for computer time. As an introduction, a subsidy of up to \$20 per search is being offered to library patrons during 1983.

Not everything is suitable for computer search. Specific subjects with many variables or narrow aspects of broad topics can probably be handled successfully.

If you think you have a topic that can be searched by computer, inquire at the Reference Desk in the Adult Services Department. The staff will advise you.

Smoke detectors recalled

Honeywell Corporation has recently recalled certain models of smoke detectors that have been found faulty.

Model numbers of the faulty units are **TC 89B** and **TC 89C** with date codes from **7601 through 7820**. (The numbers are under the cover, printed on gray cardboard.)

If you have a Honeywell unit that is eligible for recall, you can test it by making sure the batteries are OK and then feeding smoke directly into the sensor.

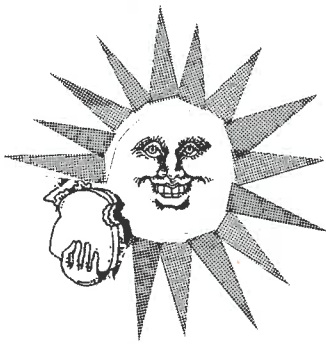
If the alarm doesn't go off, call Honeywell toll-free at **1-800-328-8194**, or write Honeywell Consumer Affairs, 10400 Yellow Circle Drive, Minnetonka MN 55343 for information.

The Fire Department suggests you replace a faulty unit with one of another manufacturer without delay, so as to keep your home protected. (Honeywell no longer manufactures residential smoke detectors.)

Summer foods

Keep 'em HOT, COLD, and CLEAN

Food poisoning, an intestinal infection caused by bacteria or toxins emitted by bacteria, is temporary but painful. Vomiting and diarrhea are usual. Depending upon the kind of bacteria involved, there may also be abdominal pain, headache, chills, and fever. Sickness can occur within one to five hours of eating.

Poisoning usually occurs after eating prepared food kept at room temperature too long. Anything not eaten immediately should be refrigerated or frozen. Refrigeration slows growth of bacteria, freezing stops it, but neither can be depended upon to destroy toxins already formed.

Keep hot food above 140 F and cold food below 40 F. If you're not sure food has been properly handled, throw it away. Bacteria reproduce themselves rapidly within a short period, given warm and moist conditions in which to grow.

Music-lovers' bargain: Community concerts

One of the best bargains on the North Shore is the 1983-84 season of the Wilmette Community Concert Association. Memberships for the four-concert season are \$8 for students, \$18 for adults, and \$45 for families (including two adults and two or more students).

Troubadour C. C. Ryder begins the series in October. A versatile Canadian singer who has concertized extensively for the past 20 years, he imparts the beauty, sadness, joy, and spirit of folk music in fine taste and voice.

The Amati Quartet, celebrated in Europe for perfection of string ensemble playing and artistic mastery, are also recording artists of note. They perform a varied program with expressive mastery.

Pianist James Dick is a musician of unique style and flawless technique, whether playing Tchaikovsky, Grieg or Beethoven. A prizewinner in several international competitions, he received two Fulbright Fellowships to the Royal Academy of Music in London, and was a pupil of the late British pianist Sir Clifford Curzon.

The Nevada Dance Theater, appearing in March, is the cultural jewel of its home state, having developed into a formidable troupe with varied repertoire covering both classical and contemporary dances.

Concerts are given at 8pm in Regina Dominican Auditorium, 701 Locust Road, Wilmette, where there is plenty of free parking. Tickets will be sent

by mail prior to the first concert.

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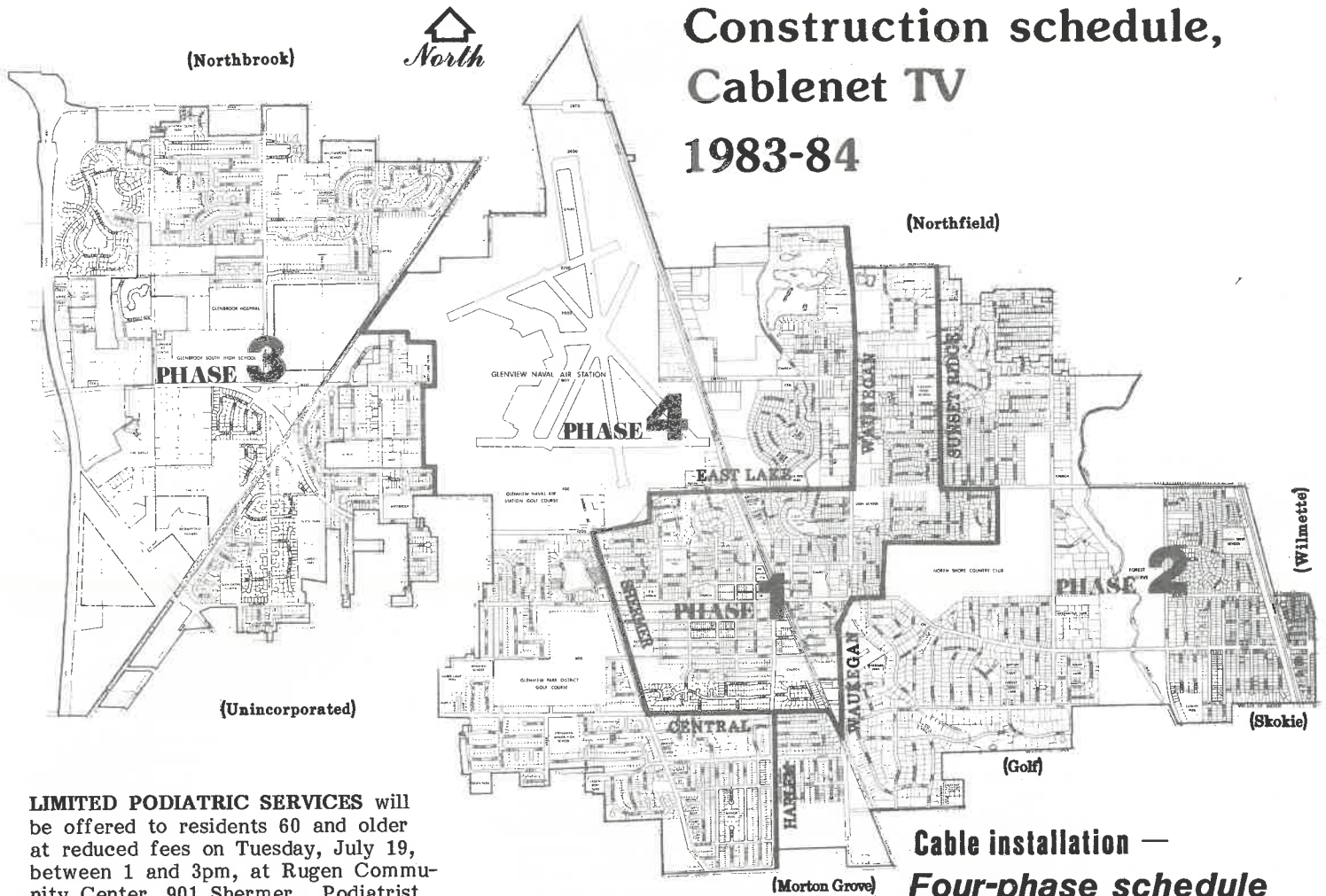
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Construction schedule, Cablenet TV 1983-84



LIMITED PODIATRIC SERVICES will be offered to residents 60 and older at reduced fees on Tuesday, July 19, between 1 and 3pm, at Rugen Community Center, 901 Shermer. Smokers will identify reasons for smoking and learn different ways of stopping. Each participant will develop a personal strategy for breaking the habit. PERSONS WITH MILD high blood pressure are wanted by Glenbrook Hospital for a study of two widely prescribed antihypertensive medicines. Participants must either take no medicine for high blood pressure, or be able to discontinue such medicine for at least five weeks. Physician consent is required. Glenkirk more than half way to million-dollar goal

The Glenkirk Foundation has recently announced the receipt of major gifts from the Coleman Foundation and Alexander Grant, Inc., toward its Open-Door Capital Campaign.

The \$1-million money-raising project, launched in 1981, has raised \$662,459 to date, to be used for renovation of Glenkirk's Mundelein campus and the original Glenkirk Center in Glenview, and for improvement of the Adult Work Activities Center and administrative offices in Northbrook.

Continued efforts are being made to raise the \$337,541 needed to reach the million-dollar goal.

Glenkirk, a nonprofit agency serving more than 800 residents of Lake and Cook Counties, was founded 30 years ago by a group of Glenview parents with retarded and handicapped children. The recent deinstitutionalization of residents of state facilities has resulted in an expanded role for Glenkirk.

Cable installation — Four-phase schedule

Installation of cable television lines begins this fall. Cablenet, Inc., of Mt. Prospect, has set the following schedule (please see map):

Area 1 will have installation work between September 5 of this year and January 1 of 1984, for activation by February 1, 1984.

Area 2 will have installation between February 4 and June 4 of 1984, for activation by July 4, 1984.

Area 3 will have installation between June 4 and August 4 of 1984, for activation by September 4, 1984.

Area 4 will have installation between August 4 and November 4 of 1984, for activation by December 4, 1984.

Installations will be aerial or underground, depending upon where other utilities have been installed.

No subscriptions have been sold yet, and when sales for Phase 1 do begin, they will be handled exclusively by Cablenet, Inc., of Mt. Prospect. **Please do not call the Village Hall regarding cable TV.** When more information is given to village officials, we will print it in future issues.
