THE NORTHWEST MUNICIPAL CONFERENCE, of which Glenview is a member, has formed an intergovernmental task force to study the problems of solid waste disposal. Trustees **Scott J. Helton** and **Ronald V. Norene** and Administrative Assistant **Bill Porter** represent Glenview on the Solid Waste Task Force, which is **studying landfill sites, recycling, and the costs involved in waste disposal.**

THE OFFICIAL HANDICAPPED PARKING CARD, now recognized throughout Cook County, is available to people with **permanent disabilities**, authorizing the car in which they are riding to park in spaces designated for handicapped parking only. The handicapped person need not own or drive the car. To obtain such a card, the applicant fills out a form and attaches the statement of a physician (testifying to the permanent disability). Application forms are available at township offices. Consult your telephone directory for the address of the office of the township in which you live.

Stormy session on March 18 . . .

GLENVIEW REPRESENTED AT O'HARE EXPANSION HEARING

Trustee Robert O. Pohl represented Glenview at a public hearing on Phase One of the expansion of O'Hare Airport, held March 18 by the Chicago Aviation Department. Glenview is a member of the Suburban O'Hare Commission, 15 suburban municipalities affected by O'Hare noise. The commission had held a meeting prior to the hearing to plan strategy.

The Chicago Aviation Department had arranged the meeting to allow only five minutes to each speaker. Pohl arrived early for the 3 p.m. meeting, so as to be first in line and (he thought) be assigned an early speaking spot to deliver President Tom Smith's strongly worded message. Pohl was first in line and first to sign in. Asked if his position was pro, neutral or con, he said con, and was assigned a 4:53 time slot.

The suburban commission had done its job well, however, because more than 600 angry suburban leaders crowded into the meeting room. "This was our strategy," says Pohl, "to get a large crowd of angry people there and, consequently, to get strong media coverage. We succeeded."

All suburban speakers stressed not only airplane noise, but **their strong objection to the three-phase environmental assessment**, which claims that the incremental increases in airplane noise are so small as to be unimportant. (If all three phases of airport expansion were introduced at one time, the city of Chicago would have had to file an environmental-impact statement, which it did not want to do.)

Pohl says there is reason to expect a lawsuit will be filed by the Suburban O'Hare Commission against either Chicago or the Aviation Department. The commission has hired the Boston consulting firm of Bolt Beranek & Newman, and Donna Davis Berman, manager of the firm's airport services department, attended the hearing and delivered a strong statement against the 3-phase plan and the expansion program. Chairman of the Suburban O'Hare Commission is Mayor Martin J. Butler of Park Ridge, who relinquished his five minutes (as did one other suburban mayor) so that Berman could speak for 15 minutes.

TORNADOES CAN OCCUR in the spring. When you hear the warning signal (except on Tuesday mornings at 10:30, when the system is being tested), it means a **tornado has actually been sighted and danger is imminent**. Take a battery-powered portable radio with you and go to the safest place in your house (basement, away from windows, or a closet or interior bathroom where walls are close together.) Don't open doors or windows; the damage from flying dirt and debris is worse than possible damage from air pressure. **DON'T use the phone or go outdoors to see what is happening.** The radio will tell you when it is safe to come out.

HOME-SAFETY TIP from the **Glenview Fire Department:** Test your smoke detectors at least once a month, to make sure they are always in working order. If yours are battery-operated, make sure the batteries are still good. The way to test a smoke detector of any kind is to feed smoke into the sensor. Hold up a just-extinguished wooden match that is still smoking, or a wad of waxed paper you have lighted and just extinguished in a bowl of water.

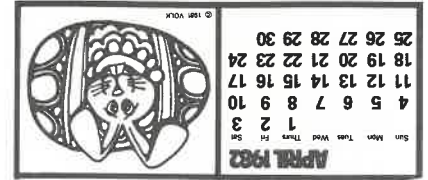


(The Firefighter in the photo is holding a lighted cigar. A lighted cigaret will also work, but of course we are not encouraging anyone to take up smoking!) **Remember this:** Pushing a button on the smoke detector merely tests the circuit between battery and horn, and won't tell you whether the batteries are still good. Smoke detectors should be **cleaned regularly**, too — follow the manufacturer's directions, printed on the inside of the cover on most units.

DURING THE MONTH OF MARCH

THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES . . .

- Authorized purchase of four used cars for use as Police and Building Department staff vehicles, at a per-vehicle price not to exceed \$5500.
- Authorized purchase of microprocessor and software for Public Works use (\$7,001) from Beta Systems of Elk Grove Village.
- Authorized contribution (not to exceed \$5,126) for Glenview's participation in the solid waste study being made by the Northwest Municipal Conference. (See item on Page 1.)
- Passed a resolution supporting Senator Percy's amendment to Senate Bill 508, which would appropriate funds for developmental aid regarding compatibility to airports and nearby noise-affected communities, regardless of whether airports have been "defederalized."
- Authorized professional engineering services of Brian Mays & Company of Glenview for the Glenway Drive sanitary sewer (Special Service Area 4), not to exceed \$2,400.
- Accepted the bid of Autumn Tree Care of Glenview for spraying parkway elms (@ \$4 per tree).
- Authorized an appraisal of the Miller Drive retention basin.
- Granted conditional B-3 use in B-2 zone (to allow a limited number of tables and chairs) to a delicatessen at 1470 Waukegan Road.
- Authorized recapture of a portion of the cost of water and sanitary-sewer installations on Woodlawn Avenue.
- Approved a three-lot first addition to Johns Drive Industrial Park.
- Prohibited parking within 30 feet of any STOP sign (bringing the Village code into conformance with Illinois statutes).
- Prohibited the leaving of mud deposits on Village thoroughfares.
- Authorized a Memorial Day parade on Monday, May 31.
- Authorized changing the Independence Day parade date to Monday, July 5, and parade route to travel west on Glenview Road from Waukegan Road to Shermer, then south on Shermer to Rugen Community Center (because of the repaving of Harlem Avenue and Central Road).
- Extended the terms of three members of the Senior Citizen Commission (Margaret McCoy, Joyce Pottinger and Robert Thomas) for one year (to October of 1985) in order to create staggered terms on the commission.

ART LEAGUE PLANS OUTDOOR FAIR

Saturday and Sunday, July 31 and August 1

The Glenview Art League, in cooperation with the First Trust & Savings Bank of Glenview, will hold its 29th annual **Outdoor Art Fair** on Saturday and Sunday, July 31 and August 1, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., on the grounds of Lyon School, corner of Lake Avenue and Waukegan Road.

Artists interested in exhibiting in this year's fair are invited to send **five 35mm slides** of their work to the Glenview Art League, 2122 Dewes Street, Glenview IL 60025, **before July 1**. Each slide must be marked as to top and front, and include the artist's name at the bottom. Self-addressed stamped envelopes must be included if artists want slides returned.

The jury must be informed as to which medium each artist will display, and **an artist may enter in only one category**. Those accepted for the fair will receive invitations and information about fees and display locations. All artists will be juried; work will be judged during the fair, and prizes will be awarded in all categories.
