## At long last . . . Cable television is on the way

A cable television ordinance has been adopted by the Village Board, climaxing three years of exhaustive study, investigation and cooperative effort with other municipalities.

The ordinance provides the authority for franchising cable communication services. A franchise agreement with Cablenet, Inc., and its parent company, Cybermedix, Ltd., has been approved to provide such services.

The franchise agreement approved by the Glenview Village Board is

identical to the one accepted by the Northbrook Village Board.

Cablenet, headquartered in Mount Prospect, is currently in the process of installing cable facilities in ten north-west municipalities. Once the franchise agreement has been signed and executed, strand mapping and system design will begin.

Estimates are that about 15% of the Glenview community will be receiving cable TV by the fall of 1983, and the remaining 85% no later than October of 1984.

## Library plans building addition

The building committee of the Glenview Public Library, Karen Davis, Rachelle McClarren, and William Noreen (chairman), has been asked to interview architects and make recommendations to the library board regarding a 17,000-foot addition to the present library building.

Library directors have been discussing space problems for the past two years. A feasibility study was completed in September of 1981, and a plan submitted in June of 1982.

The library board has allocated \$45,000 in its 1983 budget for professional fees required for final plans to be prepared. Financing will be decided upon after studying various options.

The present library building was erected in 1955 and an addition was built in 1968. Designed to hold 110,000 books, it currently houses more than 130,000.

The Illinois Department of Law Enforcement has ordered Glenview police to collect all Tylenol products in the village as soon as possible. Your cooperation is urgently requested to help prevent further fatalities.

**PLEASE DO NOT FLUSH Tylenol products down the toilet, because you might destroy evidence that could be useful in discovering who or what caused the adulteration.**

## During the month of September The Glenview Trustees . . .

¶ Approved a cable television ordinance enabling the village to grant a franchise, and approved a franchise agreement with Cablenet, Inc., of Mt. Prospect. (See story on page 1.)

¶ Approved the agreement and consent decree of the Suburban O'Hare Commission. (See article on this page.)

¶ Approved a resolution passed by Riverwoods, Deerfield and Northbrook, for cooperative effort to persuade the Army Corps of Engineers to construct upstream facilities to detain flood waters of the middle and west forks of the North Branch of the Chicago River.

¶ Approved a joint resolution with Deerfield to seek federal funds for construction of floodwater detention facilities on Site #27 in Bannockburn.

¶ Allocated \$200,000 of local Motor Fuel Tax funds for removal of old pavement and installation of new pavement, sanitary sewer, curb, gutter and sidewalk on Shermer Road north of Lake Avenue.

¶ Awarded a contract to De Paolo of Niles (\$180,488) for pavement reconstruction and some curb and gutter replacement on Chester Drive between Landwehr Road and Miller Drive, and on Prairie Lawn between Linneman Street and Glenview Road.

¶ Accepted easements for traffic signals from owners of Carillon Square and Jewel shopping centers, and allocated local Motor Fuel Tax funds (\$97,331) for installation of the signals. (The village will be reimbursed by the shopping-center property owners for 25% of the amount.)

¶ Awarded a contract (\$38,774) to Redlin, Inc., for painting and cathodic protection (to prevent corrosion) of the Portage Run water-storage tank.

¶ Added engineering work, as approved by state and federal Environmental Protection Agencies, to the sanitary-sewer study being conducted by Harza Engineering, approving an increase of \$36,064, 75% of which will come from federal funds and 25% from village funds.

¶ Awarded a contract (\$10,305) to Northern Weathermakers of Evanston for modification of the heating and air-conditioning system at the Fire Station.

¶ Awarded a contract (\$4,249) to Perma-Line Corporation for maintenance of thermoplastic pavement markers.

# Leaves can work for you - and even save you money . . .



## BUT NOT IN THE STREET

Please do not sweep or rake leaves onto the roadway. While some municipalities have equipment for street-sweeping that will handle piles of leaves, Glenview does not. The village street-sweeper has a vacuum pickup tube eight inches in diameter, large enough to handle normal leaf-fall on roadways. But sticks, twigs, or piles of leaves clog the pickup tube, causing breakdowns that cost time and money for repairs (adding to the cost of government).

### HERE ARE FOUR EXCELLENT WAYS TO HANDLE LEAVES:

**1- Bag them for removal by your regular waste-disposal company.** (For esthetic reasons, please don't put them out for collection earlier than after dark on the night before collection.)

**2- Leave them on the ground to decay where they fall.** They will decompose within a few months, returning nutri-

ents to the soil. (Trees nourished on their own leaves need no added fertilizers.) Decayed leaves increase the capacity of the soil to retain moisture, and help insulate the ground, maintaining a more constant winter environment for roots and plant organisms.

**3- Rake them into corners, or under shrubs and fences for storage.** In the spring they make fine fertilizer and mulch for trees, shrubs, flower and vegetable beds.

**4- Compost them** either in a pit or in plastic bags. To compost in plastic bags, add a shovelful of soil and a pint of liquid lawn fertilizer to each bag to dampen leaves thoroughly. Tie the bags, punch three or four holes in each to allow air to penetrate, and store in a sunny spot.

## Glenview joins action to eliminate excessive airport noise

The City of Chicago, the FAA, the Illinois Attorney General, the County of Du Page, the Village of Glenview and 16 other municipalities affected by airport noise, have agreed to a settlement that offers substantial benefits to the communities surrounding O'Hare Field.

The agreement and consent decree requires Chicago to request the FAA to process an environmental-impact statement and establish a permanent, professionally-staffed noise-abatement

office at O'Hare, at no cost to the surrounding communities.

The action was spearheaded by the Suburban O'Hare Commission and its chairman, Martin J. Butler, Mayor of Park Ridge. Participating municipalities are Addison, Bensenville, Bloomington, Des Plaines, Elk Grove, Elmhurst, Elmwood Park, Franklin Park, Glenview, Harwood Heights, Itasca, Mount Prospect, Niles, Norridge, Park Ridge, Schiller Park, and Wood Dale.

¶ Approved an amendment to the Municipal Code, changing the definition of Class F liquor licenses to allow on-premises consumption of beer and wine in any establishment where food is served.

¶ Amended the zoning ordinance to allow maximum square footage of 120 rather than 100 for sheds on residential properties.

¶ Denied a request from Saga Corporation for sale of industrial bonds to finance a restaurant on the site of an

old bowling alley on the west side of Waukegan Road south of Glenview Road.

¶ Amended certain sections of the swimming-pool ordinance to allow the village to inspect public spas and hot tubs and enforce standards of public health.

¶ Approved Hackney's request to begin selling liquor at 10am rather than 10:30 on eight Sundays when football brunches are being served.

**HALLOWEEN TRICK-OR-TREAT TIME** is Saturday, October 30, from 2 to 8pm. Village President Thomas E. Smith and Police Chief David Kelly urge parents to have children strictly observe this time frame.

Children should make Halloween calls only in their own neighborhoods, only at homes where the neighbors are known to them and their parents, and only at homes where outside lights are turned on.

They should be instructed not to go inside any house, and not to put anything into their mouths while on their rounds. Everything collected should be brought home for careful inspection by parents.

Parents should make sure children are dressed warmly enough for weather conditions and that costumes and masks will not interfere with vision or walking. Each child should have a shopping bag and a flashlight, and be instructed not to cross streets except at intersections and with great care.
