## SIRENS TO BE TESTED THIS MONTH

Glenview's new tornado-warning system will be tested on Tuesday, November 17, at 10:30 a.m. Please DO NOT CALL POLICE OR THE FIRE DEPARTMENT, as their lines are needed for emergencies. THIS IS ONLY A TEST.

Hereafter, the system will be tested on the first Tuesday of every month at 10:30 a.m. When you hear the sirens at that time, you will know IT IS ONLY A TEST. Heard at other times, the sirens will indicate that a tornado has been sighted and you should take cover in the safest place in whatever building you are in at the time.

## NO OVERNIGHT STREET PARKING DURING WINTER — From December 1 through March 31

Glenview residents are reminded that no overnight street parking is allowed in the Village between December 1 and March 31.

The reason for the ban on overnight parking during the winter is SNOW. Public Works crews must work at night in order to keep Village streets clear of snow and ice. Parked cars make the job impossible.

Please remember to find off-street parking NOW, so your car won't be towed away when found on the street between 2 and 6 a.m. on Tuesday, December 1. Nineteen signs are posted in Glenview, reminding residents of the no-parking ordinance. The Police Department will enforce the ordinance, beginning December 1, whether or not there is snow.

## 1982 PARKING PERMITS AVAILABLE THIS MONTH On the last five business days

Glenview residents may buy one-year Commuter Plaza parking permits during the last five business days of November, which are as follows: Friday, November 20; Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, November 23, 24 and 25; Monday, November 30. The price is \$120 per permit.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THE VILLAGE HALL WILL BE CLOSED THURSDAY AND FRIDAY, November 26 and 27, for the Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

Anyone (resident or not) may buy a quarterly Com-muter Parking permit starting December 1 for \$30. The quarterly permit is good from January 1 through March 31, 1982.

## GARBAGE PICKUP SCHEDULE FOR THANKSGIVING WEEK

GLENBROOK customers will have service as usual. RITEWAY will pick up garbage on Thursday until their truck is full, returning on Friday for all other customers. BEST, BROWING-FERRIS and NORTHFIELD customers will be serviced one day late — Thursday customers on Friday, and Friday customers on Saturday.

WEIDNER Thursday twice-a-week customers will have service only on Monday, November 23. Thursday once-a-week customers will have service only on Monday, November 30. BROOKS Thursday customers will be serviced only on Monday, November 23.

## TREAT TURKEY RESPECTFULLY

Poultry can contain high levels of salmonella, some of which can cause disease. The Glenview Health Department advises handling the Thanksgiving turkey with care and respect.

Fresh turkey should be kept refrigerated until cooked. Frozen turkey should be thawed carefully, exactly as directed on the wrapper. Thawing can take place in the refrigerator, at room temperature, or in a microwave oven, but the *maximum thawing time per pound* should be carefully observed. Salmonella grow rapidly in warm temperatures.

Never stuff a turkey until just before roasting, as bread or breadcrumbs contain yeast and can produce harmful organisms in great quantity under certain conditions. Cooking the turkey to an interior temperature of at least 185°F (for both bird and stuffing) kills any harmful salmonella present.

But don't leave warm stuffing in the bird after dinner, as bacteria can begin growing in warm or room temperatures. Scoop out stuffing and refrigerate it and the turkey separately. Quickly reheat leftovers to at least 185°F.



## NEW DIAL-A-RIDE SERVICE BEING OFFERED NOW by Northfield and New Trier Townships

Northfield and New Trier Townships are now jointly sponsoring a new Dial-A-Ride service, utilizing local taxis instead of the van formerly used. Persons over 65 and the mobility-impaired with incomes of less than \$25,000 a year are eligible for I.D. cards, issued at township offices. (Please note, below, that the Northfield Township office has moved.)

Please take proof of age or physician's certification of permanent disability when applying for an I.D. card. Those already carrying old I.D.'s may have them updated for the new service.

The new Dial-A-Ride may be used between 8 a.m. and 11 p.m. seven days a week. The rider pays the first dollar of the fare, and Dial-A-Ride pays the rest, up to \$3.50 on the meter. (Rides can cost even less than under the old system, as when three or more riders board at the same place and travel to the same destination.)

The participating cab companies are AAA 303 (729-0303), American (272-8000), and North Suburban Yellow (272-3100). If the company called first is unable to accommodate immediately, it will turn over the order to one of the others. Call the Northfield Township office, 724-8300, for any further information.

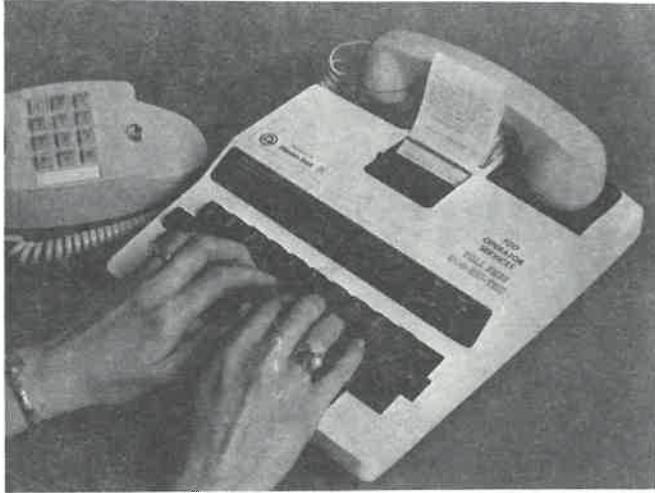

## Police Department equipped with TTY for TELEPHONE COMMUNICATION WITH THE DEAF

Deaf and speech-impaired persons are able to communicate with the Glenview Police Department, which now has a TTY (teletypewriter) connected to 724-2133 for nonemergency matters, and to 724-2131 for emergencies. (As we reported last month, the emergency number for fire and paramedic service is also tied to a TTY. That number is 724-2121.)



A deaf or speech-impaired person with TDD (telecommunication device) in his or her home is able to spell out messages and hold conversations with someone at police headquarters. A small TDD unit, available from Illinois Bell at a rental fee by the month, is simple to install and operate, and can be carried anywhere and used with any telephone.

If you are deaf or speech-impaired or have such a person in your home, call Illinois Bell Disabled Services at 800-572-5062 (a voice-only number). All special telephone devices for the handicapped are on display at the Illinois Bell showroom at 212 West Washington Street in Chicago during business hours.

## GLENVIEW'S TAX RATE LOWEST OF 12 COMMUNITIES

According to 1980 figures recently released, Glenview has one of the lowest municipal property-tax rates (.898) of any municipality in the area. (Lincolnwood's is .822 without library, Northbrook's is .80, and Niles' is .515 without library.)

The eleven municipalities with higher municipal tax rates than Glenview are Evanston (2.708), Glencoe (2.4510), Winnetka (1.994 without the library), Morton Grove (1.731), Park Ridge (1.566), Wilmette (1.411 without the library), Skokie (1.41), Highland Park (1.389), Northfield (1.1302 without the library), Des Plaines (.953) and Deerfield (.911).

Crossing Guards earn \$4.75 an hour. Most work four hours per school day, earning \$95 a week during the school year.
