## January 31 filing deadline Candidates for spring election must file ethics statements and petitions

Glenview residents interested in being elected to serve on the **Village Board**, the **Library Board** or the **Park Board** should begin now to collect the necessary documents for candidacy. The final filing date is **Monday, January 31.** The election will be held April 12.

Before the January filing date, a candidate must file an **ethics statement** with Cook County. To do so, call the County Clerk's office, 443-8720, and ask for an **ethics statement form** to be mailed to you. When it arrives, complete and return it promptly. A receipt will be mailed to you.

Meantime, purchase enough **nonpartisan petition forms** from a stationery or office-supply store for at least 50 names, and collect the signatures of at least 50 registered voters who are residents of Glenview.

Present the **ethics statement receipt** and the **completed petition forms** to the Village Clerk at the Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Road, **between Monday, January 24, and Monday January 31.** Filing closes at 5pm Monday, January 31, and no candidate documents will be accepted after that date and time.

Duties of **Village Trustees** include setting municipal policies, adopting annual budgets and determining the extent of village services. Trustees meet regularly on the first and third Monday evenings of every month at the Village Hall. For further information call the Glenview Village Manager's office, 724-1700.

Duties of **Library Directors** include setting Glenview Public Library policies, adopting annual budgets and determining the extent of library services. Directors meet regularly, usually on the third Tuesday of the month, at the public library. For further information call Alice E. Nightingale, president of the library board (724-2675) or Peter Bury, Head Librarian (724-5200).

Duties of **Park Commissioners** include setting policies of the Glenview Park District, adopting annual budgets and determining the extent of Park District services. Commissioners meet regularly on the second Thursday of every month at the Park District office. For further information call the Park District Superintendent, 724-5670.

**RESIDENTS ARE RESPONSIBLE** for prompt removal of snow and ice from sidewalks adjacent to their homes. Several Glenview mail carriers were injured last winter when they fell on icy sidewalks. Make sure you have a serviceable snow shovel or blower and a supply of ice-melting compound on hand throughout the season. (Not only mail carriers, but children and senior adults use the sidewalks every day.)

## Registration for Youth Baseball to be held in January

**R**egistration for Glenview Youth Baseball will be held concurrently at Rugen Community Center and the Glenview Ice Center on two successive Saturdays, January 8 and 15, from 10am to 2pm. The name of the activity has been changed, but the program is the same as in past years.

Boys and girls between 8 and 12 are eligible, provided they become **age 8 before August 1, 1983**, and **do not reach age 13 until after August 1, 1983**.

All players must register, whether or not they played last year. Parents must accompany children to register. First-year players must bring birth certificates to the registration.

¶ Established Special Service Area #4 (Glenway Sanitary Sewer for portions of Landwehr Road, Glenway Drive, Leanne and Fredric Courts), and accepted the bid of Daniel De Vito of Chicago (\$84,415) for sewer construction.

¶ Accepted the bid of Autumn Tree Care of Glenview (\$28,779.75) for annual trimming of parkway trees.

¶ Accepted the bid of Wil-Shore Ford of Wilmette (\$11,690) for a one-ton dump truck for Public Works use.

The free babysitter course conducted by the Glenview Fire Department has been tremendously popular in past years, and will be repeated on Saturday, January 22, from 9am to 1pm.

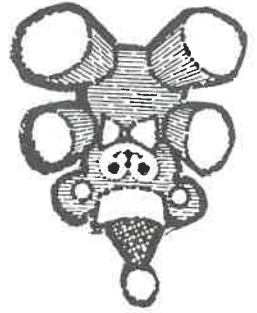

Will you be around  
After the holidays?

Most residential fires that occur during the holidays are preventable, according to the Glenview Fire Department, and are frequently due to the handling of holiday decorations.

Because we want you to be around after the holidays, we hope you will heed the advice of the Fire Department, and call 724-2141 if you have any questions:

If you use Christmas-tree lights from past seasons, check each string carefully for **broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires and loose connections.**

If you find such faults, **discard the lights and buy new ones.** The price of a new string of lights is nothing compared to the safety and happiness of your family. (Make sure the new ones bear the UL seal or the insignia of another reputable testing laboratory.)

**Never use indoor lights outside, or vice versa.** Either way could be dangerous. Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, walls, or other firm supports to prevent wind damage.

**No more than three strings of lights should be connected to one extension.** Read the manufacturer's instructions carefully, and do not use more than the recommended number of lights on the same circuit.

**Never string Christmas-tree lights on a metal tree.** Any damage to insulation could cause the whole tree to



become charged with electricity. (Use spotlights above or beside, but never touching, a metal tree.)

**Turn off tree and decorative lights before leaving the house or going to bed.** A short circuit could cause a fire while you are away or asleep.

**Never leave children alone with a lighted tree.** Instruct them not to touch electrical equipment or decorations at any time. Be careful about breakable tree ornaments or those with parts that could be swallowed by children or pets.

**Make sure tinsel is made of non-leaded materials.** Anything containing lead is hazardous because it could be ingested by children or pets.

**Dispose of wrappings immediately after the presents are opened.** Place materials in metal containers ready for garbage pickup. **Do not burn them in the fireplace,** because they could either flash and cause a chimney fire or emit toxic fumes.

Make sure any **artificial tree** you buy or use bears the label of a **reputable testing laboratory.** Unlabeled plastic materials ignite easily, burn rapidly and produce toxic fumes.

Make sure any **natural tree** you buy is **as fresh as possible.** Tests for freshness: deep green color, piney scent, sticky sap on the butt end of the trunk, and needles that do not fall off when the tree is bounced.

**Keep a natural tree outside in the cold until ready for decorating.** Cut off about two inches of trunk before bringing it into the house. Mount it on a sturdy stand with a large water basin. Fill the basin and **refill every day** as long as the tree is indoors.

**Place the tree away from any heat source and away from the stairwell.** Make sure it doesn't block traffic patterns or doorways. **Take it down as soon as it begins to dry out.**

**PREPARE CHRISTMAS POULTRY WITH CARE** because of a high incidence of salmonella bacteria in fowl. Thawing of frozen poultry can be done safely in one of three ways, according to the Glenview Sanitarian: In the refrigerator; at room temperature, if wrapped in double brown paper bags and left out not longer than one hour per pound; or in a microwave oven. Poultry should not be stuffed until just before cooking, because warm stuffing left in a bird for a prolonged period provides an ideal environment for growth of bacteria. Poultry should be cooked to an internal temperature (of both meat and dressing) of at least 185 degrees F, and should be refrigerated promptly after the meal. Leftovers should be reheated quickly to at least 165 F.
