Registration now open

oter registration is open Monday through Friday, 9am to 5pm, at the Village Hall. Registration is also open at township offices and at the County Clerk's office in Chicago. The last day to register at any of these places is Monday, October 10. Election day is Tuesday, November 8.

Registered voters who have moved or changed their names since the last election (Tuesday, April 12), or who will have moved or changed names by the upcoming election day, must either reregister or validate previous registrations before October 10.

Voters who have moved into Glenview from Chicago or from anywhere outside Cook County must reregister.

Those who have become 18 years old since April 12, or who will be 18 before November 8, may register for the first time.

Names of the candidates running for school board positions, and the library bond issue (see story in columns at right) will appear on the November 8 ballot.

Library proposal would add 23,288 sq. ft., mezzanine, skylight

n November 8, Glenview residents will be asked to vote on a library board proposal to sell \$3.25 million in bonds to finance expansion and remodeling of the Glenview Public Library.

The library board of directors proposes a plan adding 20,000 square feet on three floors behind the existing building, plus 3,000 square feet on a mezzanine.

The addition is designed as two stories with basement, the upper floor extending into the existing structure as a mezzanine overlooking a skylighted reading room.

Existing floor space will be rearranged and remodeled. Space for public use will be 33,851 square feet. Hallways and stairs will occupy 8,458 square feet, work area for librarians 5,230, and maintenance and storage 2,489.

The original library building was

erected in 1955, and contained 10,920 square feet of floor space. The first addition (1967-68) added 15,820 square feet, bringing the current building's total to 26,740. Total floor space after the proposed addition: 50,028.

Wight and Company, a Downers Grove architectural firm, was engaged early this spring to design a plan for the addition, at a cost of \$7,000.

JOHN H. THISSEN has been appointed to the library board to fill the unexpired term (until April of 1985) of Richard A. Spears, who has resigned. Spears' past service is appreciated, and Glenview remains in his debt.

A READER ASKS why we don't publish road-work schedules.

THE VIAL OF LIFE, a plastic container with medical forms to be filled in for each member of the family, is available free of charge, thanks to the Auxiliary of Glenbrook and Evanston Hospitals, at Rugen Center, the Fire Station (1815 Glenview Road), and the Northfield Township office (West Lake Avenue and Pfingsten Road). The vial should be placed under a shelf in the refrigerator, and a seal for the refrigerator door is included. The vial can be readily consulted by rescuers, in case of an emergency when no one knows the victim's physical condition, medicines, or allergies. The Vial of Life is especially important for people living alone. Pick one up for your refrigerator, if you haven't already.

Please obey the new state law

Buckling children into seat belts and putting those aged four and younger in special car seats are now requirements of state law.

When restrained, children behave better because they feel secure, being held snugly and comfortably in place during sudden stops and swerves. They are less likely to be car sick and more likely to sleep.

With children restrained, a driver can concentrate on safe operation of the vehicle, without such accident-causing incidents as falling off seats, fighting, hair-pulling, hanging out of windows and trying to open doors.


If you have not yet bought a car seat, pick up a shopping guide at the Police Department, 1215 Waukegan Road. It was prepared by the American Academy of Pediatrics, and lists only the restraint devices that meet the tough testing standards of the federal government.
