He holds a master's degree in Public Administration from Pennsylvania State University. His undergraduate study was as Niagara University, Niagara Falls, N.Y.

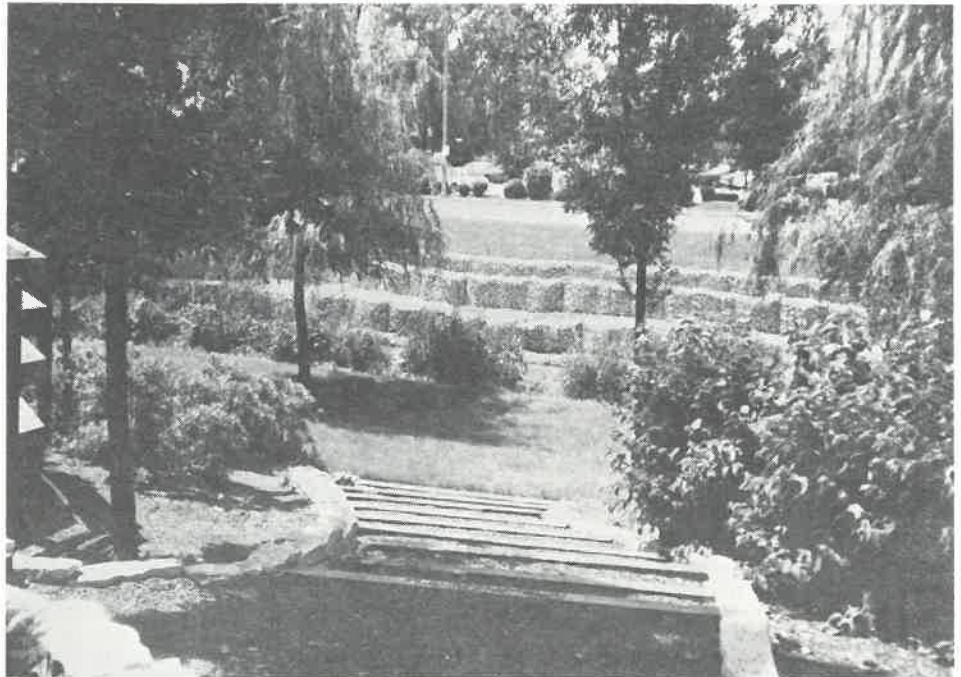
His duties will begin in Glenview on Monday, August 2.

Sylvan escape in downtown Glenview West Fork Green is hidden asset

Motorists driving on Glenview Road between Waukegan and River Roads in the heart of downtown Glenview might not know they are passing one of the beauty-spots of the northern suburbs — West Fork Green.

The description of its location is almost longer than the park itself: it's on the north bank of the West Fork of the North Branch of the Chicago River.

The hidden little park (which seems strangely remote, once you are there) is reached through the village parking lot on the south side of Glenview Road, between Waukegan Road and the bridge. Several years ago it was a mass of weeds, broken tree limbs and unsightly debris. Then the village Public Works Department went to work, cleaning it up, adding trees, shrubs and flowers, and building a redwood deck for picnics or just sitting and dreaming.

The final touch, a gabion wall (wire mesh troughs filled with crushed rock) on the south bank and a grassy area up to the curb on River Road, has recently completed the project.

Visitors will notice a fringe of wild growth along the north bank in the park area, left as a visual barrier to the water's edge. Children who visit the park should be warned not to step through the fringe of wild grasses, or they could fall into the river.

SENIOR HANDYMAN SERVICE NOW AVAILABLE TO RESIDENTS 60 AND OLDER who are unable to pay today's prices for professional work

The Senior Citizen Commission and the Glenview Senior Center are now offering Senior Handyman Service for adults 60 and older who are unable to work around the house or afford professional service at today's rates.

Simple household repairs (such as holes in window screens, loose tiles, broken stairs, or changing light bulbs in hard-to-reach fixtures) will be performed by the Senior Handyman Service at \$5 to \$7 an hour, depending upon the job. Please note that **the service does not include plumbing or electrical work**. There is a minimum charge for one hour, whether or not the work takes that long. Those eligible may order the Senior Handyman Service by calling 724-4793.

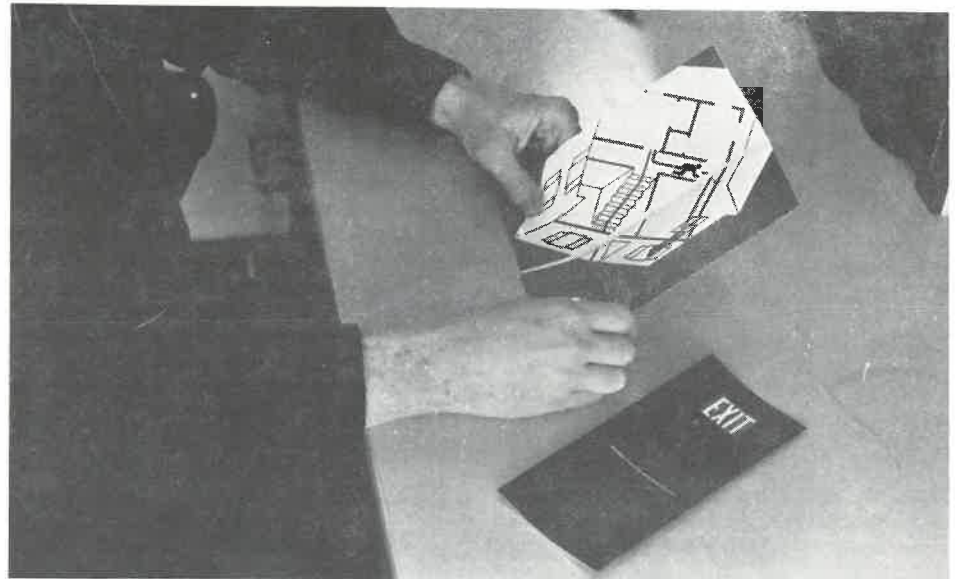

Have you made an exit plan for your family in case of fire?

If your family has not made a fire-exit plan, call the Fire Department at 724-2141 and ask to speak to Lt. DiClementi or some member of the Fire Prevention Bureau.

After you have made your exit plan you should have a family fire drill at least once a year, at night, after everyone has retired.

Most residential fires occur at night, according to the Fire Department, so your family should rehearse the exit plan to make sure everyone is prepared. Don't put it off — prepare your plan now and have your first drill while the weather is pleasant. (You may want to repeat the drill in six months, when the weather is less favorable, to see how it goes under wintertime conditions.)

In June

The Glenview Trustees . . .

¶ Accepted the bid of Arrow Road Construction Company of Mt. Prospect (\$42,724.98) for street resurfacing in Glenview Woodlands, and the bid of Carlo V. Santucci (\$38,679.60) for a water main interconnection (at Lilac, Milwaukee and Larch) to improve service.

¶ Amended the zoning ordinance to limit height of roof-top structures to 12 feet above any roof line, and amended the determination of building heights to the average of the finished grades of ground adjacent to all sides of buildings.

¶ Awarded a contract (\$8,200) to Richard A. Miller Associates of Deerfield for a design to reconstruct the roadway on Prairie Street between Roosevelt Drive and Elm Street.

¶ Awarded a contract (\$6,750) to Marell, Inc., of Hillsboro, Wisconsin, for razing of the unneeded water tower in Glenview Countryside.

¶ Increased the number of available licenses for disposal contractors by one (from 14 to 15).

¶ Prohibited **after-dark** solicitation for the purpose of taking orders for the sale of goods or services.

¶ Prohibited parking on the north side of Prairie Street between Pine and Depot Streets from 8pm to 6am, and parking on either side of Chestnut Avenue at any time of the day or night.

¶ Approved replacing a YIELD sign on Washington Street at Prairie Street with a STOP sign.

¶ Granted permits to Kraft, Inc., for a tent and for serving liquor for one night (at a charity ball), and for a tent at Glenbrook Hospital for a one-day outdoor fair.

THE FIRE DEPARTMENT'S INVALID PROGRAM is still in effect, but is now handled by computer. The orange stickers formerly used have now been discontinued, as such exterior house markings are no longer necessary. (Some residents feared the stickers might attract robbers to a house where a disabled person could not call for help.) If there is a disabled person in your home, please register with the Fire Department, 724-2141, and have your address placed on the computer list. Then, in case of fire, the computer will immediately alert firefighters and paramedics to the presence of someone who must have special assistance in order to escape.

O'Hare expansion scaled down — city now more attentive to suburbs

Thanks in part to the state of the economy, O'Hare Airport's expansion plans have been modified, and Chicago aviation officials are now willing to meet with suburban officials directly, instead of exclusively through the O'Hare Advisory Commission, as in the past.

Mayor Martin J. Butler of Park Ridge, leader of the suburban anti-noise contingent, says that from now on negotiation is the best way to work out differences, as court actions will cause further delays and probably result in little or no suburban gains.

Plans for two satellite terminals, connected to the main terminal by underground transit, have been dropped, and the western roadway access and remote parking facilities indefinitely postponed.

Cargo facilities must be upgraded as soon as possible to meet current and future demands, but they will be relocated to make space for a new international terminal close to domestic gates. Plans for the international terminal are still hazy, however, and the highly touted above-ground "people mover" system is probably still 10 to 20 years in the future.

Police find robbery suspect after months of persistent tracking

"People hear about crimes committed here, and after awhile they probably think we've forgotten about them," says Glenview Police Chief David J. Kelly with a wry smile. "What the public may not realize is that our detectives work continuously on unsolved cases."

Example: Last January two armed robberies took place in Glenview within a few days, one at a shop in Plaza del Prado, and the other at a shop on Waukegan Road. In each case the robber waited until only one clerk was on duty and no customers were in the store. (The Plaza del Prado robbery took place during the lunch hour, and the Waukegan Road robbery about closing time.)

Glenview Detectives David Jenkins and Sgt. Ronald Zelasko, who were assigned to follow the cases, compared notes with detectives in other communities and discovered that some robberies elsewhere seemed similar. Gradually, they put together enough descriptive information to develop a composite drawing of a man's face.

In June, when Glencoe Police Officer Floyd Mohr made a traffic arrest, Glencoe Detective Steve List ran the man's name through a computer and discovered he had not only served time for robbery, but was currently wanted by Skokie authorities. List asked Glenview officers if they wanted to look at him. They did, indeed.

The suspect was brought to Glenview, identified by both victims, and is now in custody in the Cook County jail awaiting trial. Total time elapse between the second Glenview robbery and the man's arrest: five and a half months. While the original holdups were news last January, the arrest on June 15 went unnoticed. We wanted to tell you about it.

HOME-HEATING ASSISTANCE FOR LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS

Federal energy assistance for low-income households in suburban Cook County is available to heads of households of any age, whether heat is paid for directly or included in rents.

Gross income for the 90 days before application must not exceed the following: For 1 person, \$1,347; 2 people, \$1,783; 3, \$2,187; 4, \$2,668; 5, \$2,956; 6, \$3,231; 7, \$3,397; 8, \$3,577; 9, \$3,757; 10, \$3,937.

Those applying must be heads of households (or relatives or friends, in cases where a head of household cannot apply in person), and must present: copies of most recent checks or stubs for Social Security, SSI, VA benefits or pensions, or copies of statements from the agencies involved, or copies of bank statements or deposit slips showing automatic deposits.

Those receiving AFDC must present current green cards. Those receiving wages, salaries or checks for self-employment, dividends or interest, should show documentary evidence for the preceding 90 days.
