MIDNIGHT WEDNESDAY, JUNE 30, is the deadline for displaying 1982-83 village vehicle licenses. Cars not having new stickers will be ticketed by police beginning at 12:01am July 1. **The Village Hall will be open Saturday, June 26, 9am to noon, for last-minute sale of stickers.**

GLENBROOK MEALS AT HOME provides two meals a day, five days a week to house-bound people in the Glenview, Northbrook and Northfield area. Meals are prepared at Glenbrook Hospital and Brandel Center and delivered at noon by volunteers. **Regular and substitute drivers are needed now.** For a couple of hours once a week, you could become part of an important service for shut-ins. VOLUNTEERS FOR HOME HOSPICE, a program to help families cope with stress of caring for dying members at home, are needed by the Glenview Visiting Nurses' Association. 9th annual country street sale and **BEAR FAIR** SATURDAY, June 26

The ninth annual Chamber of Commerce Country Street Sale (this year being billed as the **BEAR FAIR**) will be held Saturday, June 26, 9am to 4:30pm, on the street and sidewalks between Waukegan Road and the Milwaukee Road tracks.

A street dance, sponsored by the Navy League and the Glenview State Bank, begins at 8pm.

More than 100 merchants and service clubs will stage the **big bear hug**, promising "embarrassing" (sorry, folks) bargains, entertainment, live music, good food and drink, and special attractions yet to be announced. Watch the local papers.

The June 26 event is a high point in **HUG THE BEAR**, the new Chamber of Commerce civic-awareness program. It reminds residents of the many local advantages, and that nearly **one-third of every dollar supporting village services comes from sales taxes.** Shopping in Glenview therefore helps to keep property taxes down.

THE GLENKIRK RUN, 3,000- and 6,000-meter races on the grounds of the Glenkirk Home, 1000 North Waukegan Road in Lake Forest, takes place **Sunday, June 27,** for the benefit of Glenkirk's handicapped citizens. **ATTENTION, ALL BICYCLISTS:
THIS COULD SAVE YOUR LIVES!**



Bicyclists must ride with traffic, on the right-hand side of the road. This is required by Illinois law, for some very good reasons:

FIRST, traffic signs are on the right-hand side of the road, and bikers are required to obey them. If a biker rides against traffic, on the left-hand side of the road, the signs cannot be seen, and the biker could have a serious, possibly fatal, accident.

SECOND, there must be enough clearance for cars to pass the biker. There is room when cars and cyclists travel in the same direction. Drivers can slow down until it is safe to pass cyclists going in the same direction as the car. But a cyclist riding toward a car allows the driver no way of giving clearance. Slowing down or even stopping a car cannot prevent a collision with an advancing bicyclist.

THIRD, a biker riding against traffic would be struck on the bike's right handle bar, forcing the rider into the automobile and causing a serious, if not fatal, injury.

FOURTH, a cyclist riding the wrong way at night would be blinded by headlights of oncoming cars.

Glenview law requires every bicycle to have both a white headlight and a red rear reflector.

All cyclists may ride on sidewalks in Glenview, and the Police Department encourages bikers under age 10 to use sidewalks instead of streets for biking. Please note: The law also requires bikers on sidewalks must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians, and give adequate warning of approach. Bikers should have either bells or horns for this purpose. (Shouting or whistling is both meaningless and rude, especially if a cyclist is approaching a pedestrian from behind.)

Bikers should keep in mind that a pedestrian, especially an elderly person, can be seriously injured if struck by a bicycle.

As the group believed that terms could not be further negotiated, it decided that negotiations with another company (Centel Communications) should begin. President Smith requested Glenview trustees to authorize village representatives to enter into such negotiations.

Glenview trustees, however, have asked for a report of the nature of the Cablenet impasse before authorizing opening of negotiations with another company.

Reflections of the past

Situated at the rear of the Historical Center at 1112 Waukegan Road is the Glenview Area Historical Society's new library, dedicated on Sunday, May 23.

It was designed to look like an 19th century coach house, in order to blend with the architecture of the 1864 building used as the Historical Center. The three-story library will serve as a repository for historical books, papers and pictures available to the public for study and research.

The building is fire-resistant and its temperature and humidity controls are set to preserve paper and wood. Funds used to build the library (\$200,000) came from many sources, including gifts from private individuals and a grant from Glenview's federal revenue-sharing funds. Ground was broken in September of 1980. Richard Hibbard, former village trustee, was chairman of the building committee, and David H. Kearns of Glenview was the architect.

BEN YOSHIOKA, consultant to the Executive Service Corps of Chicago and president of Heiwa Terrace, has been appointed to the Library Board to fill the unexpired term of Bruce Ogilvie, who moved to another community. An 18-year Glenview resident, Yoshioka recently retired from the Container Division of Container Corporation, where he was manager of marketing services and a director of the International Design Conference in Aspen.



Yoshioka has been a member of School Board 68 and formerly served on the board of the Niles Township Sheltered Workshop. He holds degrees in both political science and public administration from the University of California (Berkeley).

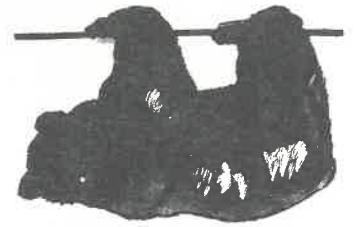
This is an opportunity to sign up for a consultation with an energy expert in your own home, and could result in saving between 30 and 50% on your utility bills.

Before going on vacation:

1. Put your home on the **house-watch list** at the Police Department, and while you are there borrow a **free light timer** (furnished courtesy of Glenview Jay Cees). Join **Theft-Guard** if you are not already a member. It's free too — ask the Police Department about it and you can **borrow an engraving tool**.

MAKE THE HOUSE LOOK LIVED-IN

2. Cancel all deliveries, or have a **responsible neighbor** pick up newspapers, milk, mail, and anything else left at your door. If your **responsible neighbor** lives next door and has a second car, ask if it can be parked in your driveway part of the time you're away.

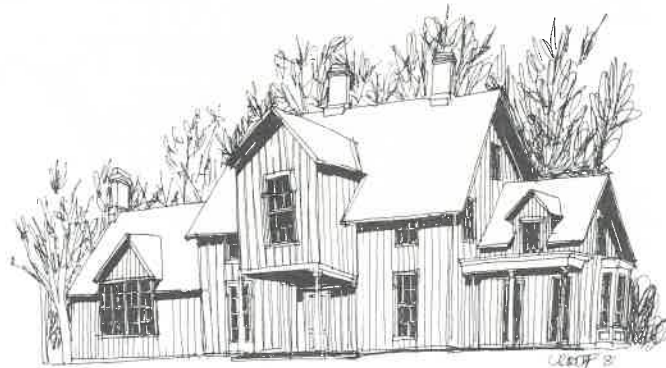
3. Arrange for someone to **mow your lawn** and leave trash in your garbage cans.

4. Put jewelry and small valuables in a **safety-deposit box at the bank**.

5. On the day of departure, **double-check all doors and windows**, including basement and garage, to **make sure they are locked**. Disconnect the electric garage-door opener. Leave a radio playing (on a timer, preferably). Leave shades and draperies in **normal positions**.

WHEN TRAVELING BY CAR:

6. Keep **everything** (clothes, suitcases, cameras, handbags, etc.) in the **trunk, out of sight**. Keep the car locked at all times. **Never leave valuables in hotel or motel rooms**. Ask the manager to keep in the vault what you can't carry with you.
