### POHL IS NEW VILLAGE TRUSTEE

Robert O. Pohl, elected April 7, is the "new face" on the Village Board, though his face is hardly new in Glenview. He has lived here for 30 years, and has served 16 years as a member of the Park Board and four years as chairman of the Plan Commission.

A retired career banker, Pohl, a native of Milwaukee, is now a part-time financial consultant. He is the father of two sons, one a Florida physician and the other a California nuclear engineer, and a daughter, who handles public relations

for the Northern Illinois University Alumni Foundation. He also has five grandchildren.

His wife Jean shares his enthusiasm for hiking and mountain climbing. When he is not pursuing that kind of energetic activity or sitting on the Village Board, Bob Pohl is chairman of the American Red Cross of North Cook County, serving more than a million people.

### GLENVIEW WELCOMES NEW POLICE CHIEF

Chief David J. Kelly, who formerly served the Evanston Police Department for 24 years (as commander of the uniform patrol division, training director, and director of the youth division) assumed his duties with the Glenview Police Department on May 1.

A graduate of the Northwestern University Traffic Institute, the Southern Police Institute, and the University of Minnesota Juvenile Officers' Institute, he has had experience in every phase of police work, as well as in the Navy. He is currently completing work for a degree in Sociology at Northwestern University, with a minor in Business Administration.

He and his wife Joan live in Evanston. She is a Registered Nurse and active in the North Shore Visiting Nurse Association. The Kellys have four children.

Glenview residents are assured of continued high-quality professional police protection under Chief Kelly's leadership.

### SUPPLEMENTARY AGREEMENT benefits residents using Glenview Road

Glenview has asked the State to amend the Village's road-maintenance agreement to add the portion of Glenview Road between Prairie Lawn and Milwaukee Avenue (outside Village limits), improving road maintenance for residents of subdivisions beyond Prairie Lawn (which are part of the Village), who have to use Glenview Road to come and go.

This coming winter, for the first time, snow and ice control will be handled by Glenview all the way to Milwaukee Avenue.

SPECIAL BULLETINS . . .

- ★ GARBAGE PICKUPS FOR MEMORIAL DAY WEEK: Northfield and Riteway service will be as usual. Brooks and Weidner Monday customers will be serviced on Thursday, May 28. Best will make no pickups on May 25 (Memorial Day), and all customers will be serviced one day late. BFI will make no pickups Monday, May 25, or Thursday, May 28, and all customers will be serviced one day late.
- ★ WHY SHOULD YOU KEEP AWAY from the southwest corner of the basement in case of a tornado warning? Because recent research shows that a tornado (which arrives from the southwest) frequently lifts a building off its foundation and moves it several feet to the northeast, making the southwest corner tip downward into the basement.
- ★ MUST GAS-FUELED LAMPPOSTS BE REMOVED by 1982? The question is still not answered, but the law should be clarified later this year. We will keep you informed.
- ★ A NEWLY REVISED NORTRAN SYSTEM MAP, outlining all transportation services in the north and northwest suburbs, is now available from NORTRAN drivers or by writing NORTRAN at 900 E. Northwest Highway, P.O. Box 388, Des Plaines IL 60016.
- ★ REFLECTIVE "SEND HELP" SIGNS for expressway emergency use are available at the Village Hall, while they last, courtesy of Jennings Chevrolet. Follow instructions on the back for the etiquette of using or seeing the sign.
- ★ DENTAL SERVICES FOR AGE 3 THROUGH SENIOR YEARS are available from the Cook County Public Health Department. Applicants must have a financial screening to be eligible. Those who believe they can qualify should call the Des Plaines Dental Clinic at 297-1200, Extension 214.
- ★ EQUIPMENT FOR SICKROOM OR CONVALESCENT USE (commodes, wheelchairs, walkers, beds, etc.) is available free, courtesy of the Registered Nurses' Club. For loans, call the Health Department, 724-1700.
- ★ FREE PROGRAMS ON HOME SECURITY, fire safety and first aid, with appropriate demonstrations, films, displays and literature, are offered by the Police and Fire Departments. Call Fire Lt. Di Clementi at 724-2141.
- ★ A HONEYSUCKLE APHID, causing tips of stems to wilt as leaves fold up, appeared last year for the first time. Be watchful for its reappearance and spray shrubs with Malathion at the first sign of damage.
- ★ SIGNS OF ELM DISEASE are wilting, then dying, of twigs or branches. If you see an elm that looks as if it is diseased (either on the parkway or on private property) please call the Public Works Department at once (724-1700). Village personnel will take a sample and let the tree's owner know if the disease is present. Privately owned diseased elms must be removed by owners, and the Village takes care of removing publicly owned trees (which are sprayed with methoxychlor every spring).
- ★ A 15-MILE BIKE RALLY will be held Sunday, May 24 (in case of rain May 31) to benefit the Glenview Unit of the American Cancer Society. Anyone of high-school age or older is welcome to ride (with a \$25 entry fee), individually or in teams. Prizes will be awarded. Riders should line up their own sponsors to get the money for the entry fees. Volunteers are needed for check points and registration. Registration deadline is May 15; forms available at District 34, United Way, Glenview State Bank and the Village Hall. Call 328-5147 for more information.

During the month of April

THE GLENVIEW TRUSTEES . . .

- Approved the annual agreement with the State for Glenview to maintain the roadways of four State highways (Glenview Road, Central Street, Harlem Avenue and Shermer Road) within Village limits, plus a supplemental agreement adding Glenview Road between Prairie Lawn and Milwaukee Avenue (through unincorporated area), with customary reimbursement by the State (see story on Page 1).
- Authorized public auction of used Village vehicles by the Northwest Municipal Conference (see item on Page 1).
- Amended planned-unit development ordinances to allow conversion of Domicile Manor to office use by a new developer, zoning five acres at 3633 West Lake Avenue B-2 for general business use.
- Rezoned 2304 and 2309 Pflingsten Road from R-1 to R-4 (single-family lots with minimum size of 10,000 square feet), and approved the two-lot subdivision.
- Approved the RED (Regional Emergency Dispatch) budget for the remainder of this year (\$163,076) and Glenview's share (\$32,941). The RED operation moved from Niles to our Fire Station on May 1, and services five communities (Glenview, Glenbrook Fire District, Niles, North Maine Fire Protection District, and Morton Grove).
- Approved joint agreements with the State for preliminary and design engineering for improvement of Chestnut Avenue (Glenview's share being 15%, or \$22,340), and preliminary engineering only for improvement of Glenview Road (Glenview's share being 15%, or \$10,426), Village expenditures to be paid from local Motor Fuel Tax funds.
- Authorized purchase of a new vehicle for the Chief of Police (\$7,310).
- Approved an amended agreement and Glenview's share (\$3,812) of a \$130,000 study being made by the Suburban O'Hare Commission for control of airport noise. (Chicago is paying \$100,000 and suburbs surrounding O'Hare are sharing the remaining \$30,000.)
- Accepted the bid of Raymar Hydraulic Repair Service of Elk Grove Village (\$5,829.50) for four hydraulic pumps and valves for snowplows.
- Accepted the bid of Illinois FWD Truck and Equipment Company of Rosemont (\$4,219) for a snowplow.
- Accepted the bid of Glazebrook Fire and Equipment Company (\$3,925) for self-contained breathing apparatus for Fire Department use.
- Annexed Glenview Naval Air Station's drainage ditch (overlooked in 1971 when the Station was annexed).
- Accepted the Plan Commission's recommendation for a denial of a subdivision at 1253 Milwaukee Avenue.
- Authorized a street sale in connection with the Village Festival on June 27, and blocking off of Glenview Road between Waukegan Road and the railroad tracks, all day and until the night street dance is concluded.
- Appointed Robert C. Swanson (AIA) to the Appearance Commission until May 31, 1983, and Philip J. Bradke (AIA) to the Building Commission until July 31, 1985. Reappointed: To the Plan Commission, Tom Crowe (to July 31, 1983) and Leo Franz (to July 31, 1984); to the Build-

BEING BURGLARIZED IS TRAUMATIC EXPERIENCE

Home burglaries have increased nearly 70% nationally during the past three years. Authorities believe this is due to the economy — household possessions are worth more now because of inflation.

If you have never been a victim of burglary, you may not know that the experience is *far more* than loss of property easily replaced by insurance. Entering your own home to find it torn to pieces, possibly vandalized, with personal effects scattered on floors, beds and tables, is a harrowing event. Victims feel violated and emotionally damaged.

Taking inventory and reporting details to police is another necessary but emotionally draining process. Even when cleaning and redecorating have been accomplished, some stolen items are found to be irreplaceable at any price — heirlooms, keepsakes, gifts, custom-made objects and furnishings, and so on.

Why risk going through such distress, when, since 1972, Glenview has had a program called THEFT-GUARD, publicized regularly in this Newsletter? During the past nine years, 1,153 Glenview householders have participated. During that period there have been 963 burglaries in Glenview, but ONLY TWO OF THEM IN HOMES PROTECTED BY THEFT-GUARD.

Something that works *that well* must be expensive, right? Wrong! THEFT-GUARD is absolutely FREE. All you need do is visit the Police Administration Building, 1215 Waukegan Road, and borrow an electric engraving tool. Take it home and engrave the *driver's license number* of any member of the family on each engravable item of value (television sets, radio and stereo equipment, cameras and sporting goods — all portable appliances that can be resold. The engraving process will probably take less than an hour, and it is easy work.

When you return the engraver to the Police Department, personnel on duty will give you THEFT-GUARD stickers for doors and windows, announcing to would-be burglars that your house is protected. They will then go elsewhere, as illicit dealers ("fences") to whom they sell stolen goods do not want items that can be easily identified.

Even if your house is never burglarized, identification is valuable in case of accidental loss. Police have been able to return 110 lost bicycles, a handgun, and several cameras and portable radios during the past nine years, only because they were engraved with a driver's license number.

Why a driver's license number instead of name and address? It is less work for you, and police can quickly trace driver's license numbers via computer to Springfield. (P.S.: *The Police Department also offers free security inspections of both homes and businesses. Just call 729-5000 and ask for one to be made at your convenience.*)
