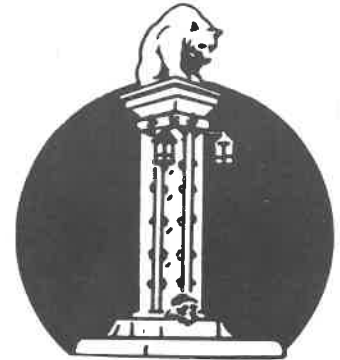

### REGULAR MEETING SCHEDULE for Official Village Boards and Commissions

All official meetings of Village government are open to the public, in accordance with the provisions of the Illinois Revised Public Meeting Act. All meetings are held at 8 PM at the Village Hall, 1225 Waukegan Road.

If you are interested in a particular matter, it would be wise to telephone the Manager's Office in advance, to make sure the meeting will indeed be held and the item you are concerned about will be on the agenda.

**APPEARANCE COMMISSION** — Usually the second and fourth Wednesdays of the month, on the following dates: January 14 and 28, February 11 and 25, March 11 and 25, April 8 and 22, May 13 and 27, June 10 and 24, July 8 and 22, August 12 and 26, September 9 and 23, October 14 and 28, November 25, and December 9.

**BOARD OF TRUSTEES** — First and third Mondays, with the exception of Labor Day, September 7 (see dates): January 5 and 19, February 2 and 16, March 2 and 16, April 6 and 20, May 4 and 18, June 1 and 15, July 6 and 20, August 3 and 17, September 8 (TUESDAY) and 21, October 5 and 19, November 2 and 16, December 7 and 21.

**PLAN COMMISSION** — Second and fourth Tuesdays of every month, except December (see dates): January 13 and 27, February 10 and 24, March 10 and 24, April 14 and 28, May 12 and 26, June 9 and 23, July 14 and 28, August 11 and 25, September 8 and 22, October 13 and 27, November 10 and 24, and December 8.

**ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS** — Second and fourth Mondays, with the exception of Memorial Day, May 25, and the month of December (see dates): January 12 and 26, February 9 and 23, March 9 and 23, April 13 and 27, May 11, June 8 and 22, July 13 and 27, August 10 and 24, September 14 and 28, October 12 and 26, November 9 and 23, and December 14.

### AFTER-HOURS BILL DROP

There is now an after-hours metal slot for payment of water bills, located in the glass door of the main (east side) entrance to the Village Hall.

Please note that NO CASH should ever be dropped through the slot. Checks only, please.

### ALUMINUM WIRING DANGER TOLD

Aluminum electrical wire, used in some Glenview residences during the late 1960's, has since been found to cause electrical problems — even fires. The trouble occurs when the aluminum wires oxidize, causing heat to build up.

If your house was built between 1965 and 1970, the Building Department says you would be wise to examine your electrical wiring to see if the material is aluminum (silver colored) or copper.

You can do this yourself, simply by removing the plate from an outlet or switch box and looking at the wires to see whether the color indicates aluminum or copper.

**CAUTION: PULL THE FUSE OR OPEN THE CIRCUIT BREAKER BEFORE DOING THIS**, as you may have to touch something in the process.

If the wires are not copper, you are advised to call a licensed electrician or the Building Department (724-1700) immediately. Better safe than sorry.

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## DURING THE MONTH OF DECEMBER

### The Glenview Trustees • • •

- Abated 1980 tax levies for:  
East-side sewer (\$385,000 in corporate purpose bonds, Series 1976), acquisition of water works (\$4,525,000 in corporate purpose bonds, Series 1977), and water system improvements (\$5,700,000 in corporate purpose bonds, Series 1979).
- Adopted the 1981 budget, as approved. Total for all funds: \$14,321,388.
- Selected Glenview Road as the route for a storm sewer from Club Circle to the west fork of the North Branch of the Chicago River, in accordance with plans and specifications to be prepared by the Village and approved by the Illinois Department of Transportation, and to be financed by local Motor Fuel Tax funds. Approved a request to the Illinois Department of Transportation for reimbursement of a portion of the cost of the above-mentioned storm sewer.
- Held a Public Hearing regarding the establishment of a special-service area for a storm-sewer improvement on Burr Oak Drive and Mickey Lane. (Trustees will proceed with the matter unless notarized petitions are received, before February 13, from a majority of electors and property owners involved.)
- Created a new liquor license category, known as Class J, allowing package sales in pouring establishments, and limited Class J licenses to 4. Increased Class C (package sales) from 3 to 4, and decreased Classes A and B (pouring) from 25 to 20.
- Annexed Woodlands I and II, a total of 56 completely surrounded acres.
- Approved raising the monthly compensation of elected officials, effective May 1 of this year, as follows: President, from \$75 to \$100; Trustees, from \$5 (per meeting) to \$25 (per month); Clerk, from \$50 to \$75.
- Approved a 7-lot subdivision between Woodlawn and Hollywood, and a 3-lot subdivision at 3325 Bellwood.

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*ALTHOUGH GLENVIEW AND NILES both objected, the Cook County Zoning Board of Appeals has approved a special use for an office building containing a drive-in bank at the southwest corner of Greenwood and Golf Roads.*

## LIBRARY DIRECTORS TO SERVE SHORTENED TERMS

The Glenview Public Library Board of Directors has passed a resolution shortening the terms of Library Directors from six years to four. The change becomes effective with the April election.

The Board will have three vacancies for directors as of April 7, and any qualified Glenview resident can become a candidate by filing a petition containing the signatures of at least 50 Glenview residents, provided the petition is filed with the Village Clerk between Monday, January 19, and Monday, January 26.

In order to provide continuity on the Board, two of the elected directors will serve four-year terms and one will serve a two-year term. The Illinois State Library law stipulates that the determination as to who will serve which terms be made by lot at the April Library Board of Directors meeting.

## LITTLE LEAGUE REGISTRATION

Registration for Little League Baseball will be held on three successive Saturdays — January 17, 24 and 31 — from 9 AM to 4 PM, at the Glenview Ice Center on Landwehr Road.

Boys and girls between 8 and 12 are eligible, provided the child is 8 before August 1 of this year, or 13 after August 1 of this year.

Everyone must register, whether or not he/she played last year. First-time registrants must bring birth certificates. Parents must accompany children. Donations are \$50 per player or \$65 per family.

## THE GROVE HERITAGE ASSOCIATION OFFERS PROGRAM

Program chairmen of local organizations should take note that "Alaskan Journey," a 25-minute color slide presentation, is now available from The Grove Heritage Association for use by local groups.

The slide program retraces the routes of Robert Kennicott, son of the Dr. John Kennicott who settled at The Grove in 1836, across the wilderness in the mid-1800's. Reports and specimens sent by Robert Kennicott, Illinois' first naturalist, to the Smithsonian Institution, were instrumental in the purchase of Alaska from Russia in 1867.

## UNWELCOME VISITORS

Head lice among school children are an old problem, and no cause for panic among parents. Keep a close watch, and if any of the little pests (the lice, not the children) are found, call your doctor immediately and ask for a medicated shampoo.

Use the shampoo *ONLY AS DIRECTED*, because overuse can be harmful. It is also important to understand that the medicated shampoo is a *TREATMENT*, not a preventive.

Besides treating the scalps of children who have head lice, be sure to launder all clothes and bed linens in hot water. Caps or hats that can't be washed should be sent to the cleaner. A spray product is available for decontamination of carpeting and furniture. Call the Health Department (724-1700) or your school nurse for further information.

## NEW BUS SERVICE TO OAKTON COMMUNITY COLLEGE

NORTRAN's #220 bus (Glenview - Des Plaines - O'Hare) has now been partly rerouted to service the new Oakton Community College campus.

The route now travels from Golf Mill via Golf Road into the campus, then back to Golf Road to River Road to Miner (Northwest Highway) in downtown Des Plaines.

Other segments of the route remain the same. Route 220 buses operate hourly at midday, Monday through Saturday, and more often during weekday rush hours.

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**EXPANDED HOURS!** You can now call the Center Monday through Friday from 9 AM to 4 PM. The new I & R (Information and Referral) Service is possible through a grant from the Suburban Cook County Area on Aging.

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**PHILANTHROPIC HELP NEEDED:** The Center's project to help babies at Cook County Hospital is operating on an extremely small budget. If your organization is willing to contribute either money or materials, please call the Center for particulars. So far, the items collected include booties, bonnets, blankets and diapers, but will include other baby items when spring garage sales are held.

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**SENIOR COMPANIONS NEEDED:** If you are 60 or older and interested in being with people your own age, you'd enjoy being a Senior Companion here in the Glenview area. A federally-funded program provides an opportunity for retirees to work 20 to 24 hours a week. In addition to an hourly rate of pay, you receive meal allowances and reimbursement for travel expenses.
