## Call the **RIDESHARE** computer

**Y**ou can save hundreds (maybe even thousands) of dollars, delay the purchase of a new (or second) car, avoid the stress of driving to work every day, make new friends, and even reduce insurance premiums as much as 20 percent.

Sound too good to be true? It isn't. You can have some or all of these benefits by joining a carpool to get to and from work.

North Shore **RideShare**, sponsored by Glenview, Northbrook, Skokie, Morton Grove, the North Shore Council of Mayors, the Chamber of Commerce and the Chicago Area Transportation Study (CATS) will put your transportation needs into a computer to determine who else is driving approximately the same route at the same time every day.

## **NO PARKING** rule in effect December 1

**B**etween 2 and 6am, beginning Wednesday, December 1, cars parked on the street will be towed away, **whether or not there is snow.**

Glenview's winter rule governing on-street overnight parking **will be enforced.** Parked vehicles interfere with clearing streets of ice and snow. Find off-street parking for your vehicles now. Towing is expensive and troublesome for everyone concerned. Please cooperate.

## Village Sanitarian issues Warning about turkeys

Poultry often contains high levels of salmonella organisms, some of which can cause disease. The Village Sanitarian therefore advises handling your Thanksgiving turkey with care:

Fresh turkeys should be kept refrigerated until cooked. Frozen turkeys should be thawed carefully, **exactly** as directed on the tag or wrapper.

Thawing may be done in the refrigerator, in a microwave oven, or at room temperature **in a brown paper bag**. (The bag insulates the bird so it doesn't thaw too fast.) **Maximum thawing time per pound should be carefully observed**, because salmonella grow very rapidly at room temperature.

Never stuff a turkey until just before roasting, as bread and crumbs contain yeast and will produce harmful organisms in great quantities under certain conditions.

Cook the turkey to an interior temperature of **at least 185 degrees Fahrenheit for both bird and stuffing**. That temperature will kill any harmful salmonella present.

After dinner, don't leave warm stuffing inside the bird, because bacteria begin growing again. Scoop the stuffing out and refrigerate it immediately, **separately** from the turkey.

Leftovers should be reheated **quickly** to at least 185 degrees F. (If they are left warming at low heat for any length of time, bacteria will begin growing again.)

## Volunteers wanted for BLOOD-PRESSURE STUDY

Persons with mild high blood pressure are being sought for a study of two widely prescribed antihypertensive medicines, being conducted by the clinical trials program of Evanston and Glenbrook Hospitals.

Participants must either be taking no medicine for hypertension or be able to discontinue the medicine for a minimum of five weeks. The consent of each participant's physician is required.

Volunteers may visit either Evanston or Glenbrook Hospital, whichever is more convenient, and will receive free treatment for hypertension during the testing. For more information or to volunteer, call 492-4512.

## Have you had your Illinois Energy Audit?

**G**lenview residents who have not yet registered for energy audits can still take advantage of the Illinois Energy Audits Association offer of a comprehensive energy-efficiency household inspection for only \$15.

Upon request, a trained conservation advisor will inspect a home from attic to basement, examining heating and cooling systems, water heater, doors, windows, ceilings and walls, looking for places where heat can escape or cold air enter.

From the information collected, a computer-analyzed conservation plan will be prepared on the spot, furnishing you with a printed report of your own home's energy efficiency, including recommended conservation measures: insulation, caulking, weatherstripping, and (if practical for your house) ways of using such renewable sources of energy as the wind and the sun.

Some retrofits to save both money and energy can be done by the homeowner at little expense. The

advisor will tell how, and estimate how long each suggested energy-saving modification will take to pay for itself.

The advisor will also supply information about tax credits and other energy-conservation programs available to Illinois residents, as well as lists of contractors and material suppliers in our area.

The Illinois Energy Audits Association is a **nonprofit corporation** that was formed by eight gas and electric utility companies. It complies with the Illinois plan required by the federal Residential Conservation Service Program. The same kind of audit it performs, if done by a commercial firm, would cost much more than \$15.

## How to keep your house from burning

**E**very year thousands of fires result from misused or defective heating equipment. The **cause** of these fires (which destroy property and lives) is either ignorance or carelessness.

**The energy shortage is no longer a crisis, but a fact of modern life.** We insulate our homes to get more value for our heating and cooling dollars. We are also experimenting with alternate power sources — nuclear and solar energy, and such old-timers as wood-burning stoves, fireplaces and space heaters.

Because we are not so experienced as our forefathers in the use of the latter three items, we sometimes misuse them, endangering lives and property. The Fire Department therefore offers the following advice for saving energy and remaining safe from fire:

### WOOD STOVES AND FIREPLACES

Follow the local code for fire safety and the **directions of the manufacturer** of your equipment. Most home fires can be traced to inadequate clearance, defective chimneys, or overfiring (making too large a fire in a stove or fireplace).

### GASOLINE

Gasoline vapors are highly volatile, and can be ignited by a pilot light, a cigarette or a spark, even at below-zero temperatures. **Do not store gasoline over the winter.**

Left-over gasoline for powering mowers, boats or other machinery should be poured carefully into the gas tank of a car. (A gallon of regular will do no harm in a car that takes lead-free gas at the pump.) **Cap the empty gasoline can tightly and store away from any source of heat.**

### PORTABLE HEATERS

Buy a heater with a broad, solid base, and an automatic cutoff switch in case of accidental tipover. **Make sure the heater you buy bears the seal of a reputable testing agency.**

Because of high wattage, some electric heaters require separate circuits. If yours does, have an electrician install one in the location where the heater will be used.

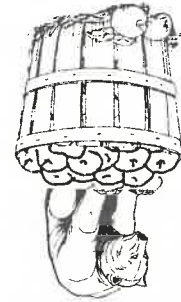

the manufacturer **exactly.** Under no  
circumstances should you use fuel other  
than that specifically called for. Keep  
the heater away from stairways, doors  
and other traffic patterns, furniture,  
draperies and clothes. Keep **children  
and pets away from the heater.**

Any energy-powered appliance can  
generate enough heat to cause a fire.  
Kitchen gadgets, electrical tools, and  
even light bulbs should be turned off or  
unplugged when not in use. Call the  
Fire Prevention Bureau, 272-2141, if  
you have questions or need advice.
