Parkway trees offered with shared cost

Tree-lined streets are part of the American dream, and you can help to make it come true: Glenview will share the cost of each parkway tree ordered, hire and supervise the planting, and guarantee the trees for one year.

Thirteen varieties are being offered, including five never before available. All have been selected for disease resistance and hardiness, and will flourish in the Glenview environment.

Larger trunk diameters than previously offered will be available in three varieties, Bradford Pear, Bald Cypress and Hessei Ash (see following list), with Glenview paying \$75 toward the cost of each larger tree.

A free booklet on tree care will be given to residents ordering parkway trees. Those not ordering this year are welcome to pick up free copies of the booklet at the Public Services Department, upper level, Village Hall.

VARIETIES AVAILABLE

Please note the limit of 2 trees per residence.

(The address in parentheses after each description indicates where a good specimen of the variety may be seen.)

AMERICAN LINDEN (basswood) — Fast grower to 60-80 feet, pyramid shape, fragrant summer flowers, heart-shaped leaves, turns yellow in fall. (1344 Canterbury)

LITTLE-LEAF LINDEN ("Greenspire") — Medium-fast grower to 60-70 feet, similar to American Linden but with smaller leaves. (1363 Sanford)

GINKO ("Autumn Gold") — Slow to medium grower to 50-80 feet, matures from pyramid to wide-spread shape, fan-shaped leaves, turns bright yellow in fall. (1930 Prairie)

Understanding the property-tax bill

All Cook County property-tax bills are higher for the second half of 1982, due to the 4% increase in the real-estate multiplier announced on July 6. The Illinois Revenue Department has set the Cook County real-estate multiplier at 1.9288, nearly 4% more than for the previous year.

A **county multiplier** (also called an equalizer) is used in computing all Illinois property-tax bills. It varies from county to county, being designed to ensure that each assesses property at one-third of fair market value.

Property taxes are computed as follows: The assessed value (16% of fair market value in Cook County) is first multiplied by the equalizer, now 1.9288.

The Homeowner's Exemption of

\$3,000 and/or the Homestead Deduction is/are then subtracted whenever applicable, giving the adjusted equalized property value.

The adjusted equalized value is then divided by 100, and the result multiplied by the tax rate, giving the amount of the annual tax bill for the previous year.

As the first installment was paid in April, that amount is subtracted. The remainder is the amount to be paid as the second installment, due in mid-August.

Examine each item for which you are taxed, and note the taxing bodies involved. If you have questions, **call the office of the township in which you live.** Townships have protest forms which may be filed when the second installment is paid.

THE ONLY KNOWN CURE for Dutch elm disease is removal and destruction of afflicted trees. Beetles breed in diseased wood, and unless such wood is burned will spread to healthy trees. Forestry experts say losses of the ulmus americana species will probably continue, but development of new and more resistant species will assure the longevity of new and future elms. Meantime, watch for evidence of disease in old elms (dead leaves, twigs and small branches) and call the Village Hall (724-1700). Public Works personnel will test suspect elms.

Jog on the sidewalk wherever a sidewalk is available.



Jog on the shoulder of the road, against traffic, where no sidewalk is available.



Jog in single file when jogging with others.



Jog in place when traffic light is red. Pedestrians are required to obey all traffic signals.

RTA passes by mail

Users of the RTA may now buy monthly passes by mail. Passes are still available at the usual suburban locations, but some riders find mail-ordering more convenient.

To order by mail, make out the form (available from drivers) and send it to reach NORTRAN no later than the 24th of the month. A form for the next month will be mailed back with your pass.

Monthly passes save money, eliminate the need for transfers and exact change, and can be used on all RTA, NORTRAN and CTA buses and rapid transit lines.

Price of a regular monthly pass is \$40, but senior adults and the handicapped pay only \$23. Local passes, good only on commuter feeder buses and local suburban routes, cost \$23, \$9.50 for seniors and handicapped.

RED OAK (spring planting only) — Fast grower to 60-70 feet, rounded shape, turns red in fall. (1530 Tulip-tree Court)

SCARLET OAK (spring planting only) — Medium-fast grower to 70-75 feet, otherwise similar to Red Oak. (1310 Pine Street)

KATSURA (spring planting only) — Medium-fast grower to 40-60 feet, rounded when multi-stemmed, narrow when single-stemmed, reddish purple spring foliage changes to blue-green in summer, yellow-scarlet in fall. (1417 Forest, Wilmette, two blocks north of Lake, one block west of Green Bay)

KENTUCKY COFFEE — Slow to medium grower to 60-75 feet, narrow oval crown, slow to leaf in spring, dark blue-green foliage changes to yellow in fall, red leathery pods hang on in winter. Needs large area. (1301 Hawthorne)

HORSE CHESTNUT — Medium-fast grower to 50-75 feet, dark green foliage turns yellow in fall, showy flowers and 2-inch nuts when mature. Needs large area. (1810 Grove)

WHITE ASH ("Rose Hill") — Medium-fast grower to 50-80 feet, seedless, pyramid shape matures to oval, open round-topped crown, turns yellow to bronze in fall. (2215 Pinehurst)

GREEN ASH ("Marshall Seedless") — Fast grower to 50-60 feet, similar to White Ash, turns yellow in fall, tolerates high acid/alkaline soil. (2316 Swainwood)

BRADFORD PEAR (spring planting only) — Medium-fast grower to 30-40 feet, pyramid shape, glossy dark-green leaves turn scarlet in fall, tiny pears no problem. (600 Wagner, on Central)

BALD CYPRESS — Medium-fast grower to 50-60 feet, branches to ground, one-inch cones, short yellow-green needles turn brown and drop in fall. Withstands very high winds. Do not plant near driveway, where sightlines are essential. (East Flick Park entrance off Longmeadow)

HESSEI ASH — Medium-fast grower to 60 feet, upright oval leaves stay green in fall and drop late. Has one of the highest Ohio Shade-Tree Evaluation ratings. (1304 Lake, Wilmette, half-block east of Green Bay on Forest, tree nearest railroad tracks)
