How to survive

The dangers of Halloween

Parents are urged to **discourage children's participation in door-to-door Halloween begging**, beginning this year. After the tragedies that have occurred in other communities, the practice is no longer a safe or happy experience for children.

Instead, Police Chief David J. Kelly advises that children attend school or neighborhood parties — activities organized and supervised by parents or other responsible and trustworthy adults.

Parents who **do** permit door-to-door Halloween visits are asked to conform to the following rules set down by the Police Department:

1. Allow children to make their calls only on **Monday, October 31, between 2 and 8pm.**
2. Go with your children, or send another **responsible adult** along with them.
3. Visit only the houses where residents are **known to you.**
4. Do not allow children to eat **anything** along the way. Take note of **all food items** given, and remember where they came from.
5. When you get home, **examine everything edible**, and throw away fresh fruit, unwrapped candy, and anything else that could be easily contaminated.

HOUSING

A survey of current opinion about senior housing needs in Glenview will be made on **Sunday, October 23**, at all Glenview churches, and at Congregation B'Nai Jehoshua Beth Elohim on **Saturday, October 29.**

Conducted by the Glenview Senior Citizen Commission and Evangelical Health Systems, the survey will invite participation of residents age 60 and older and their relatives.

Survey forms will also be available at the Village Hall and the Glenview Senior Center (at Rugen) between October 24 and 28, for those who do not attend church or synagogue on the above dates.

Forms should be completed and returned at the church or synagogue, or, for those obtained at the Village Hall or Senior Center, to the Manager's office, Village Hall (or dropped in the free drop box at the hall), **no later than October 29.** Call Velga Drillis-Eizis, 724-1700, for further information or explanation.

Although surveys have been held in the past, **current opinion** is needed to help the commission update its plans.

DAY CARE

Day-care for impaired adults age 50 and older, is offered at Avoca West (235 Beech Drive, east of Harms Road, north of Glenview Road). The facility can accept 25 clients daily, on whatever schedule is desired, one or more days a week.

A full-time staff — nurse, social worker and activity director — provide professional care for those who, because of physical or mental impairment, should not be left alone during the day.

Families of day-care participants can go to work or attend to personal business with the security of knowing that the impaired relative is being cared for properly.

Clients are offered opportunities for companionship and participation in discussion groups, crafts, field trips, cooking classes, games and exercise. Speech and hearing therapy, counseling, personal hygiene assistance and medication monitoring are available as needed.

ADOPT A HYDRANT**

Why not? If there's a hydrant adjacent to your property, you can become an **Honorary Glenview Fire Department Supervising Hydraulic Engineer** by adopting it as your very own foster-hydrant.

The Fire Department will even issue a certificate (suitable for framing) attesting to your honorable status.

Even if you don't choose to display the certificate on your wall, just think how grand the title will look in your resume! And in your biography — or your autobiography.

Seriously, the Fire Department **does** want you to adopt a hydrant. All you need do as an Honorary Fire Department Supervising Hydraulic Engineer are the following:

- **Watch your fireplug** to make sure it isn't leaking (think of it as a runny nose, if you're really into hydrant foster-parenthood) and call the Water Department, 724-1700, who will send someone to take care of it.
- **Trim the shrubbery away in summer**, and shovel the snow away in winter, so firefighters can connect their hoses in case of fire.
- **Make sure nobody steals it.** (This has never happened, but who knows

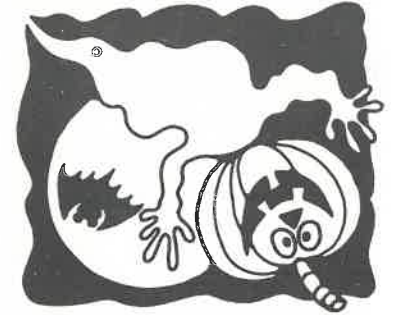
