POLICE DEPARTMENT TO HOLD OPEN HOUSE SUNDAY, MAY 16

The Glenview Police Department will hold an Open House on **Sunday, May 16, from noon to 5pm**, offering music, sports celebrities, displays and demonstrations, exhibition of patrol cars and equipment, tours of the police buildings, and free lemonade.

All Glenview families are cordially invited to come and bring picnics to eat on the lawn or patio, meet the celebrities, and enjoy the various events throughout the afternoon. The Glenbrook South Symphonic Orchestra (a winner in a recent national contest in Orlando) will play from 1 to 2pm, and again from 3 to 4pm. Baseball hero Moose Skowron will be there to meet and talk with sports fans, and Secretary of State Jim Edgar will also be present.

Dog obedience demonstrations will be presented by Glenview Animal Control Officer Dennis Goessele from time to time throughout the afternoon on the parking lot adjacent to the patio. Glenview Officers Brad Weigel and Brian Vocca will give a self-defense demonstration, and Commander Jack Slivka and Officer David Jenkins will demonstrate firearms. The Cook County Sheriff's Department will show crime-prevention displays, and the U.S. Secret Service will show a display of counterfeit money. Several burglar-alarm displays will be set up (no sales). The Glenview Radio Alert Team will be there to explain its role in keeping Glenview safe, and the Glenview Explorer Post will conduct tours.

YOUR FURNACE SHOULD BE INSPECTED, CLEANED and have any necessary repair work done right now, before summer sets in and you forget about it. The Fire Department reports that its most common emergency calls come from house-holders with overheated furnace motors or broken fan belts. If these things occur next fall or winter, your house could be without heat until service people can get to you, and (if the weather is cold enough) could cause frozen water pipes and considerable damage and expense. If you maintain your own heating system, the Fire Department suggests you **replace the filters, clean the furnace area thoroughly, lubricate the motor and inspect the belt, replacing it if necessary.** These jobs will take less than an hour and save you energy and costly future repairs. Information about checking your furnace is readily available from its manufacturer or by calling Northern Illinois Gas, 729-4300.

A HOT-WATER HEATER SETTING between medium and hot can heat water enough to cause third-degree burns (damaging the full thickness of the skin) in as little as **three seconds** — a hazard in any home where there are small children or elderly



adults. The Fire Department advises that you turn down the thermostat on your hot-water heater not only to decrease the chance of permanently crippling burns, but to save energy and money as well.

THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES . . .**

¶ Authorized a design for the first phase of the new Public Works Service Center.

¶ Approved \$50,000 in local motor fuel tax funds for resurfacing various streets in Glenview Woodlands subdivision.

¶ Authorized the sale of 13 unneeded village vehicles at an auction conducted by the Northwest Municipal Conference on May 8.

¶ Approved issuance of livery licenses to 67 vehicles of a limousine service at 1804 Lehigh Avenue.

¶ Awarded the following contracts:
— To M&A Cement Work of Itasca (\$32,014.50) for the 50-50 sidewalk replacement program, curb and gutter repair, and concrete pavement repair.
— To Roselle AMC Jeep of Schaumburg (\$21,345.50) for two Jeeps.
— To Spaceco of Skokie (\$13,450) for preparation of plans and specifications for the installation of a water main in unincorporated Countryside area (where the village owns the water system).
— To Golf Mill Ford of Niles for one Bronco.
— To Wilshire Ford (\$6,890) for one sedan without trade-in.
— To Glenbrook Ford (\$6,390) for one pickup truck with trade-in.

¶ Approved an agreement with the state's department of transportation for acquisition of the right-of-way at Chestnut and Lehigh Avenues, and village participation (for 15% of the costs) in improvement of the intersection, for which easements are necessary from the Milwaukee Road railway and the Naval Air Station.

¶ Approved installation of a STOP sign on Knollwood Lane at Castle Drive, and on Castle Drive at Knollwood Lane (a right-angle intersection).

¶ Amended the ordinance governing bazaars, to allow each event one sign no larger than 9 square feet to be posted on the parkway no longer than 3 days. Also provided: If the bazaar location is not on a major thoroughfare, a second sign no larger than 9 square feet may be posted on a second thoroughfare for no longer than 3 days.

MONTHLY RTA PASSES are sold from the 25th of the month until the 5th of the month for which the pass is to be used, during regular business hours, at the Glenview State Bank, 800 Waukegan Road, and the Northfield Township Office, 3801 West Lake Avenue. Monthly passes are good on NORTRAN, other suburban bus lines, and CTA services. Cost is \$40 for adults and \$18 for senior adults and handicapped persons who present proper identification. (Local passes for routes 621 and 622 cost \$23 for adults and \$9.50 for special users.)

50-50 SIDEWALK REPAIR PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

The municipal code requires homeowners to maintain public sidewalks adjacent to their properties. To help defray the expense, the village pays half the cost of removing and replacing broken, settled or dangerous sections of public sidewalk, and hires a contractor to do the work. Because of the volume of work involved, the village is able to negotiate a favorable price.

This year the homeowner's share of replacing a 5-foot square is only \$18.50. The square(s) must be paid for at the time application is made.

The contractor will begin work at the end of May, and applications must reach the Village Hall **no later than Friday, May 21**. (Forms and checks may be dropped in the Drop Box outside the Village Hall.) Please make checks payable to the Village of Glenview.

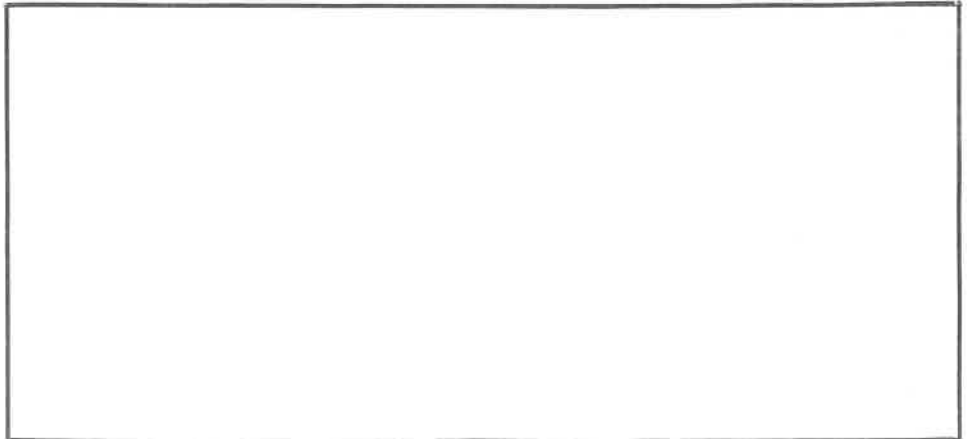

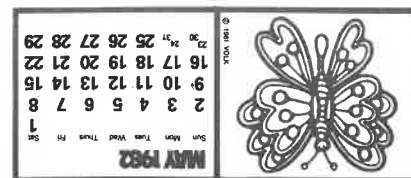

The Library Board has authorized a fine of 10¢ a day for overdue books and materials, as of May 1. Libraries in other communities have been charging 10¢ a day for some time. (The Glenview Library has not had an increase in fines since 1974, and all library costs have risen substantially since then.)

The loan period for video tapes has been reduced from seven to four days, for faster turnaround and giving patrons a better selection of titles. (There are now 152 tapes in the library collection.)

KEEP GARAGE DOORS CLOSED AND LOCKED at all times when not actually in use, and do not leave lawn or garden machinery or tools unattended. Thieves drive by and see expensive equipment, stop, load it into their vehicles, and take off before you know what has happened. The Police Department advises that when you work outdoors, don't leave house doors unlocked when you are not right there to see anyone who could enter the house.

LIFELINE SERVICE PROTECTS ELDERLY SINGLES

Three hospitals in the 312 telephone area offer **Lifeline** service for a monthly fee of about \$15.

Lifeline consists of a remote-control device worn by the person living alone. When help is needed, pushing a button activates a unit attached to the phone, which automatically calls the hospital's number. The device works as far away from the phone as 200 feet, making it useful outdoors as well as inside.

When the hospital receives a signal it calls the subscriber's number. If no one answers, a relative or neighbor, previously designated by the subscriber, is called and asked to find out what help is needed.

The three hospitals in the 312 telephone area now offering the service are **Mercy Center** in Aurora (859-2222), **Mount Sinai** in Chicago (542-6398), and **Saint Mary of Nazareth**, also in Chicago (770-2350).
