



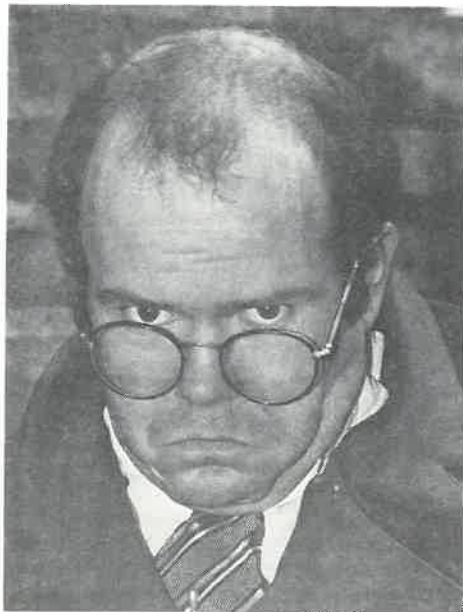

Winter rule goes into effect December 1

NO ON-STREET OVERNIGHT PARKING

Although you may be reading this under the balmiest of weather conditions (we have no way of knowing at press time), winter arrives in Glenview -- legally, at least -- on December 1 of each year.

On Thursday, December 1, the winter No-Overnight-Street-Parking rule goes into effect. Cars parked on the street between 2 and 6am will be ticketed by police, whether or not any snow has fallen.

In the event of a snowfall, vehicles illegally parked will be towed away.

Since 1979, Glenview has had the ordinance prohibiting parking on village streets between 2 and 6am from December 1 through March 31.

It was passed because Public Works crews must work before dawn to clear the streets of snow and ice during the winter, and cars parked on roadways make the job impossible.

Prior to passage of the ordinance, residents were "requested" not to park overnight during winter months, but the request was not altogether effective. Public Works crews still found parked cars, which had to be "plowed in," creating traffic blocks that sometimes lasted for weeks or months.

Now that the law has been in effect for four winters, residents are more careful, and Glenview streets have been kept clear of snow and ice during winter months.

NEW NORTRAN MAPS, showing current bus routes of the North Suburban Mass Transit District, are available free from bus drivers, or by writing NORTRAN, Box 388, Des Plaines IL 60016.

Signs have been posted on all major thoroughfares entering the village, reading, **"NO PARKING 2AM - 6AM IN GLENVIEW DEC. 1 - MAR. 31, ORD. 2260."**

If you are a new resident, please note the overnight street-parking ban as of **Thursday, December 1**, and inform every member of your household who drives a car.

If you need to find an off-street overnight parking, please do so now, so as not to be caught in violation of the law on December 1.

Ticketing and towing of cars is expensive and troublesome to everyone involved. The Police Department hopes that the winter of 1983-84 will find full compliance with the winter parking law.

While we're talking about winter and snow; Glenview also has a law concerning sidewalks. This is how it reads:

"Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the village abutting upon any public way or public place shall remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk in front of such building or lot of ground."

Please remove snow and ice from your sidewalks **promptly**. Remember that mail carriers, children and senior adults have to use them every day.

DO NOT SHOVEL, BLOW OR PLOW snow onto any part of a public street or sidewalk. Please instruct those hired for snow removal that **it is illegal to cover or block a public right-of-way**, as doing so creates hazards for both pedestrians and motorists.

NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE rates have increased as of October 1. Cost of coverage on residential buildings and contents is now 45¢ per \$100, vs. the former rate of 40¢, amounting to about \$18 per year for the average policyholder. The 45¢-rate begins with new and renewed policies. The change was made because the federal program was paying more in claims than it earned from premiums, making it unfair to the taxpayers who subsidize the insurance. If you live in the flood plain area and have questions, call your insurance agent.

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HANDLE HOLIDAY POULTRY with care, because of the high incidence of salmonella bacteria in fowl. Thaw frozen birds safely in one of three ways: **in the refrigerator, OR in a microwave oven, OR, if wrapped in double brown paper bags, at room temperature for not more than one hour per pound.**

Poultry should not be stuffed until just before cooking, as stuffing left for a prolonged period provides an environment that is ideal for bacterial growth. Poultry should be cooked to an internal temperature (both meat and dressing) of at least 185 degrees F, and should be refrigerated promptly after the meal. Leftovers should be reheated quickly to at least 165 degrees F.

Beginning in 1985 Village to sell water to private utility

The Village Board has, subject to review of the Village Attorney, authorized execution of a contract for wholesale purchase of lake water from the Village of Glenview by Citizens' Utilities of Illinois, a private supplier of water to unincorporated areas west of Glenview.

Sales will begin in January of 1985 and run to the year 2020.

The lake water to be sold will not come from the Village of Glenview allocation, but from a separate lake water allocation specifically for Citizens' Utilities of Illinois.

The contract will provide that the cost of extending a necessary western pipeline, estimated at \$1.5 million, will be passed on to Citizens' Utilities

customers, as will all increases in operating and other capital costs associated with the sale, for the duration of the contract.

The contract will also contain an agreement restricting the service area of Citizens' Utilities, to ensure that the Village of Glenview will never be in competition with a private utility.


The purchase of two million gallons per day will generate an estimated \$1 million for the Village of Glenview during the first year of operation. Net income for the first year is estimated at \$322,068, increasing annually thereafter.

With all expenses (debt, principal, interest, and operating costs), wholesale price per thousand gallons is currently estimated at \$1.30.

Glenview's water consumption, particularly in the West system, has not been as high as was projected in the 1970's, due to the unforeseen economic downturn and the resulting slowdown of the building industry. Additional revenue from the sale of water to Citizens' Utilities will help offset the loss of expected income.

Allocation of income for the first year is estimated as follows: General Fund, \$37,886; East Water Fund, \$87,517; West Water Fund, \$196,665.

Allocations between the East and West Water Funds are based upon payments for depreciation and return on capital investments held by each fund. The West Fund, because of the \$5 million pipeline, will have the larger fixed base.

READY FOR WINTER?

Because we are not as experienced as our forefathers in the use of fireplaces, stoves and space heaters, the Fire Department offers the following advice:

Follow the local code for fire safety and the directions of the manufacturer of equipment. Most home fires can be traced to inadequate clearance, defective or dirty chimneys, or overfiring (making too large a fire in a stove or fireplace).

If your furnace has not been cleaned during the past year, call a reliable heating contractor now and have it taken care of immediately.

Remember that any electrically powered appliance can generate heat enough to cause a fire. Kitchen gadgets and electric tools should be unplugged and light bulbs turned off when not in use. Call the Fire Prevention Bureau, 724-2141, if you have questions or need advice.
